And whilft we offer to Your Royal Highnels our affectionate Condolence on the afflicting Illucis of our Giacious Sovereign, and join with Your Royal Highnels in fervent Prayers to the Almighty for his Recovery, we beg to express our Regret that Parliament should have deemed it necessary to curtail the Royal Authority in the Hauds of Your Highnels, by Restrictions which neither the Character of Your Royal Highnels nor the Circumflances of the Country appear to us to require

Repoting, however, with the fullet Confidence on Your Royal Highnels's beneficent Views and Intentions. we rely that every Measure which depends upon Your Royal Highnels will be adopted, for promoting the Happinels and Security of these Realms.

With our Gratitude, our Admiration alfo has been excited, in contemplating the Equationity that fo eminently characteriled the Conduct of Your Royal Highnels during the painful Conflicts which attended the Progress of those Difcuffions which terminated in your Elevation to the Government of the Realm.

In the Difcharge of the arduous Tafk, we have beheld, Siv, with equal Admiration, the Sacrifice of private and perfonal Confiderations in deference to the Exigency of the Times. Every Act of Your Royal Highnel's feems to have been uniformly directed by a most judicious Appreciation of Time and Circumstances, and guaranteed by a folema fpontaneous Declaration, involving equally the Security of the Rights of the Sovereign and his People.

Influenced by fuch Principles, and attentively obfervant of the Origin and Progrefs of those dreadful Convoltions which have overwhelmed the Thronce of furrounding Nations, and deep y conversant, as Your Royal Highness is known to be, in the Hiftory and Policy of your native Country, it is not for us, Sir, to lead your Attention to Confiderations and Circumfrances which mult have been anticipated by your own Wildom and Forefight; it is more becoming on our Part, without any Dereliction of the due Allertion of our conflictuational Rights, to express on the prefent Occasion our firm Reliance on the Integrity of your Theart and the Soundness of your Judgment.

But it feems to have pleafed the Almighty Difpofer of Human Events, to lend a compaffionate Ear to the Prayers of Your Royal Highnefs and of an afflicted People, and by gracioufly vouchfafing the gradual Recovery of His Majefty, to accelerate the Relief of Your Royal Highnefs from the anxious Cares and momentous Concerns of Government. Yet, fhort as that Period may be, the Virtues and Talents of Your Royal Highnefs have already been fo abundantly developed in difcharging the Functions of the first Effate, as to have administered to the Mind of every faithful Subject the most confalotary Reflections in the natural Courfe of Time Your Royal Highnefs may fucceed to the Throne of your Ancestors and the permanent Government- of a free and loyal People.
