**Y**esterday, about Nine in the Morning, the Parliament Met, and fell upon the Act for Securing the Protestant Religion against Popery and Fanaticism, which being Debated in several Paragraphs, took up the House till Six in the Evening, when the Act was pass'd. In the beginning of the Debate, the Lord Belhaven having mov'd, That though this Act did abundantly secure the Protestant Religion against Popery and Fanaticism, yet there was no Provision made against a Popish or Fanatick Successor, or to that purpose, above three parts of four of the House, rose from their Seats and cried, To the Castle, to the Castle; Then the Lord Belhaven being required to explain himself, said, He meant what might happen 100 Years hence: But that not giving the House satisfaction, after consideration had of the words by him spoken, which were thought unreasonable by the Act concerning the Succession, whereby it is declared, That no difference of Religion, no Law or Statute can alter the Right of Succession, the Lord of Belhaven was by a Vote of the House, very few dissenting, sent Prisoner to the Castle, whither he was carried in the Earl Marshal's Coach, under a Guard of Horse and Foot. At the same time the Kings Advocate declared in Parliament, that he would bring an Impeachment of high Treason against him. The Act is as follows.

An Act for Securing the Protestant Religion, against Popery and Fanaticism, Edenburgh, August 29. 1681.

**O**ur Sovereign Lord, with His Estates of Parliament, considering, That albeit by many Good and Wholesome Laws made by his Royal Grand-Father, and Father, of Glorious Memory, and by Himself in this and his other Parliaments since his happy Restauration, the Protestant Religion is carefully Affected, Established, and Secured against Popery and Fanaticism; yet the restless Adversaries of our Religion, do not cease to propagate their Errors, and to seduce His Majesties Subjects from their Duty to God, and Loyalty to his Vice-gerent, and to Overturn the Established Religion, by introducing their Superstitions and Delusions into this Church and Kingdom; And knowing that nothing can more encrease the Numbers and Confidences of Papists and Schismatical Dissenters from the Established Church, than the supine Neglect of putting in Execution the good Laws provided against them, together with their hopes to insinuate themselves into Offices and Places of Trust, and Publick Employment; Therefore His Majesty from his Princely and Pious Zeal, to maintain and preserve the true Protestant Religion contained in the Confession of Faith, Recorded in the First Parliament of King James the Sixth, which is Founded on, and agreeable to the written Word of God; Doth wish

Advice and Consent of his Estates of Parliament, Require and Command all his Officers, Judges, and Magistrates, to put the Laws made against Popery and Papists, Priests, Jesuits, and all Persons of any other Order in the Popish Church, especially against Sayers and Hearers of Mass, Venders and Dispensers of forbidden Books, and Resettlers of Popish Priests and Excommunicated Papists: As also against all Fanatick Separatists from this National Church, against Preachers at House or Field Conventicles, and the Resettlers and Harbourers of Preachers, who are Intercommuniced, against disorderly Baptismes and Marriages, and irregular Ordinations and all other Schismatical Disorders, to full and vigorous Execution, according to the Tenour of the respective Acts of Parliament thereunto provided. And that His Majesties Princely Care, to have these Laws put in Execution against those Enemies of the Protestant Religion, may the more effectually appear, He doth with Advice and Consent foresaid, Statute and Ordain that the Ministers of each Paroch, give up once in October Yearly, to their respective Ordinaries, true and complete Lists of all Papists and Schismatical withdrawers from the Publick Worship in their respective Paroches, which Lists are to be Subscribed by them; and that the Bishops give in a Double of the said Lists, subscribed by them, to the respective Sheriffs, Stewards, Bailiffs of Royalties and Regalities, and Magistrates of Burroughs, to the effect the said Judges may proceed against them according to Law: As also the Sheriffs and other Magistrates foresaid, are hereby Ordained to give an Account to His Majesties Privy Council in December Yearly, of their proceedings against those Papists and Fanatick Separatists, as they will be answerable at their highest Peril; and that the Diligences done by the Sheriffs, Bailiffs of Regalities, and other Magistrates foresaid, may be the better acquired into by the Council, the Bishops of the respective Diocesses, are to send exact Doubles of the Lists of the Papists and Fanaticks to the Clerks of the Privy Council, whereby the diligence of the Sheriffs and other Judges foresaid, may be Controlled and Examined. And to cut off all hopes from Papists and Fanaticks, of their being employed in Offices and Places of publick Trust, It is hereby Statute and Ordained, that the following Oath shall be taken by all Persons in Offices of Publick Trust, Civil, Ecclesiastical and Military, especially by all Members of Parliament, and Electors of Members of Parliament, all Privy Counsellors, Lords of Session, Members of the Exchequer, Lords of Justice, and all other Members of these Courts, all Officers of the Crown and State, all Arch-Bishops and Bishops, and all Preachers and Ministers of the Gospel whatsoever, all Persons of this Kingdom named, or to be named Commissioners for the Borders, all Members of the Communion for Church Affairs, all Sheriffs, Stewards, Bailiffs of Royalties and Regalities, Justices of Peace, Officers of the Mint, Commissars and their Deputes, their Clerks and Ricars, all Advocates and Procurators, before any of these Courts, all Writers to the Signet, all Publick Notaries, and other Persons employed in Writing

