The King has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto Robert Bamford, of Gwrych, in the County of Denbigh, and of Bamford Hall, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Esq; His Royal Licence and Authority that he and his Issue may take and use the Surname of Hesketh, in Addition to and after his present Surname of Bamford, and bear the Arms of Hesketh Quarterly with those of Bamford, Hesketh in the first Quarter; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said Licence and Permission to be void and of none Effect:

And also to order, that this His Royal Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
