fources of His Majefty's Dominions; and His Majefty relies on the Aid of His Parliament in His anxious Endeavours to fruftrate the Attempts of France against the Independence of Spain and Portugal, and against the Happiness and Freedom of those loyal and resolute Nations.

His Majefty commands us to acquaint you, that the Intercourfe between His Majefty's Minister in America and the Government of the United States has been fuddenly and unexpectedly interrupted. His Majefty fincerely regrets this Event: He has however received the strongest Affurances from the American Minister resident at this Court, that the United States are desirous of maintaining friendly Relations between the Two Countries. This Defire will be met by a corresponding Disposition on the Part of His Majefty.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

His Majefty has directed us to inform you that He has ordered the Effimates for the current Year to be laid before you: His Majefty has directed them to be formed with all the Attention to Economy which the Support of His Allies and the Security of His Dominions will permit. And His Majefty relies upon your Zeal and Loyalty to afford Him fuch Supplies as may be neceffary for those effential Objects.

He commands us to express how deeply He regrets the Preffure upon His Subjects, which the protracted Continuance of the War renders inevitable.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

We are commanded by His Majefty to express His Hopes that you will refume the Confideration of the State of the inferior Clergy, and adopt such further Measures upon this interesting Subject as may appear to you to be proper.

We have it further in command to flate to you that the Accounts which will be laid before you of the Trade and Revenue of the Country will be found highly fatisfactory.

Whatever temporary and partial Inconvenience may have refulted from the Meafures which were directed by France against those great Sources of our Prosperity and Strength, those Measures have wholly failed of producing any permanent or general Effect.

The inveterate Hofility of our Enemy continues to be directed against this Country with unabated Animofity and Violence. To guard the Security of His Majesty's Dominions, and to defeat the Defigns which are meditated against Us and our Allies, will require the utmost Efforts of Vigilance, Fortitude, and Perfeverance.

In every Difficulty and Danger; His Majelly confidently trufts that He shall derive the most effectual Support, under the continual Blessing of Divine Providence, from the Wildom of His Parliament, the Valour of His Forces, and the Spiric and Determination of His People.

TATE, taking into Our most ferious Confideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Truft in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have refolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Day of Fafting and Humiliation be observed throughout those Parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednefday the Twenty-eighth Day of February next enfuing, that so both We and Our People may humble Ourfelves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and in the most devout and folemn Manner fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majefty, for averting those heavy Judgments which our manifold Provocations have most justly deferved; and for imploring His Bleffing and Affiftance on Our Arms for the Reftoration of Peace, and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions : And We do ftrictly charge and command, That the faid Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England. and Ireland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation :. and upon Pain of fuch Punifoment as We may justly inflict on all fuch as contemn and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty : And for the better and more orderly folemnizing the fame, We have given Directions to the Molt-Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer fuitable to this Occation, to be ufed in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick. Worship, and to take care that the fame he timely difperfed throughout their refpective Diocefes.
