Prince Casimir, Stadtholder of Friesland and Groningen, absts constantly in the Council of State, since his taking his place in it, which he did the last week.

Paris, Octob. 31. Our Letters from Court tell us, That the 19th Instant, the King gave Audience at Erfshheim, to 30 Deputies from the Swisse Cantons; Upon their first arrival, they were Complimented by the Master of the Cerimonies, and afterwards in the King's Name, by the Marechal de Belfonds, and the Marquess d'Angeau; and when they were brought to the King, he received them with great Kindness, and took them all by the Hand. That the 23 about three a Clock after Dinner, the King, Queen, the Dauphin, the Dauphiness, the Duke and Dutches of Orleans, being all in one Coach, arrived at Strasburg: Without the Gates of the Town, the Marquess de Chamilly, the Governor, presented to his Majesty the Magistrates in a Body, who delivered to the King the Keys of the City, and made their Submissions to him. The Deputies of the Clergy have had several Meetings, and have made choice of the Arch-Bishops of Rheims, and of Paris, to be Presidents of their Assembly.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Grand Jury of the County of Glamorgan, at the Great Sessions held at Cardiff, the third day of October, Anno Dom. 1681.

As we Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, Deputy-Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace, Officers of the Militia, and other Freeholders of this County, have endeavoured in our former Addresses to your Majesty, to evidence the deep sense we then had of the great Blessings enjoyed under your most Excellent Government, and that ample assurance Your Majesty was pleased to add to the Confirmation of what we your Loyal Subjects always firmly believed; those grand Encouragements to Loyalty and Duty expressed in your late most Gracious Declaration: So we now serving your Majesty under different circumstances, cease not to conclude our selves bound both by the Laws of Gratitude and Obligation of Mankind to the continuation of such our acknowledgments, that the World may every day be more sensible of the Liberty we enjoy. Whilst free from Arbitrary Power in the Prince, and the more fatal Exercise of it in our fellow Subjects; we happily live by the means of the best and truest of Protestant Monarchs, secured from the Savage rage of a Spanish Inquisition; and the rigid severity of Geneva Reformers: we have justice so impartially administered, that neither the Guilty or Innocent have any just cause of Complaint. Wherefore we are unwilling to omit any opportunity of shewing our just Acknowledgments; but shall always look upon our selves in a ready and due Allegiance bound, and do faithfully and unanimously resolve to stand by Your Sacred Majesty, your Heirs and lawful Successors, with our Lives and Fortunes, in the Defence and Preservation of your Person

and Government, as it is now by Law established, both in Church and State, against any Opposition whatsoever; desiring nothing more than to live Dutiful Subjects, under your best of Governments, and dye true Sons of the exalted of all Reformed Churches, the present Church of England; till then to evince our selves,
