and that Monfieur Pelletier, the first of the French Commissioners was recuired to Lille, having obtained the liberty of Navigation on the Spanish Rivers, which was d manded for the Vellels belonging to the French Kings Subjects. From Strasburg they write, that notwithstanding the great preparations of the French towards Italy they continue on that he very apprehensive that the design is really against them. From Cologne they tell us, that the Popes Internuncio, the Emperors Commissioner, and the Bishop of Strasburg do joyn in their Endeavours for the compoling the Affairs of Liege.

Higue, Sept. 15. The Prince of Orange is still at Dieren, nor is it yet known when he will be back here. Prince Casimir, Stadtholder of Friesland has been in this Town several days, but intends now to seturn home very suddainly. From Germany we have an Account that the Dyct at Ratinbonne has finally agreed on the Quota's, or Proportions of Men to be raised by the several Circles, for the forming the Army of 40000 Men, which is to be kept on foot for the def nce of the Empire. the same time we are told that the French King has Declared, that he will most Religiously preserve the Barriere in Flanders; and as for the Dependencies, that he will pretend to nonebut what of right belong to him; and that he is going to employ his Arms towards Italy.

Paris, Sept. 13. The 8th Instant the Sieur Taborda, Envoye Extraordinary from th: Prince Regent of Portugal, had his first Audience of the King; there is a discourse as if difficulties might yet arise concerning the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy with the Infanta of Portugal, The Troops continue to march towards Italy; Monfieur de Louvoy is gone that way, to be present, as is said, at a general Rendezvous that is appointed to be held; In the mean time People make divers conjectures concerning the defigns of this Army; and some are of opinion, that notwithstanding these appearances, the King has not Several Petititaken his thoughts from Germany. ons have been Presented to the King on the behalf of the Protestants, who lye at present under such great hardthips and oppressions, but we do not hear

that they have had any good effect.

Paris, April 17. The last week one Baranton was broken upon the Wheel, being Cenvicted of High Treason, in being privy to a design against the Kings Person, Some days since were likewise executed two Persons, Condemned by the Chamber of Poysonings. The discourse is, that the Court will remove the beginning of the next Month to Chambor; but this alters not the opinion many have, that they shall suddainly hear of the Kings going towards It any or Germany, From Rome we have Advice, that the Pope has made a Promotion of fixteen Cardinals. The Duke of Orleans has been very ill.
