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Fienss, Sept. 7

OUr Letters from Oedenburg da nót yet bring the News we fo impatiently expect; of the Dyets having fetled the points of Religion, which is che great Materer before them; the Emperor continues athere, that he may, what lies in him, cons tribute to the accomplifhment of this great Work; while at the fome time all imaginable means, as may confilt with the Emperors Honor, are employed to difpofe Count Teckeley to an Accommodation, and in urder thereunto, to fend Deputies to the Dyet; and by his refifting the Overtures that have been made for that purpole, it fufficiently appears, that thole plaufible preacnces of Retigion and Liberiy, with which be and the other Heads of the Rebels bave deluded the-Commonalty into the miferies, as well as guilt of a Rebellion, are by them only made ufe of to cover their own reffels Spirits, and ambitious Defigns. A Turkifh Chiaus arrived here fome days fince, bas Etratu being ooly to compliin of fome Depredations chat have been made on the Frontiers; and we are told that an Ambaffador is coming hither from the Port to conirm the Peace.

Vienna, Sept, Ir. From Exumgary we have Advice that fome of the Emp rors Troops have fallen upon a confiderable party of the Rebels, and defeated them, killing 300 upon the place, and taking leveral Prifoners and two Standarts; The Letters add, that Count Teckeley was joyned with the Turks, and together nade an Army of 30000 Men.

Strasburg, Seft. 13. We are at preient pretty quiet in thefe parts, the French Troops being gone into theit Winter Quarters; and that we may be the more perfectly at eafe on this fide, the Erench give out, that their Kings defigns are cowards Italy; but at the fame time we canpot but take notice of the great Magazines they prowide in all their places in Lorrain and alface, and coptlude from thence, that they have likewife fome thoughts this way; we Should be glad to fee the like Provifion made bywhe Princes of the Emplte, and that the Army they have refolved to raife, was brought on foot, and put into firch a pofture, as that the Empire and its Meplbeis might, when there is eccafion, have ths heaj íc of it: Our lait Letters from Raticbonne tald us, khit the Colledge of the Electors and at at of the Pi i fig had fetled the Quota's or Proportions which eich Eirote was to contribate, and that they had Tent the Refolutign they had taker therein to the groperac ser his approbations.

Francfforts Septe 14; The Emperors Ambalfaidor Monficut sireerman tontihues at ${ }^{1}$ Hamau ${ }^{\dagger}$ and the Previch Ambafladorsht Hechet, the quefiom betweon them being, who thall come fither firlt, for that the laft comer is to hawe the firf Vifit, a point of HOnor which its feared may delay the Confirences appointed bethetd here.

Colugne, Sept. 16, It wats the general opinion here
that the Affairs of Liege were in a very fair way to an Accommodation, when our Elector received an' Account of frefh Holtilities committed by thofe of Liege upon fome of bis Troops, which fo offended his Electoral Highne's, that he would not fuffer his Minilters to proceed; however, it, is hoped that by the Interpofition of the Popes Nuncio and the Imperial Commidioner, things will be reftored to thei former flate. In the nean time we underfand. that two Regiments of the Bthop of Munflef's are marching tow'ards the weufe, and that they have Orders to joyn with the Troops of our Elector, and to obey factionders as they leallecceive fiom him ; fo that if the Treaty which is now managing be not fpeedily concluded, its to be feared things will come to extremities.

Eamburg, Sept, 16. The condition of the City of itiegdebry is pery deplorable, many dya, and fererat for yont of Relief, there being at prefent but ohe Phyfitian ${ }^{2}$ and ong Apothccary in the Town, and Provifions and other neceflaries fqr fuch as are fick; being very fcazce to bs had: It is faid that a bote One thoufand Inhapicants have dyed fince the Plagut broke out there, From Riga in Livonia we have Letfers which give an accounc, shat the States of that Dutchy were by the Kings appointment Affembled; but that the matter of sthe alienased Crown-Lands, did very mach perplexthens molt of the Gertlemen of that Countrey being poffelfed of very Congdicrable Eltares, which for their Services, the $\ddagger$ teceived from the Kifigs Predecofiors, and are vefy tinsinlling, after fo many years enjoyment thereof, to part with now; and fome Letters add, That they had poficively Declared theywoukd notes ITbe Heer $d^{s}$ Ameremges is come hither from Berlin, where ho has refided fome tímę as Envoye Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Previnges, and is alday or two will part fromhenceagain on his retarn home.
Eaguc. sept.19. A Motion, as we are to 酸' wasforte days fince made-jo the Aitembly of the States of Holland, that the Deppoties of thit Province in the siatej-Genetrala patle tropose the toveting of a Letter to the French King in favon of hisfretreftant Subjects, whith lay at prefent dinder for fevere a Ircatment; but wie do not hear what was done uponit. Thd Statiss-Genetal hivìuters wéare informed, refolved to demolifh the Fortifications of \$apoll, and tere renrove thd Gdiffor thateris at prefent therg, to Brewoont, ds isthe genctid difcourfo that the Prince of axauge is to have a Coriference with the Prince of Parme, Governor of the $\$$ pamifts Netberlands; and that his Highnets will likewify foe the Princes of Luwenduig before he rectirn thther.
