The Humble Address of the Grand Jury for the County of Surrey, at the Assizes hold at Kingston, this 20th day of July, Ann. Dom. 1681.

Great S I R,

**Y**our Majesties late Gracious Declaration, upon the dutiful Confidence, which we, and all your good Subjects have in Your Royal Word, hath so fully answered all our hopes, and anticipated all our wishes, that we conceive there is nothing further left us to desire, than that your Majesty may long continue what you are, a most Indulgent and Beloved Prince; and we, what we sincerely profess, and joyfully acknowledge our selves to be, Your Majesties Obedient and happy Subjects. So that the Design of this our present Humble application, is to discover our sense of the Happiness we enjoy under Your Majesties Government, and to let the World see we will not be diverted or deterred from any decent, or reasonable expression of our Duty and Allegiance; notwithstanding many late Pamphlets, and little tricks of Popular Rhetorick, have been used on purpose to discountenance and expose Loyal Addressers. We are ashamed that the practices of some few factious Men, should make it necessary for us to express what always ought to be supposed and granted, that good Subjects are sensible of the Blessings of a just Government; and we beg your Majesty to be assured, that our Zeal for Your Majesties service, hath kept pace with that of the most early Addressers, though in a modest imitation of Your Majesties Resolutions of acting according to Law; we have forborn thus publickly to Declare it, till we were legally qualified so to do.

And therefore as in the time of the late Rebellion, many Gentlemen of the best Characters of this your County of Surrey, did to their utmost hazard, and with the loss of some of their Lives, assert their Loyalty, by Petition, on behalf of Your Royal Father, to the late Usurped Power: So at this time we the Grand Jury for the Body of this County, do humbly presume to assure your Majesty, that our Lives and Fortunes are entirely Devoted to the Service of Your Majesties Person and Crown, in its legal Descent, to your rightful Heirs and Successors, the preservation of the Protestant Religion and Government, as by Law established in Church and State; in opposition to the Hellish contrivances of undermining Papists, and restless Dissenters.

The High Sheriff and the Justices of the Peace for this County, do concur in this Address, being present at the Assizes, and do unanimously and cordially subscribe our Names to it.

Windsor, July 30. We published in our last, an Address from the County of Carmarthen, which had been presented to His Majesty by Rowland Gwyn, Esq; one of the Justices of the Peace of the said County; Since, the following Address from the County-Burrough of Carmarthen, has been presented to His Majesty.

*The Humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Town-Clerk, Sheriffs and Burgers of the County-Burrough, of Carmarthen, and Commonalty of the same.*

**W**he Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Town-Clerk, Sheriffs, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the County Burrough of Carmarthen (a Town of constant unblemish Loyalty, in the late miserable times of Rebellion) are sincerely apprehensive of the inexpressible Blessings of the best Reformed Religion, for Doctrine and Discipline, our Laws, Liberties, Properties, secure Commerce, Peace and Plenty, comfortably enjoyed, next to the Divine Goodness, by the Intendance of the Care, Prudence, and Protection of your Majesties Government, which had been for many years before your Majesties happy Restauration insolently violated, desperately invaded by varieties of changes in illegal, tyrannical Usurpations under specious pretences (the Masques of seditious Designs) with dutiful, grateful Souls, we humbly acknowledge our abundant satisfaction in the reiterated assurances in your Gracious speeches in the two last Parliaments Assembled, in your transcendently signal Declaration, imprinted by indelible Characters in our Hearts, of your Sacred Majesties fixed Resolution, not to warp from the defence of the Protestant Religion, established by Law in this Kingdom, as not to practice your self, so not to permit in others in any capacities separated, or convened Subjects, any Arbitrary exercises, exorbitancies of Power; that we may be Governed by certain known Laws, not by uncertain, every day mutable Votes; a pressure that we dismally languished under, when Monarchy was eclipsed; for the bright luster thereof, and the just continuance to be transmitted to succeeding Generations; we will all, as we are bound by our Duties and Oaths, readily sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes, in opposition and ceaselesse of all Traiterous and factious Conspiracies, Popish or Phantastical.

Though other Burroughs have got the start to precede in the time of their Addresses, yet none can excell us in devoted, untainted, obsequious Affections towards your Majesty; to whom God Grant a long and prosperous Reign over us, and victorious over all your Enemies. It is our Principle and Maxim, That the Honour of the King is the safety of the Kingdom.
