HIS Royal Highness having been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to deliver the custody of the seals of the duchy and county palatine of Lancaster to the Right Honourable Charles Bathurst, the oath of Chancellor of the said duchy was, this day, by His Royal Highness's command, administered to him accordingly.

AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 23d of June 1812,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased to declare, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, on the 21st day of April 1812, "That if at any time hereafter the Berlin and Milan Decrees shall, by some authentic act of the French Government, publicly promulgated, be absolutely and unconditionally repealed, then and from thenceforth the Order in Council of the 7th of January 1807, and the Order in Council of the 26th of April 1809, shall, without any further Order, be, and the same are hereby declared from thenceforth to be, wholly and absolutely revoked:"

And whereas the *Chargé des Affaires* of the United States of America, Resident at this Court, did, on the 20th day of May last, transmit to Lord Vis-

count Castlereagh, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, a Copy of a certain Instrument, then for the first time communicated to this Court, purporting to be a Decree passed by the Government of France, on the 28th day of April 1811, by which the Decrees of Berlin and Milan are declared to be definitively no longer in force, in regard to American vessels.

And whereas His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, although he cannot consider the tenor of the said Instrument as satisfying the conditions set forth in the said Order of the 21st of April last, upon which the said Orders were to cease and determine, is nevertheless disposed on his part to take such measures as may tend to re-establish the intercourse between Neutral and Belligerent Nations, upon its accustomed principles—His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, is therefore pleased, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that the Order in Council bearing date the 7th day of January 1807, and the Order in Council bearing date the 26th day of April 1809, be revoked, so far as may regard American vessels, and their cargoes being American property, from the 1st day of August next.

But whereas by certain Acts of the Government of the United States of America, all British armed vessels are excluded from the harbours and waters of the said United States, the armed vessels of France being permitted to enter therein; and the commercial intercourse between Great Britain and the said United States is interdicted, the commercial intercourse between France and the said United States having been restored; His Royal Highness the Prince



Regent is pleased hereby further to declare, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that if the Government of the said United States shall not, as soon as may be, after this Order shall have been duly notified by His Majesty's Minister in America to the said Government, revoke, or cause to be revoked, the said Acts, this present Order shall in that case, after due notice signified by His Majesty's Minister in America to the said Government, be thenceforth null and of no effect.

It is further ordered and declared, that all American vessels, and their cargoes being American property, that shall have been captured subsequently to the 20th day of May last, for a breach of the aforesaid Orders in Council alone, and which shall not have been actually condemned before the date of this Order; and that all Ships and Cargoes as aforesaid, that shall henceforth be captured under the said Orders, prior to the 1st day of August next, shall not be proceeded against to condemnation till further orders, but shall, in the event of this Order not becoming null and of no effect, in the case aforesaid, be forthwith liberated and restored, subject to such reasonable expenses on the part of the captors as shall have been justly incurred.

Provided that nothing in this Order contained, respecting the Revocation of the Orders herein mentioned, shall be taken to revive wholly or in part the Orders in Council of the 11th of November 1807, or any other Order not herein mentioned, or to deprive Parties of any legal remedy to which they may be entitled under the Order in Council of the 21st of April 1812.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is hereby pleased further to declare, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that nothing in this present Order contained, shall be understood to preclude His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, if circumstances shall so require, from restoring, after reasonable notice, the Orders of the 7th of January 1807, and 26th of April 1809, or any part thereof, to their full effect, or from taking such other measures of retaliation against the Enemy, as may appear to His Royal Highness to be just and necessary.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies;" it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by order or orders to be issued and published from time to time, to authorise, or by warrant or warrants under his sign manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being, to authorise in case of necessity the importation into Newfoundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the said United States for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing season only; provided always, that such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported, except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and restrictions, as shall be specified in such order or orders, warrant or warrants respectively, and except by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law.

And whereas it is expedient and necessary, that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season, with bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, and also pitch, tar, and turpentine; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent doth thereupon, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing season only, bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, and also pitch, tar, and turpentine, may be imported into the said island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according

to law, and which within the space of nine months previous to the time of such importation, have cleared out from some port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty's dominions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorised in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein-after mentioned; which licence shall continue and be in force for nine calendar months from the day of the date upon which such licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such licence as aforesaid, granted after the thirtieth day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: And His Royal Highness is hereby further pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the master or person having the charge or command of any ship or vessel to whom such licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the said ship or vessel at the port, harbour, or place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, pitch, tar, and turpentine, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, pitch, tar, and turpentine, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master or person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel, of his having received the said licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such licence was granted. *Jas. Buller.*

Now be it known, that the said [person's name] hath a licence to lade on board the said ship, [ship's name] at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, and also pitch, tar, and turpentine, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatsoever; and to carry the said bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, pitch, tar, and turpentine, to some port or place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the said ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, pitch, tar, and turpentine, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

To all such lawless and frantic acts we pledge ourselves to oppose our utmost influence, by enforcing the laws of our country, and by endeavouring to promote the good order of society around us.

In this frank and dutiful expression of our sentiments, we trust your Royal Highness will discern the characteristic zeal and loyalty of the inhabitants of this part of your principality, our ardent attachment to our revered Monarch, and our desire, in some small degree, to alleviate the cares resulting from the important charge of government, which your Royal Highness, in the name, and on the behalf of His Majesty, has so prudently administered.

WE, the Bishop, Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, Archdeacons and Clergy of the Diocese of Salisbury, beg leave to convey to your Royal Highness, the strongest assurances of our attachment to your person and family, and of our sincere condolence on the late assassination of the Right Honourable Spencer Perceval, which, at a most critical juncture of public affairs, has deprived your Royal Highness of an upright Minister, and the country of one of its brightest examples of public and private virtue.

Whilst however we cannot express in adequate terms of horror and indignation, our sense of this foul and atrocious murder, we derive a melancholy satisfaction from reflecting, that it has been proved to be the solitary act of an individual, unconnected with any sanguinary system of insurrection; which would not only have endangered the peace and happiness of this Kingdom, but have cast an indelible stain on our national character.

As Ministers of Religion, we should be culpably remiss in the discharge of our professional duties, if we did not strenuously exert ourselves to counteract the mischievous designs of those who have converted the pressure of scarcity and the suspension of commerce into the means of stimulating the manufacturing classes, in some districts, to acts of violence and outrage, not only reproachful to good government, but disgraceful to humanity itself.

We contemplate, not without serious apprehension, the dangers with which we are menaced, whe-

ther they arise from the gigantic power of our foreign enemy, or the secret machinations of domestic traitors, but we rest with humble confidence on the Supreme Disposer of all events, our hopes of ultimate security.—And we firmly trust, that, under his continued protection, your Royal Highness's Councils will be characterized by that energy and decision, which are best calculated to allay internal turbulence, and by a steady perseverance in those measures of vigour and enterprise, by which alone this arduous contest for the rights and independence of our country, can be brought to an honourable and successful termination.
