 " be secured in the Warehouses within the
 " Premises belonging to the London Dock

 " Rice, Tobacco, Wine,
 " Brandy, Geneva and other Spirits."

And whereas certain Vaults for Wine and Spirits, and Warehouses for other Articles of Merchandize, and other Parts of the said Works, have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and are now in Use: And whereas the Building hereinafter mentioned, Part of the said Works, has since been completed.

We, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do certify that in our Judgement that Part of the Building erected on the North West Angel of the Dock Premises marked A. is now so far completed as to be fit and ready in every respect for the Reception of Wine, Brandy, Geneva, and other Spirits.

Henderson Damn your Eyes we will settle you this night for we will cripple you as also Masin Taylor: and the next time we attack your witness

I have been in the Country I had a Letter from my Friend that you have transported him and a Nother for 10lb of Salt Peter If I had known that & your Clerk would have prosecuted them I would have put them & you & your Clerk out of the way I am determined on killing you both if you do not get them both off I know your Town & Country House I will not think my time mispent until I have satisfaction of you both My Wife Friend in Town have lost 2 Children but that is the Beginning off Lives being Lost In this frivolous business we are sworn to kill you Both if you dont Get them Both off Do it iff you regard your lives
