**W**E have received, with the most profound Respect and Gratitude, the gracious Letter with which it has pleased Your Royal Highness to honour this Meeting of the Assembly of our National Church.

The Approbation which Your Royal Highness has condescended to bestow upon the former General Assemblies of this Church we feel as a powerful Motive, animating us so to persevere in the Discharge of our Duty, that the Satisfaction which you have hitherto derived from the happy Result of our annual Labours may, on the present Occasion, remain undiminished.

The renewed Appointment of the Right Honourable Francis Lord Napier to represent the Royal Person in this Assembly, we consider as a signal Proof of Your Royal Highness's Favour. The Zeal and Fidelity with which he has uniformly discharged the Trust reposed in him, the Principles of Piety and true Patriotism which distinguish his Character, and his Affection for the Church of Scotland, render him peculiarly acceptable to this Assembly.

With Gratitude and Confidence we rely on the Assurance which Your Royal Highness has vouchsafed to give us, of the Interest which you take in

us and our Deliberations, of your Attachment to the Church of Scotland, and of your inflexible Resolution to maintain inviolate her Rights and Privileges as by Law established.

We have received; with due Thankfulness, Your Royal Highness's Warrant, not only for the usual Gift of One Thousand Pounds, but also for the additional Sum of One Thousand Pounds, to be in like Manner employed for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge, and the Principles of reformed Religion, in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. This farther Proof which Your Royal Highness has afforded, of your tender Regard for the most valuable Interests of your Subjects in the remoter Districts of this Country, will lead us, on our Part, to new and vigorous Exertions in the Discharge of our sacred Duties, as well as enable us more extensively and more effectually to promote the Improvement and Happiness of all those committed to our special Care. We will teach them to believe that their Loyalty and Attachment to the Principles of the admirable Constitution under which they live, if duly cherished, cannot fail to lead to the mutual Welfare of the Sovereign and of the People.

With the most profound Respect we observe the Solicitude with which Your Royal Highness reminds us of our Duty. We listen with Cheerfulness to your paternal Admonitions, and will earnestly apply ourselves to the Functions of our Ministry. We will instruct our People in the Knowledge of those Principles, and lead them to the Practice of all those Duties and Virtues, by which they may be rendered good Men and good Citizens; nor shall we fail to inculcate upon them Submission to the lawful Authority of the Sovereign, and Zeal for the Maintainance of his Royal Prerogative, which we regard as an essential Part of our happy Constitution; so that by the Blessing of God on our Endeavours, we may see Righteousness and Order, Union and Energy, Comfort and Peace prevail universally in this Part of the Kingdom. With unremitting Attention to those Matters which more immediately fall within the Province of our Ecclesiastical Deliberations, we will study, as far as in us lies, to accomplish, with Unanimity and Harmony, those great and important Ends for which we have assembled.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, may direct and prosper the Adminis-

tration of the Government which Your Royal Highness exercises, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, that he may preserve Your Royal Highness long for a Blessing to this Nation and to the World, and may finally bestow upon you a Crown of unfading Glory, is the sincere and fervent Prayer of, may it please Your Royal Highness, the Ministers and Elders of this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

WE the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland eagerly embrace this Opportunity of our having met in General Assembly to approach Your Royal Highness, with the warmest Expressions of our dutiful and affectionate Attachment.

We have felt the most anxious and painful Interest in the Afflictions with which it hath pleased Divine Providence to visit the illustrious House of our Sovereign.

We lament the Loss of a Princess, whose Virtues endeared her to her Family—whose Fortitude and Resignation in severe and protracted Suffering are a new Proof of the Value and Efficacy of that Religion by which she was sustained.

Revering the Virtues of our most gracious Sovereign, and having long experienced the Mildness and Justice of His Government, we deeply participate with Your Royal Highness and all His faithful Subjects in deploring the heavy Calamity which has deprived us of His paternal Care and Direction. We have not ceased to present our fervent Supplications, and those of the People entrusted to our Care, before the Throne of Divine Grace, earnestly beseeching the Father of Mercies to regard the Affliction of our beloved King, and our Souls are filled with Joy and Thankfulness in the humble Hope that our national Prayers have been graciously heard, and that Prefages are afforded us of His Restoration to Health, to His Family, and to the Exercises of His Royal Functions.

