Sir Edward Pellew has also transmitted a letter f from Captain Manley, of His Majesty's sloop the Badger, giving an account of the destruction of the Countess d'Emericau French privateer, of eleven guns and one hundred and ten men: she upset when in the act of hauling her wind in action with the Badger, and only fourteen of her crew, including the commander, could be saved by the sloop's cutter, the gig and jolly-boat having been shot through.
