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Vienna, Octob. 9.

THE Emperor has ordered 6000 Men, that are quartered about *Oedenburg*, to march towards the *Upper Hungary*, for that the Rebels increase very much in strength and are now able to act in two Bodies; with the one they besiege *Calo*, and batter it with 18 pieces of Cannon. The Dyct at *Oedenburg* is to end the 18th Instant.

Liege, Octob. 11. The Deputies which our Magistrates had sent to *Cologne*, to endeavour to compose the differences between his Electoral Highness and this City, returned hither several days agoe, and have made report of what they had done. Since an Express sent by the Imperial Commissioner arrived here; and brought a Letter written by the Pope's Nuncio; and the said Imperial Commissioner, to our Magistrates, wherein they give them an Account, That being very desirous to prevent the ill consequences which these misunderstandings between their Prince and them may at last have, they were; notwithstanding the ill success they had hitherto had, resolved to continue their Endeavours, in order to an Accommodation, and that for that purpose, they had been in Conference with the Electors Ministers, and had with them agreed on four Preliminary Articles; which in case this City did consent to, they doubted not so to order Matters, as that all other points in difference should be adjusted to mutual satisfaction: Whereupon our Magistrates have had several Meetings to consider of the said Articles; which are, That this City shall acknowledge his Electoral Highness as their Sovereign Prince, and shall pray his Pardon for what they have offended him in. That all Hostilities shall cease. That all Prisoners shall be released; and that all that's past shall be forgotten. And it's said that they will agree to them, and have accordingly resolved to return the Express with an Answer to the Imperial Commissioners Letter.

Frankfort, Octob. 12. On Wednesday last the Count de *Rosenberg*, the first of the Imperial Plenipotentiaries for the Conferences that are to be held here, arrived at *Hannov*, and we expect his Excellency in this City in few days; as likewise the French Ambassadors, and the other Ministers that are to assist at the said Conferences. Our Letters from *Ratisbonne* tell us, That the States Assembled there, have since the taking of *Strasbourg*, wholly applied themselves for the settling the Points that yet remain undetermined, concerning the Raising and the Maintaining the Army, they some time since resolved to keep on foot for the defence of the Empire; and that the Duke of *Hollstein Ploen*; and Count *Waldeck* were proposed to be Generals of the said Army.

Hamburg, Octob. 14. The King of *Denmark* is returned to *Copenhagen*. And from *Berlin* we have an Account, that both the Imperial and French Ministers had had several Audiences of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, upon the present conjuncture of Affairs;

The First pressing his Electoral Highness to take such measures as are necessary for the preservation of the Peace of the Empire; and the Latter, endeavouring to satisfy his Electoral Highness; that the King his Master has not any intentions to disturb it. We are told that the Duke of *Zell* is about forming a Body of 10000 Men, which he will have in a readiness to march, as there shall be occasion, for the defence of the Empire.

Ghent, Octob. 14. One *Louis Pickar*, formerly a Captain of Dragoons in *Holland*, who is accused of having committed several Murders, and other heinous crimes in the Province of *Utrecht*; having at the desire of the States-General been seized in this City, (whither he was fled,) by order of the Prince of *Parma*, and committed prisoner to the Castle; and his Highness having Commanded; that he should be put into the hands of the *Fiscael* of *Utrecht*, pursuant to the Directions he had received from *Spain*, the same was executed yesterday; but the said *Pickar* had not been long in the custody of the *Fiscael*, who was carrying him away in a Coach, when he was rescued by a number of Armed Men, and made his escape.

Brussels, Octob. 15. We have an account from *Lille*, and several other places, of the Motions of the French Troops, which does not a little allarm us, and the Countrey-People, who know what it is to have their company, and are therefore affrighted at every report of their March, beginning already in some places to remove their Cattle, &c. though we hope they have no reason for it. There are Letters from *Strasbourg* which say, that the King would be at *Schlestadt* the 12th Instant, where it was believed he would stay a day or two, and that he was not expected at *Strasbourg* till the 18th or 20th Instant.

Hague, Octob. 17. The States-General, as we are told, have ordered the Heer *Van Amerongen* to return forthwith to *Berlin*, thinking it necessary to have a Minister at that Court in this Conjuncture; We have an account from *Amesvoort*, that the Princess of *Orange* passed through that place yesterday on her return from *Aix la Chapelle*. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland* have published a Placast, by which they Declare, that all such Protestants as shall seek Protection and Shelter in this Province, shall for twelve years be exempted from all extraordinary Taxes, which shall be raised.

 Gracious Government; and for your great Condescension
 (after the timely Dissolution of the two last Parliaments)
 in publishing your late Gracious Declaration, touching
 the Causes and Reasons that moved your Majesty
 therunto; As also for your Royal Resolutions therein
 Declared, That you will unalterably Govern by the Estab-
 lished Laws, and make them not only the Rule of your
 own Sovereignty, but that you will indispensably prefer
 them to all others, as their Rule also, thereby securing your
 People from the Arbitrary and Irregular Proceedings of
 their Fellow-Subjects, of what quality soever they be.
 We do also heartily and joyfully acknowledge to your
 Majesty, that notwithstanding the cunning and malici-
 ous insinuations of evil Men; and the incessant clamour
 and noise they have made for Religion, Liberty, and Pro-
 perty; it is by your Majesties special Wisdom, Care and Cou-
 rage (under God) that all these are yet secured, and
 against the secret frauds, and more open practices and vi-
 olence of those who would once again enslave us under
 the specious pretext of greater Liberty; and that we are
 hitherto preserved from being again involved in our former
 or (if possible) greater miseries, which we are
 sensible have been all along endeavoured with all imagi-
 nable Art and Industry, by Men of the same disloyal
 Principles, and by the same treacherous and undermining
 Practices and Artifices, by which your Majesties three
 Kingdoms were so lately brought into Anarchy and Con-
 fusion.

Thus obliged, most Gracious Sovereign, by all the
 ties of Allegiance, Duty and Gratitude; We do humbly
 beg leave to Declare to Your Majesty, and the whole
 World; that we will with Constancy, Faithfulness, and
 Resolution, defend your Sacred Person, your Govern-
 ment in Church and State, as now by Law established,
 your Royal Prerogative, and your lawful Heirs and Suc-
 cessors, with the utmost expence of our Blood and For-
 tunes, against all opposition, either from Papists or Pres-
 byterians, and their factious Adherents, of what perswa-
 sion soever they be. Praying that all your Enemies may
 be Subjects under your Royal Feet; That your Majesties
 Reign over us may be long, Prosperous, and Glorious; and
 that the Imperial Crown of these Realms may be con-
 tinued to your Heirs and Successors in a right Line af-
 ter you, until Time and humane Government shall be no
 more.