We acknowledge with Gratitude the Mercy of the Almighty Disposer of Events, who has alleviated the national Calamity by blessing us with a Prince, eminently qualified by his Talents and Virtue, and by his Attachment to the Principles of the Constitution, for discharging the high Duties committed to him as Regent of this United Kingdom. We have contemplated with delight the Wisdom and Prudence with which Your Royal Highness has exerted the Powers of Government. These qualities so eminently displayed by Your Royal Highness cannot fail to constitute a lasting Claim on the Gratitude and Confidence of a loyal and affectionate People.

Grateful to the Almighty Ruler in the Kingdoms of Men, we congratulate Your Royal Highness on the Security of our Native Land, and on the distinguished Blessings which its Inhabitants have enjoyed amidst all the Dangers of that protracted War in which we are engaged with a malignant and inveterate Foe. These successful Exertions in the Cause of our suffering Allies have increased our national Glory and exalted us among the Kingdoms of the World. The dutiful and loyal Address of the Freeholders of the County of Tipperary, legally convened and assembled at Thurles, on Monday the 15th Day of April 1811.

*May it please Your Royal Highness,*

**WE**, the Freeholders of the County of Tipperary, legally convened and assembled at Thurles, most humbly approach Your Royal Highness, with the warmest Assurances of affectionate Attachment to Your Royal Person, and unshaken Adherence to those sacred Principles which seated your Family on the Throne of these Realms; fully convinced that those Principles afford the best Security to the Honour and Dignity of the Sovereign, and the Rights and Interests of the People.

In offering to Your Royal Highness our sincere Condolence upon the severe Affliction with which it has pleased Divine Providence to visit our most gracious Sovereign, it is with heart-felt Consolation that in common with all Ranks of our Fellow-Subjects, we behold the momentous Functions of the Executive Power vested in a Prince so highly endowed and so eminently qualified to exercise the Regal Duties—a Prince who has so greatly endeared himself to the Hearts of all His Majesty's People by his Moderation and Forbearance on various trying Occasions, and by the Attachment he has so uniformly shewn to their Rights and Liberties. Much more proudly and confidently should we have felt this consolatory Sentiment, had the Desire and Expectation of the United Kingdom been realized by confiding to Your Royal Highness the full Powers of the Executive Authority, assured as we feel that these Powers would be wisely and beneficially exercised to enable the whole Body of your People to meet the extraordinary Exigencies of so perilous a Crisis; assured as we are that the national Valour would be stimulated by a wise and dignified,

because an impartial, Distribution of Reward and Favour; that Patriotism, in its purest and most genuine Meaning, would be identified with Power; and that the only Medium by which the People of these Realms could view the Supreme Magistrate of the State, would be through the Irradiations diffused around him from Acts of Benignity and Munificence.

Fain would we have been to forbear clouding the Dawn of our Intercourse with Your Royal Highness by a Glance even at the Name of Grievances, manifold, weighty, and pernicious as those are to which we more particularly apply ourselves; but the Duty we owe to our Sovereign and our Country, the Reverence we owe to the Memory and Example of our Forefathers, and the Justice that is claimed towards our Posterity, the Fame, the Happiness, and the Safety of the Empire, all with irresistible Force forbid us to disguise our Thoughts or smother our Feelings.

We see, with a mixed Contemplation of Shame and Sorrow, the political Unity of a great People hazarded; we see Ireland, the most essential Bulwark of the British Name and Glory, paralyzed in her Exertions, degraded in her Character, her Valour checked by unworthy Suspicion, her Emulation repressed by servile and unwarrantable Distinctions, her People divided without Meaning, and her Strength and her Integrity depreciated by Imputations that at once she disclaims and detests; and laying before Your Royal Highness the common Sentiments of a loyal, generous, and ardent People, of all religious Persuasions, we do most humbly implore Your Royal Highness's early and earnest Attention to the Situation of the Irish Catholics.

