So that the Design of this our present Humble application, is to discover our sense of the Happiness we enjoy under Your Majesties Government, and to let the World see we will not be diverted or deterred from any decent, or seasonable expression of our Duty and Allegiance; notwithstanding many late Pamphlets, and little tricks of Popular Rhetorick, have been used on purpose to discountenance and expose Loyal Addressers. We are assamed that the practices of some few factious Men, should make it necessary for us to express what always pught to be supposed and granted, that good Subjects are sersible of the Blessings of a just Government; and we beg yout Maje-sty to be assured, that our Zeal for Your Majesties ser-vice, hath kept pace with that of the most early Ad-dressers, though in a modest imitation of Your Majesties Resolutions of acting according to Law; we have forbornthus publickly to Declare it, till we were legally qualified so to do.

And therefore as in the time of the late Rebellion, many Gentlemen of the best Characters of this your County of Surrey, did to their utmost hazard, and with the boss of some of their Lives, assert their Loyalty, by Petition, on behalf of Your Royal Father, to the late Usurped Power: So at this time we the Grand Furry for the Body of this County, do humbly presume to assure your Majesty, that our Lives and Fortunes are netirely Devoted to the Service of Your Majesties Person and Crown, in its legal Descent, to your rightful Heirs and Successors, the preservation of the Protestant Religion and Government, as by Law established in Church and State; in opposition to the Hellish contrivances of undermining Papists, and restless Dissenting
