A LETTER, of which the inclosed is an Extract, has been received from Colonel Green, employed on a particular Service in Cataloniá, dated Head-Quarters, Calaf, 9th October 1811.

I AM happy in having the Honour to inform your Lordship, that there now appears to be a very increased Degree of Activity and much Success; in the Re-arming of this Principality.

The Army is increasing very fast; nearly Six Hundred Deserters have presented themselves in Five Days.

The Battalions of Reserve, which are composed of married Men, and others which are exempted from Service in the Army, are becoming disciplined and numerous; and the small Patriotic Parties are daily intercepting the little Detachments of the Enemy, evincing remarkable Instances of Valour, and proving a severe Check to the Communications of the Enemy, which they themselves complain of in desponding Terms.

On the 4th Instant, General Lacy put himself at the Head of Two Thousand Infantry, and Five Hundred Cavalry, and in the Night surprised the Town of Iqualada, he leading the Cavalry, and upon being challenged by the Centinel "Qui vive," answered "France," and rushed upon the Advanced Post, which he destroyed, and galloped into the Town, where he killed upwards of One Hundred and Fifty Men, made a few Prisoners, and took some Stores and the Equipage of the General and the Officers, the former being obliged to escape in his Shirt to the Capuchin Convent, which had been previously fortified, and where the principal Part of the Troops were quartered, but

which requiring Cannon to reduce, General Lacy left till he could receive Guns from Cardona, and retired to this Town, meditating an Expedition upon Cervera.

On the 7th Instant, a small Force was detached, under the Orders of the Baron Eroles, to intercept a Convoy near Torba, which was done with complete Success, the Baron taking the whole, consisting of Four Hundred Mules loaded with Corn, Five Hundred Goats, and other very necessary Articles of the Commissariat, completely routing the Three Hundred Men composing the Escort, and dispersing Three Hundred more and Fifty Horse, which had moved rapidly from Iqualada to support the former.

I have the Satisfaction also to state to your Lordship, that since General Suchet has left the Lower Catalonia, the Partidas Patrioticas and Somatenes have killed and wounded, even by the French Account, upwards of Fifteen Hundred Men.

The Proportion the Enemy has lost in Upper Catalonia, since the Fall of Figueras, has not been so considerable; but what contributes very much in favour of the Principality at this moment, is, the Sickness which prevails in the Army of Macdonald, who has upwards of Three Thousand Men sick from Tertian-Fevers.

P.S. I have the Satisfaction to inform your Lordship, that I have just received Intelligence of the Enemy's having evacuated Iqualada; and I have also received a Letter from the Baron Eroles, stating that he is now blockading a Detachment of the French which are fortified in the College of Cervera, the Capture of which will give into the Hands of



Catalans a large Depôt of Corn; will destroy all Communication between Barcelona and Lerida, and open the most important Roads to the Spaniards, tending again to restrict the Enemy entirely to the Limits of his Garrisons, which, if not reinforced, will be in a precarious State, as Suchet has nearly drained those of Lower Catalonia, to increase his Force operating in the Kingdom of Valencia.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is an Extract, has been this Day received at Lord Liverpool's Office, addressed to His Lordship by General Viscount Wellington, dated Frenada, 13th November 1811.

BY the Accounts which I have received from Cadiz, of the 29th October, it appears that the Enemy had retired from Algesiras and Saint Roque on the Night of the 21st of October. General Ballesteros had pursued their Rear Guard, against which he had some Success.

Colonel Skerrett conducted with great Judgment the Detachment of British Troops, of which he had the Command at Tarifa, and his Movements towards the Enemy's Communications must have shewn them the Impracticability of remaining in the Position which they had taken.

It appears that the Country on both Banks of the Tagus as far up as Aranjuez, has been made over by the Emperor to Marshal Marmont for the Support of the Army of Portugal. This Arrangement has reduced Joseph Buonaparte to the greatest Distress, as the Produce of that Country was all that he had to depend upon, and he was actually subsisting upon the Money produced by the retail Sale of the Grain forcibly levied from the People.

This Grain, having been thus levied and sold by Joseph, has been seized again by Marmont's Orders, and taken from the People, who had purchased it from Joseph's Magazines, who have been informed that the King had no Right to sell it.

Extract of a Letter from the Honourable Rear-Admiral Legge to John Wilson Croker, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship the Revenge, in Cadiz Bay, the 15th November 1811.

THE British Forces under Colonel Skerrett still continue at or near Tarifa. General Ballasteros, on the 5th Instant, surprised a Corps

of the Enemy under General Semelie, between Bornos and Xeres, taking upwards of One Hundred Prisoners, with all their Baggage and Mules, and leaving many dead on the Field of Battle.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them; And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-Maker, Watch-Maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment

or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes, or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in Eng-

land, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacture, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board; and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety

to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in Warehouse without Payment of Duty," it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed marked (A), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant, in any Warehouse or Warehouses situated at the Isle of Dogs, and belonging to the West India Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs or Excise due on the Importation thereof, subject nevertheless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions directed by the said Act; provided always, that no such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize shall be so lodged or secured, unless and until such Warehouses and other Works belonging or to belong thereto shall be so far completed, that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper in every Respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and wherein the same may respectively be safely and securely deposited and remain, under the Regulations and Directions of this Act: And it is further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of the said Act should be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerated or described in either of the Tables annexed thereto, and should cause a List of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act shall extend to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize,

in every Respect in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Tables respectively at the Time of passing the said Act:

We the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the Powers vested in us in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us to be expedient that the Provisions of the Act should be extended to Roco or Annatto, legally imported or brought into the Port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such Roco or Annatto should be added to the List of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize enumerated and described in the Table annexed to the said recited Act marked (A); and that such Roco or Annatto should be lodged and secured at or in such Places as aforesaid under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act: And we do further declare, that from and after the Publication of this our Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the said Act, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such Roco or Annatto, in every Respect in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the Table annexed to the said Act marked (A) at the Time of the passing the same Act.

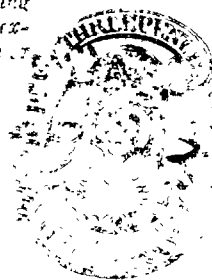