By the present System of Laws, the Catholic of Ireland is mocked and tantalized, by having laid open to him every Avenue, (that to the Church alone excepted,) which leads to Wealth, and Power, and Dignity; and in this he may drudge and labour in the dull and discouraging Pursuits of Science that are divested of all those Lures to Activity by which every other Description of Men are incited to great Exertion; or he may fight and fall in the Field, under a Sense of Duty abstracted from all the noblest and most inspiring Incentives to Glory. In either Case he is so circumstanced, that the Zeal which in others animates Study, or invigorates Labour, and the Heroism that impels to Deeds of Valour, are damped and chilled in him by the heart-rending Reflection that, however meritoriously or nobly he may struggle for the final Advantage, he can never attain it; that however he may be permitted to waste his Life in pursuing the Path to Fame and Power, the Entrance, when he arrives at it, is shut for ever against him.

By this System of Laws, and the System of Government consequently acting upon them, the remaining Restrictions which operate against the Roman Catholics exhibit the Appearance of a blind Infatuation, conferring on French and other foreign Roman Catholic Officers what it offensively refuses to Native Irish; filling the Hearts of the Irish Millions with Indignation and Resentment, and laying them open to the Influence of Passions which cannot be contemplated without Terror.

In beseeching Your Royal Highness's favourable Attention to our common Supplication, we approach Your Royal Highness with the greater Degree of Confidence, because we cannot but hope that, when

the Two great Classes of Protestant and Catholic, for mutual Preservation, shall make common Cause in pursuit of an Object that we all think indispensable, the few but odious remaining Restrictions upon the Catholic Body, smitten by the united Rays of the Law, the Constitution, the Nation, and the Throne, must, like a noxious Exhalation, melt and disappear.

We do, therefore, humbly entreat that Your Royal Highness may be graciously pleased to recommend to the Imperial Parliament the immediate Consideration of the State of the Irish Catholics, and the urgent Necessity of restoring them to the full Participation of all the Advantages and Blessings of our glorious Constitution; Blessings and Advantages to which we humbly submit, that they are now highly and justly entitled to a still more ample Extent than what was assured to that Body under the solemn Treaty of Limerick, signed by King William; to the Security of which they have, in much more than a proportionate Degree, contributed by their Treasure and their Lives; to the Enjoyment of which, under Your Royal Highness and every Branch of your illustrious Family, they have eminently entitled themselves, by an unabated Loyalty toward the House of Brunswick, and by their uniform, ardent, and steady Attachment for Six Hundred and Fifty Years to their natural Alliance with Great Britain; in support of which every Battle that hath been fought, and every Victory that has been gained from the earliest Periods of our History, under the British Banners by Sea or Land, in every Climate of the Earth, has been highly attributable to Irish Valour and Irish Loyalty, bleeding and dying for British Glory, and sealing with the best Blood of Ireland the Bond of British Connexion.

With these Views, may it please Your Royal Highness, we trust that it will appear but a Claim of common Justice on behalf of this numerous, opulent, and loyal Majority of the Irish People, that they should at once be freed from every Species of Restriction and Disability, and be placed on a full and fair Footing of perfect Equality with the most favoured of His Majesty's most loyal Subjects.

In thus approaching Your Royal Highness with our sincere Congratulations, we have attempted to discharge an honest Duty, at once to Your Royal Highness and the People of the Empire, in humbly suggesting a Measure, by the Recommendation and Accomplishment of which Your Royal Highness will enture the Gratitude and combine the Strength of this vast Portion of the Empire, and entail upon your Name and Character the Love, Admiration, and Blessings of the Time in which you live, and the Reverence of Ages yet to come.

WE, the Gentry and Freeholders of the County of Clare, Members of the established Church, beg Leave to approach Your Royal Highness with Hearts full of the most loyal and affectionate Attachment to the Person and Government of your Royal Father, to express the deepest and most grateful Sense of the numerous Blessings we have enjoyed under your illustrious House, and at the same Time to console with Your Royal Highness upon the grievous Malady, with which it has pleased the Almighty to afflict the best of Sovereigns.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, autho-*

HAVING discovered Four Vessels at Anchor under Pettichli, it being nearly calm, I dispatched the Barges of this Ship and the Active, under the

Command of Lieutenant Hays of the latter, to attempt bringing them out, in which he completely succeeded, although exposed to a heavy Fire of Musketry from the Soldiers quartered at that Place.

