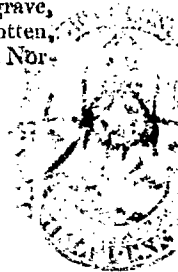

**W**HEREAS by an act, passed in the forty-eighth year of His Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act for further continuing, until three months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, an act made in the forty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for permitting the importation into Great Britain of hides and other articles in foreign ships," it is enacted that an act, made in the forty-fourth year of His present Majesty, intitled "An Act for permitting, until the fifth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and five, the importation of hides, calf-skins, horns, tallow, and wool (except cotton wool), in foreign ships, on payment of the like duties as if imported in British or Irish ships;" which by an act, made in the forty-fifth year of His present Majesty, was revived and further continued until the twenty-fifth day of March One thousand eight hundred and six, and

extended to goat-skins imported in foreign ships; and which was further continued by an act made in the forty-seventh year of his present Majesty, until the twenty-fifth day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight, should be and the same was, thereby further continued until three months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace: And whereas by the said acts it is lawful for His Majesty, by his Order in Council from time to time, when and as often as it may be judged expedient, to permit any hides; pieces of hides, dressed or undressed calf-skins, or pieces of calf-skins dressed or undressed, horns or pieces of horns, tallow, and wool (except cotton wool), and also goat-skins, to be imported in any foreign ship or vessel, and to be admitted to entry in any port or place in the United Kingdom, on payment of such and the like duties of customs and excise as are due and payable on the like goods when imported in any British or Irish-built ship or vessel; any thing contained in any act to the contrary notwithstanding: His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's privy council, is thereupon pleased, in pursuance of the powers vested in His Majesty by the said above-recited act, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the space of six months, from the eighth day of August next, the importation of hides, or pieces of hides, dressed or undressed calf-skins, or pieces of calf-skins, dressed or undressed horns or pieces of horns, tallow, and wool (except cotton wool), and also of goat-skins, dressed or undressed, in any foreign ship or vessel, from any port from which the British flag is excluded; and that on the arrival at any port of the United Kingdom of any foreign ship or vessel, from any port from which the British flag is excluded, with any of the articles abovementioned, the said goods shall be admitted to entry on payment of the same duties of customs and excise as are due and payable on the like goods when imported in any British or Irish-built ship or vessel:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the sixth day of January last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the eighth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-Gene-

ral of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the said eighth day of August next,) presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition," and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HEREAS in virtue of powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the forty-first year of His reign, cap. 103, which Act was, by two other Acts, viz. forty-third Geo. 3, cap. 12, and forty-fourth Geo. 3, cap. 4, further continued until six months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing date the seventh day of January one thousand eight hundred and seven, to make certain regulations for the trade and commerce to and from the isle of Malta:

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations for the said trade and commerce should now be made;

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to revoke the said Order in Council of the seventh day of January one thousand eight hundred and seven, so far as relates to the trade and commerce carried on between the ports of the United Kingdom and the said isle of Malta, and its dependencies:

Provided nevertheless, that the revocation of the said Order in Council of the seventh day of January one thousand eight hundred and seven, shall not be taken to revive any former Order of Council relating to the trade and commerce of Malta, which had been revoked by the said Order.

And His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is further pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of August next, no goods or commodities whatsoever shall be exported from any port of the United Kingdom to the said isle of Malta, or its dependencies, in any other than British ships or vessels, owned, navigated, and registered according to law, or in vessels condemned as lawful prize in the isle of Malta, and registered as the law directs, and navigated by one-fourth of British or Maltese subjects, or natives of the said isle or its dependencies; and in like manner that, from and after the first day of October next, no goods or commodities whatsoever shall be exported from the said isle of Malta, or its dependencies, to any port of the United Kingdom, in any other than British ships or vessels, owned, navigated, and registered according to law, or in ships or vessels condemned as lawful prize in the isle of Malta, and registered as the law directs, and navigated by one-fourth of British or Maltese subjects, or natives of the said isle or its dependencies, or in any ship or vessel belonging to any person or persons whatsoever, and of whatsoever description, and however navigated, to which His Majesty may be graciously pleased to grant His royal licence or authority for that purpose.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them shall respectively appertain.