oggering; The Lyon King at Arms, Heraulds, Pur-  
 Levants and Messengers at Arms; all Collectors, Sub-  
 Collectors, and Farmers of His Majesties Customs and  
 Excises, all Magistrates, Deans of Guilds, Counsellors  
 and Clerks of Burroughs Royal and Regality; all Dea-  
 cons of Trades, and Deacons Conveeners in the said  
 Burroughs; all Masters and Doctors in Universities,  
 Colledges, or Schools; all Chaplains in Families, Pe-  
 dagogues to Children; and all Officers and Soldiers in  
 Armies, Forts or Militia; and all other persons in any  
 publick Trust or Office within this Kingdom, who shall  
 publickly swear, and subscribe the said Oath as follows,  
 viz. The Arch-Bishops, Bishops, Commanders of the Forts,  
 and Officers of the Crown and State, and Coun-  
 sellors before the Privy Council; all the Bishops, Jus-  
 tices, and all Members of the Colledge of Justice, and  
 others depending upon them before the Sessions: The  
 Justices of the Peace, and all those depending upon that  
 Court, in the Justice Court; the Lords and other Mem-  
 bers of the Exchequer; before the Exchequer; all Bishops  
 before the Arch-Bishops; all the inferior Clergy, Mon-  
 nasses, Masters, and Doctors of Universities and  
 Schools, Chaplains and Pedagogues, before the Bishops of  
 the respective Dioceses; Sheriffs, Stewards, Bailiffs of Roy-  
 alty and Gaol, and those depending on these Justices,  
 before those respective Courts; all Breveffs, Bail-  
 iffs, and others of the Burroughs, before the Town  
 Council; all Collectors and Farmers of the Kings Cu-  
 stoms and Excises, before the Exchequer; the Commis-  
 sioners of the Borders, before the Privy Council; and  
 Heraulds, Purlevants, and Messengers at Arms, before  
 the Lyon. And His Majesty with consent foresaid, Or-  
 dains, that all those who presently possess  
 and enjoy any of the foresaid Offices, Publick Trusts,  
 or Employments shall take and subscribe the following  
 Oath in one of the foresaid Offices in manner before pre-  
 scribed, during the first of the first of January next,  
 which is to be Recorded in the Registers of the respective  
 Courts, and Extracts thereof under the Clerks hand  
 to be reported to His Majesties Privy Council, heere-  
 after, and the first of March next, 1682, and there-  
 after in any other Courts, whereof they are Judges or  
 Members, the first time they shall sit or Exercise in any  
 of these respective Courts; and Ordains that all who shall  
 hereafter be promoted to, or employed in any of the foresaid  
 Offices, Trusts or Employments, shall at their Entry into  
 and before their exercising thereof, Take and subscribe  
 the said Oath in manner foresaid, to be Recorded in  
 the Registers of the respective Courts, and reported to  
 his Majesties Privy Council, within the space of  
 forty Days after their taking the same. And if  
 any shall presume to exercise any of the said Offices  
 or Employments, in any publick Office, or Trust, with-  
 in this Kingdom (the Kings lawfull Brothers and  
 Sons only excepted) until they take the Oath foresaid,  
 and subscribe it, to be Recorded in the Registers of the  
 respective Courts; they shall be declared incapable of  
 all publick Trust hereafter, and be further punished with  
 the loss of their Medals, and severall Escheat, the  
 one half whereof to be given to the Informer, and the  
 other to belong to His Majesty. And His Majesty,  
 with advice foresaid, recommends to His Privy Coun-  
 cil to see this Act put to dire and vigorous Execution.

