latter, under Protection of the Iris, to land at a Spot agreed upon with Pastor, remaining here myself until I have adjusted the Claims of several Spaniards respecting their Vessels.

I have the Satisfaction to state, that Yesterday a small Division of 50 Men, dispatched from Bilboa to succour the Garrison, approached the Town, and were met by the Advanced Guerilla Guard, of triffing numerical Superiority, and immediately put to Flight: some few of the Enemy were killed, though only One Prisoner was brought in, who owes his Life to his having fallen into the Hands of a Guerilla Recruit.

I have only to add, that the most perfect Cordiality prevailed among our Men and the Spaniards; that no Loss whatever was sustained by us; and that the steady Conduct of Lieutenant Cupples, the Officers, and Royal Marines, would have decided the Business of the Day, had the Enemy given them the Meeting; and I feel considerable Obligation to my First Lieutenant O'Reilly, and the Officers and Crews of both Ships.
