in British or neutral Bottoms, upon paying the same Duty as heretofore, and to import the fame Articles as are allowed by Law to be imported into the Britifh Colonies. Anfwer.- Totally inadmiffible, as it is inconfift-

ent with the Revenue Laws of Great Britain. The Island must in all Matters of Trade be entirely fubject to His Majetty's Pleafure.

Art. X. Any Regulations which may be thought neceffary for the internal Police of the Colony shall not be carried into Execution before it is carried into a Law, and promulgated by the Commandant of the Island and Prefident and Council.

Answer.—Any Regulations which may be thought neceffary for the internal Police or good Government of the Illand will be promulgated and enforced as heretofore, but subject however to the previous exclusive and uncontrouled Authority of His Majefty's Reprefentative, whofe Approval and Ratifica-tion shall in all Cafes be indifpentable to give Validity to all public Acts and Meafures.

Art. XI. Confiructions the most favourable to the Capitulants shall be put upon évery Article of this Capiculation, in cafe any of them should require Explanation hereafter.

Anfwer.-Granted.

ADDITIONAL ARTICLES by the British.

Art.1. ALL juft Debts contracted by the exifting Government mult be fettled by the proper Au-thorities; within Four Months from this Date. The Properties of Perfons reliding in Holland, or in any Country under the Power and Controul of France, shall be made responsible for this Engagement.

Art. II. The Properties of Abfentees, defcribed in the preceding Article, or the annual Produce thereof, under the Provisions therein contained, fhall be fent to England for the Behoof of the Proprietors, subject to such Regulations respecting its further Transmission to the several Parties, as His Britannic Majelty, during the War, shall think proper to preferibe.

Art. III. As foon as the prefent Capitulation shall have been ratified, the British Troops shall occupy the Forts and Commanding Politions. The Articles of this Capitulation shall be ratified as foon as poffible, and at the lateft by Three o'Clock P. M.