Follows the Tenor of the Oath, to be taken by all  
 Persons in Publick Trust.

I A. B. solemnly swear in presence of the Eternal  
 God, whom I invoke as Judge and Witness of  
 the true Intention in this my Oath, That I own,  
 and sincerely profess the true Protestant Religion,  
 contained in the Confession of Faith, Recorded in  
 the first Parliament of King James the Sixth, and  
 that I believe the same to be Founded on, and Agree-  
 able to the written Word of God, And I Promise

and swear, that I shall adhere thereto, during all the  
 days of my Life-time, and shall endeavour to Edu-  
 cate my Children therein; and shall never consent  
 to any Change or Alteration contrary thereto, and  
 in consistent with the said Protestant Religion, and  
 Confession of Faith; and for Testification of my O-  
 bedience to my most Gracious Sovereign, Charles  
 the Second, I do affirm and swear, by this my so-  
 lemn Oath, That the Kings Majesty is the only Su-  
 preme Governor of this Realm, over all Persons,  
 and in all Causes, as well Ecclesiastical as Civil; and  
 that no Foreign Prince, Person, Pope, Prelate,  
 State, or Potentate, hath, or ought to have, any  
 Jurisdiction, Power, Superiority, Preheminency, or  
 Authority, Ecclesiastical or Civil, within this Realm:  
 And therefore I do utterly renounce, and forsake all  
 Foreign Jurisdictions, Powers, Superiorities, and Au-  
 thorities, and do promise what shall hereafter  
 shall bear Faith and true Allegiance to the Kings  
 Majesty, his Heirs and Lawfull Successors, and to  
 my Power shall assist and defend all Rights, Juris-  
 dictions, Prerogatives, Priviledges, Preheminences,  
 and Authorities, belonging to the Kings Majes-  
 ty, his Heirs; and Lawfull Successors, And I fur-  
 ther affirm, and swear by this my solemn Oath, that  
 I judge it unlawful for Substitution, pretence of Res-  
 formation, or any other pretence whatsoever, to  
 enter into Covenants and leagues, or to Convoke,  
 Convey, or Assemble in any Councils, Conventi-  
 ons, or Assemblies, to Treat, Consult, or Decease  
 mine in any Matter of State, Civil or Ecclesiastical,  
 without His Majesties special Command, or Express  
 Licence had thereto, or to take oaths against  
 the King, or those Commissioned by him; and that  
 I shall never fight in Arms, or enter into such Co-  
 venants or Assemblies, and that I have no Oblig-  
 ation on me from the National Covenant, or the  
 Solemn League and Covenant (commonly so cal-  
 led) or any other manner of Way whatsoever, to  
 endeavour any Change or Alteration in the Govern-  
 ment, either in Church or State, as it is now Estab-  
 lished by the Laws of this Kingdom; And I pro-  
 mise and swear, that I shall with my utmost power  
 Defend, Assist, and Maintain His Majesties Justifi-  
 cation foresaid against all deadly, and I shall never  
 decline His Majesties Power and Jurisdiction, as I  
 shall answer to God. And finally, I affirm and swear.  
 That this my solemn Oath is given in the plain  
 Genuine sense and meaning of the Words, with-  
 out any Equivocation, mental Reservation, or any man-  
 ner of Evasion whatsoever, and that I shall not at-  
 tempt to use any Dispensation from any Creature  
 whatsoever. So Help me God.

