*Copy of a Letter from Captain Taylor, of His Majesty's Ship Apollo, addressed to Vice-Admiral Sir Edward Pellew, Bart. Commander in Chief in the Mediterranean, and transmitted by the latter to John Wilson Croker, Esq.*

*His Majesty's Ship Apollo, off Cape Mola, November 16, 1811.*

SIR,  
LAST night, Cape Mola bearing N. E. one hundred miles, after a chase of nine hours, we captured the Edouard French privateer, pierced for fourteen guns, had only six mounted, four of which were thrown overboard, a crew of one hundred and twenty-three men, and commanded by Jean F. Mordeille, a Knight of their empire; who, in former vessels, has been a very successful cruiser against our trade.

The privateer is eight days from Marseilles, quite new, copper-bottomed and fastened; had made no captures, but appears to sail remarkably fast.
