The humble Address of the Presbyterian Ministers and Elders, distinguished by the Name Seceders in this Part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, in Synod assembled in Cookstown, 5th July 1810.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Presbyterian Ministers and Elders, distinguished by the Name Seceders, of that Part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, beg Leave to lay before Your Majesty our renewed Assurance of our Duty and Loyalty to Your Majesty, and of our heartfelt Attachment to Your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government.

Always endeavouring to inculcate by Precept and Example among our numerous Congregations the Principles civil and religious professed by the Church of Scotland at the glorious Revolution, and at the happy Accession of the illustrious House of Hanover; we daily pray, that the God by whom Kings reign and Princes decree Justice may long preserve Your Majesty's Person, and bless Your Majesty's Government.

With Hearts full of Gratitude to the Great Preserver of Men, we congratulate Your Majesty on the Enjoyment of a Jubilee Year of Your Reign, and we anticipate the Pleasure with which the future Historians of Your Majesty's long and auspicious Reign will tell admiring Posterity, that in an Age replete with Events the most awful, Your Majesty's Government was, by the Favour of the Lord of Hosts, made the Bulwark of those civil and religious Rights which a bold Usurper and an infatuated People sought to destroy.

We beg Leave to assure Your Majesty of the Happiness with which we behold Your Majesty's Councils, Fleets, and Armies prospered by the Providence of God; and Your Majesty's Subjects enjoying in a Degree beyond that of the other Nations of the Earth, all the Blessings of Religion, Liberty,

Literature, Commerce, and Wealth; so that, confident in the Divine Goodness, we cherish the Hope, that the Almighty who has made Your Majesty a Shelter to the Church by his Power, will yet increase Your Majesty's Greatness, and baffle all the Designs of such as wickedly strive to shake the Throne of Your Majesty's United Empire.

Your Majesty will vouchsafe to receive our sincere Congratulations on the merciful Escape and Recovery of His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland from the Blows of an ungrateful Assassin; may he, and every Branch of Your Royal House, be ever shielded from the Arrow that flieth by Day, and from the Pestilence that walketh in Darkness.

That Your Majesty and Your Royal House may long fill the Throne of Your illustrious Ancestors, and in the last great Day receive Crowns glorious and immortal, is, and ever shall be the Prayer of us Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects.

Copies of Three Letters from Lieutenant Nugent, commanding His Majesty's Gun-Vessel Strenuous, addressed to Rear-Admiral Otway, Commander in Chief at Leith, and transmitted by the latter to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

His Majesty's Gun-Brig Strenuous, off the Naze, September 10, 1810.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honour to acquaint you, His Majesty's Gun-Brig under my Command has this Day chased on Shore, and destroyed, the Danish Privateer Cutter Aalbergh, pierced for Eight Guns, and carrying Thirty Men.

SIR,

I BEG Leave to inform you, His Majesty's Gun-Brig under my Command has this Day captured the Danish Cutter Privateer Popham, armed with Three Guns and carrying Ten Men, out only a few Hours from Klieven.