Lieutenant Hays speaks in high Terms of the Conduct of the Petty Officers, Seamen, and Royal Marines employed under him for their cool and steady Conduct on the Occasion.

SIR,

HAVING completed the Water of His Majesty's Ships under my Command at Lissa, on the 9th Instant, I proceeded to reconnoitre the Coast of Italy with this Ship and Active, in hopes of intercepting Vessels which were reported to have sailed from Ancona for Corfu and taken Shelter in various Harbours along the Coast, during the Southerly Winds just let in.

On the Morning of the 12th Instant we discovered several Vessels lying under the Town of Ortano, and as the Wind was light, the Boats of both Ships were dispatched, under the Orders of Lieutenant Dickinson (First of the Cerberus), to bring them out if practicable. On the near Approach of the Boats to the Vessels a Fire of great Guns and small Arms was instantly opened from an Armed Trabaccolo (which was not till then observed), and Soldiers posted on the Beach and Hills commanding the Bay; our Boats formed in close Order, gave Three hearty Cheers, and in a few Minutes cleared all before them, the Men from the Vessels and the Troops on shore running in all Directions.

To prevent any Annoyance whilst the Prizes were bringing out, Lieutenant Dickinson landed with the

Marines under Lieutenant Mears of that Corps embarked in the Active, and a Division of small Arm Men under Mr. James Rennie, Master's-Mate of this Ship, taking a strong Position on the Hills, and planting the British Flag at the very Gates of the Town, whilst the Launches, under Lieutenants Hays and Campiton, with the Barge of the Active, under Mr. James Gibson, Master's Mate of that Ship, were employed in covering them with the Carronades. This judicious and advantageous Movement was of the greatest Service to those employed at the Sea Side, as it kept the Soldiers and Inhabitants, who had collected in great Force, in check, and allowed the Work which had been so ably undertaken to be most fully completed, as in addition to the Convoy consisting of Ten Sail (under the Vessel armed with Six Guns), which was found in the Harbour laden with Grain, Oil, &c. Two large Magazines filled with all Sorts of Naval and Military Stores destined for the Garrison of Corfu, (and which it is said they stand in much need of,) was most completely destroyed by Fire, and I feel convinced the Enemy will suffer most severely by this Capture, as they must have been some Time in making so large a Collection. As I believe you are unacquainted with the Situation of Ortano, I must beg Leave to state it, and you will then be able to form your own Opinion of the Difficulties that existed and to which our Men and Boats were necessarily exposed.

The Harbour is formed by a large Pier running out into the Sea, and connected with a Range of Hills leading to the Town, which stands on the Top of the highest, completely commanding the Vessels in the Bay and the Road up to it, so that the Marines, to gain the strong Post they had, and to prevent being exposed to the severe Fire of Musketry, were obliged to climb up the Rocks by their Hands, with a Prospect of falling down a Precipice every Step they took.

Having detailed to you, Sir, the Particulars of this Service, I have much Pleasure in adding that our Loss has been only Four wounded; and when it is considered that they were exposed to a teasing Fire from the Bushes and Houses from Ten in the Morning until Three in the Afternoon, it will, I trust, be thought trifling in comparison with the Annoyance the Enemy have received by the Capture and Destruction of their Magazines and Vessels.

I cannot speak too highly of the gallant Conduct of Lieutenant Dickinson on this Occasion; the Style in which he boarded the Trabaccolo, armed with Six Guns and full of Men, with the Gig of this Ship, supported by the Barge under Mr. Rennie, (of whom he speaks in the highest Terms of Praise,) forms only a small Part of his Merit; his Arrangements being so well made and so promptly executed by those under him, were such as to have ensured the most complete Success, could it have been possible for the Enemy to have collected any additional regular Force, with that already opposed to them.

No Language I can make use of is strong enough to express the Zeal and Conduct of every Person concerned.

I feel particularly indebted to Captain Gordon of the judicious Manner his Ship was placed, by which Means he prevented any Body of the Enemy from forming in the Rear of our Men, and the Promptitude and zealous Co-operation I have con-

stantly experienced from him since we have been serving together.

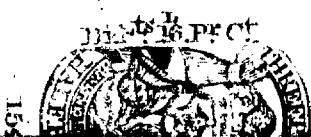