Tregony, Aug. 31. At a late Meeting at Launceston,  
 of the Deputy-Lieutenants and Justices of the Peace

Cologne, Aug 31. This City is sending Deputies to the Emperor, to give His Imperial Majesty an account of their late proceedings against some of their Burghmesters, and to remove the ill Impressions some persons have endeavoured to give his Imperial Majesty concerning the same. We cannot see that the endeavours of the Imperial Minister, for the composing the affairs of Liege, have as yet any success.

Frankfort, Aug. 31. The Baggage of the French Ambassadors is arrived; and we expect now in few days, to see all the Ministers here that are to assist at the Conference that are to be held here.

Frankfort, Sept. 2. From Ratisbonne we have an Account, that the Dyet has finished the Instructions for their Deputies, that are to assist at the Conferences to be held here, and that having resolved to write a Letter to His Majesty of Great Britain; the same had been Read in the Dyet and Approved of. On the 25th the Colleges of the Electors, and of the Princes, resumed the Debate concerning the raising the 40000. Men, pursuant to their former Resolutions, and agreed on the Repartitions to be made in the ten Circles; by which they do ease the Circles of the Rhine, because of what they suffered in the late War; upon condition, that this present Abatement shall not be made a Precedent hereafter. This conclusion they have sent to the Emperor, and have prayed him by his Circular Letters to the several Circles, to hasten their Leavies. The Elector of Saxony is sending an Ambassador to the Emperor.

Hamburg, Sept. 2. On Saturday last Count Berc, the Emperor's Envoye parted from hence for Copenhagen, where he is to propose an Alliance between his Imperial Majesty and the King of Denmark. Our Letters from Hungary give great hopes of a happy conclusion of the Dyet; they telling us that the Emperor was gone to Oedenburg, with a Resolution to give all imaginable satisfaction to his Protestant Subjects. From Gottsburg they write, that some thousands of French Protestants are arrived there from France, with intention to settle in that Kingdom. The Queen-Mother of Denmark is with her two Daughters the Electress Palatine, and the Electress of Saxony, at Zell, where they are most splendidly entertained.

Brussels, Sept 2. The endeavours that have been hitherto used for the composing the Affairs of Liege, have not had any effect; nor does there appear any disposition to an Accommodation; since

the late Hostilities which have very much exasperated Mens Minds on both sides. We are expecting the Prince of Parma back from Antwerp; the Nations here have not consented to the Supply his Highness demanded.

Paris, Sept. 9. The march of the Kings Troops towards Italy, is now the common subject of Peoples Discourses, though they do not yet agree in their conjectures, concerning the Design of it. This is certain, that the Princes of Italy are very much alarmed; and particularly the Republick of Genoa; who, as we are informed, has desired the assistance of the King of Spain, in case they are attacked. The King has given the Sieur du Quesne, who at present Commands a Squadron of his Men of War in the Mediterranean, 200000 Livres; and its thought he may be made a Marechal of France, if he will become a Roman Catholic.

Whitehal, Sept. 5. This Evening Don Joseph de Faria, Envoye Extraordinary from the Crown of Portugal, was Conducted in His Majesties Coach to his Audience of their Majesties, by Sir Charles Catteral, Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehal, Sept. 6. This Morning His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honor of Knighthood on George Rainsford of Lincoln's Inn, Esq; Son to the late Lord Chief Justice Rainsford.
