At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden for the City of London, at the Guildhall, within the said City, on Monday the 29th day of June in the Fifty-second Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, before Claudius Stephen Hunter, Esq; Mayor of the City of London, Harvey Christian Coombe, Esq. Sir James Shaw, Baronet, Sir William Leighton, Knt. Thomas Smith, Esq. Aldermen of the said City, John Silvester, Esq. Recorder of the said City, George Scholey, Esq. Samuel Goodbehere, Esq.
