#### Cologne, Oflob. 21.

E are not yet freed of our Apprehensions of the Defigns of the French upon this City; but it is some comfort to us to hear, that the Princes of the Circle of Weftphalia are form-

ing an Army, which they will find to the *Rbine*. The Magifirates of *Liege* having agreed to the four preliminary Articles that were propoled to them; we expect they will accordingly fend Deputies hither to make their fubmifion to his Electoral Highnels. From *Swifferland* they write, that the Cantons upon the news they had of the taking of *Strasbourg*, immediately Affembled, to confider what measures to take in fo great a Conjuncture; and that they had refolved to find Deputies to Compliment the French King upon his arrival in *Alface*.

Hamburg, Odob 21. The Dukes of Lunenburg are drawing their Forces together, and accordingly they are now marching to the place appointed for their Rendezvous; from whence it is faid, they will march towards the *Rbine*, for the fecurity of the Princes and Seates of the Empire on that fide. We are told likewise that the Elector of Saxony is going to raife Men, in order to the having a confiderable Army on foot. From Berlin they write, that the Imperial Minifter did very much prefs the Blector of Brandenburg to entep into a League with the Emperor, and other Princes, for the defence of the Empire; and that it was believed his Electoral Highnefs, who was very much concerned at the lofs of Strasbourg, would come very fpeedily to a refolution in that Matter, to the faid Minifters fatisfaction. Yelterday the Electorefs Palatine, and the Electorefs of Saxony, who have been in Denmark, arria ved at Altena.

Higue, Oldob. 24. The Prince and Princefs of Orange are now at SociAdyke, and are not expected here till the beginning of the next Month, against the meeting of the States of Holland. The Heer d'Amerongen has received his Dispatches, in order to his reduce to Berlin, and is gone to wait upon his Highnels at SociAdyke, before he begins his Journey. The Heer Starenberg, Ambaffador from thisState in Erance, who lately arrived here, is ordered to return thither forthwith; and befides, the States have resolved to fend the Heer Van Beverning, one of their Ambaffatlors at the Treaty at Nimeguen, to the French King, in Quality of their Envoye Extraordinaty, on occasion of the prefent Conjuncture. We are told that a Treaty of Alliance will be fuddainly concluded beween the Crown of Sweden and this State; though the French Ambaffador does all he can to hinder it. Prince Cafimir of Nalfau, Stadtholder, of FriefLund and Groningen, has been in the Council of State, and taken his place there.

State, and taken his place there. Paris, Oftob. 15. The Letters we receive from Alfuse, give us the following Account of the King's Journey. The 6th Inflant their Majeflies parted from Virry le Francois, and the fame day arrived at Barledue; the th they came to Void, the Sthro Germinay, the 9th to Bayon, the 10th to Rambervillers, where they flaid a day 3 the 13th they arrived at

St. Die, the 13th at St. Marie-aux-Mines, and the 14th at Schleftadt, whither the Magilirates of Strasbourg came to make their fubmission to the King, which they did upon their Knees; The 1,5th their Majefties went from thence to Brifac, and the 17th to Fribourg, and returned again the 18th to Brifac; the ight their Majeflies went to Enfifteim, where the King gave Audience to the Deputies of the Smiffe-Cantony, who came to Compliment his Majefly upon his arrival in their neighborhood. The 20th the King went to vifit Huningen, and returned the fame day to Englisheim, from whence their Majeftics parted the 21 for Strasbourg, where great preparations were making for their Reception.From Breft we have an Account, that the Chevalier de Chajteau Renaut, who had been cruifing against the Coriairs of Sally, was returned into that Port, with his squadron of four Men af War; and that on the 15th, the Ambalfador which the King of Fez fends hither, arrived there in one of our King's Ships, Commanded by the Marquis de la Barre. From Turin they write, that the Duke of Savoy had named the Officers that are to attend him to Portugal, when he goos to com-
