Vienna, Sept. 7.

Ur Letters from Oedenburg do not yet bring the News we so impatiently expect; of the Dyets having fetled the points of Religion, which is the great Matter before them; the Emperor continues there, that he may, what lies in him, contribute to the accomplishment of this great Work; while at the same time all imaginable means, as may confift with the Emperors Honor, are employed to dispose Count Teckeley to an Accommodation, and in order thereunto, to send Deputies to the Dyet; and by his relisting the Overtures that have been made for that purpose, it sufficiently appears, that those plausible presences of Religion and Liberty, with which he and the other Heads of the Rebels have deluded the Commonalty into the miseries, as well as guilt of a Rebellion, are by them only made use of to cover their own reffless Spirits, and ambitious Deligns. A Turkish Chians arrived here some days fince, his Breatd being only to complain of some Depredations that have been made on the Frontiers; and we are told that an Ambassador is coming hither from the Port to confirm the Peace.

Vienna, Sept. 1x. From Hungary we have Advice that some of the Emp rors Troops have fallen upon a confiderable party of the Rebels, and defeated them, killing 300 upon the place, and taking several Prisoners and two Standarts: The Letters add, that Count Teckeley was joyned with the Turks, and to-

gether made an Army of 30000 Men.
Strasburg, Sept. 13. We are at present presty quiet in these parts, the French Troops being gone into their Winter Quarters; and that we may be the more perfectly at ease on this side, the French give out, that their Kings designs are towards Italy; but at the same time we cannot but take notice of the great Magazines they provide in all their places in Lorrain and Alface, and conclude from thence, that they have likewife from thoughts this way; we should be glad to see the like Provision made by the Princes of the Empire, and that the Army they have resolved to raise, was brought on soot, and put in-to such a posture, as that the Empire and its Men-bers might, when there is occasion, have the benefit of it : Our lait Letters from Rasubonne told us, Rhat the Colledge of the Electors and il at of the Prings had settled the Quota's or Proportions which the Circle was to contribute, and that they had sent the Resolution they had taken therein to the Emparocfor his approbation.

Francfort, Sept. 14. The Emperors Ambassador Monsteut Streeman continues at Hanau, and the Prench Ambassadors at Hochst, the question between them being, who shall come hither first, for that the last comer is to have the first Visit, a point of Honor which its feared may delay the Confirences ap-

pointed to be held here,

Coligne, Sept. 16. It was the general opinion here

that the Affairs of Liege were in a very fair way to an Accommodation, when our Elector received an' Account of fresh Hostilities committed by those of Liege upon some of his Troops, which so offended his Electoral Highness, that he would not suffer his Ministers to proceed; however, it is hoped that by the Interpolition of the Popes Nuncio and the Imperial Commissioner, things will be restored to their former state. In the mean time we understand, that two Regiments of the Bilhop of Munster's are marching towards the Meuse, and that they have Orders to joyn with the Troops of our Elector, and to obey sheh Orders as they skall receive from him; so that if the Treaty which is now managing be not speedily concluded, its to be feared things will come to extremities.

Hamburg, Sept. 16. The condition of the City of Miegleburg is very deplorable, many dyo, and leveral for want of Relief, there being at present but one Physician, and one Apothecary in the Town, and Provisions and other necessaries for such as are fick; being very scarce to be had: It is said that above One thousand Inhabitants have dyed fince the Plague broke out there, From Riga in Livenia we have Letters which give an account, that the States of that Dutchy were by the Kings appointment Affembled; but that the matter of the alienated Crown-Lands, did very much perplex them; most of the Gentlemen of that Countrey being possessed of very confiderable Ellaces, which for their Services, they received from the Kings Predecoffors, and are very unwilling, after fo many years enjoyment thereof, to part with now; and some Letters add, That they had positively Declared shey would note The Heer d'Amerengen is come hither from Berlin, where he has relided some time as Envoye Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, and in alday or two will part from hence again on his return home.

Hague, Sept. 19. A Motion, as we are tolds wassome days fince made in the Assembly of the States of Holland, that the Deputies of this Province in the States-General, thould propole the writing of a Letter to the French King, in favor of his Protestant Subjects, which lay at present under so fevere a Treatment; but we do not hear what was done upon it. The States-General have, as we are informed, resolved to demolish the Fortifications of Finell, and to remove the Carrifor that is at pre-fent there, to Brewoont, Is is the general discourse that the Prince of arange is to have a Conference with the Prince of Parma, Governor of the SpanishNetherlands; and that his Highness will likewife see
the Princes of Lunenhurg before he return hither.