**W**HEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the sixth day of January last, prohibiting, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, the transporting into any parts out of this Kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, or other naval stores, will expire upon the eighth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever do at any time, for the space of six months from the said eighth day of August next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores,

or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or to any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel, during the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, white and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, tarpaulins for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being

entered into by the merchant exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments within the same season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chetwynd.*

*Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, Bart. K.B. &c. to John Wilson Croker, Esq. dated on board His Majesty's Ship Victory, in Hawke Road, 5th August 1812.*

**H**EREWITH I have the honour to enclose, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a letter I have received from Rear-Admiral Martin, dated Riga, the 25th ult. transmitting the accompanying official paper, giving an account of a spirited attack by Prince Bagration on a large body of the enemy's cavalry, which were completely routed, and one thousand men made prisoners.

*Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Martin to Vice-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, dated at Riga, the 25th July, 1812.*

THIS instant, on my return from our advanced post, where Captain Stewart is stationed with a division of gun-boats, I have the satisfaction to learn that a Messenger arrived during my absence, with intelligence of the Prince Bragation having attacked Davoust's cavalry in a most spirited manner, the result of which is made public at this place by the inclosed official paper.

(Translation.)

*Intelligence of the Operations of the Army, which has been received here this day, dated at Polotzk, the 7th (19th) July.*

IN the first engagement of consequence which has taken place, victory has declared itself in favour of our native country and of humanity. Prince

Bagration, who was employed in the execution of the movements entrusted to him, in order to effect a junction with the first army, fell in, on his march with his avant-garde, with the whole of the enemy's cavalry. The Russian troops, who had long been eager for battle, fell in upon them, and after the most resolute resistance of the enemy, which rendered this battle the more conspicuous, nine regiments of the enemy were completely cut down, above 1000 men, and upwards of 50 Staff and upper Officers, made prisoners. The difficulties which the enemy had endeavoured to lay in the way of the operations of the second army are now removed. Nothing now stands in the way to prevent these two armies, with their united strength, from preparing for the swarm of their enemies the fate with which every desolating conqueror has ended, so far as the history of nations has taught us. This praiseworthy battle we can consider as the pledge for further brilliant deeds. While victory will conduct our feelings in a new battle, the victims of our opponent will diminish their confidence in the fortune of war, as well as their power and inclination for making resistance.

*Extract of another Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, Bart. and K.B. &c. to John Wilson Croker, Esq. dated on board the Victory, in Hawke Road, 7th August, 1812.*

**H**EREWITH I transmit a Letter I have this morning received by express from Hano, from Rear-Admiral Martin, dated Riga, the 27th ultimo, informing me of the junction of General Barclay de Tolli, Commander in Chief of the Russian army, with the corps of Prince Bagration.

*Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Martin to Vice-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, dated at Riga, the 27th July, 1812.*

GENERAL Barclay de Tolli, the Commander in Chief of the Russian army, has announced his junction, by forced marches, with the corps of Prince Bagration at Witepsk, where the Messenger who is just arrived left him on the 24th instant.

The Emperor Alexander had himself reached Smolenski, probably to stimulate by his presence the natives of that loyal province to exertions suited to the danger with which they are threatened.

The Emperor's activity and earnestness in the prosecution of the war, affords an admirable example to his subjects who in Old Russia are devoted to his cause.

The Nobles of Moscow have offered to raise one hundred thousand men at their own expence, besides a voluntary contribution of two millions of silver rubles, to be at the Emperor's disposal.

We learn by the same Messenger, that the Peace with Turkey is ratified.

**H**EREWITH I enclose a copy of intelligence of the operations of the Russian army, published at Riga, which I received yesterday evening from Rear-Admiral Morris, to whom it had been transmitted by Rear-Admiral Martin, in a merchant vessel, which you will please to lay before their Lordships.

*Intelligence this day received of the Operations of the Army.*

THE objects of the battle, which the advance of Prince Bagration's army victoriously sustained with the enemy, is accomplished. The first west army has effected a junction with that of Prince Bagration, and now both hasten mutually to the attack of the enemy.

At the same time, the agreeable intelligence of the final conclusion of peace with the Ottoman Porte, is received. With united force the Russian armies now stand opposite the enemy, whose operations have hitherto been confined to preventing their junction, but which objects they have been unable to accomplish.

Their brethren in arms on the Danube, now turn from their conciliated opponents towards them, to take part in their deeds, from the result of which, Russia has to expect immortal glory, and oppressed Europe, the dawn of freedom.

**A**DAMIRAL LORD KEITH has transmitted to John Wilson Croker, Esq. letters from Captain Sir Home Popham, of His Majesty's ship *Venerable*, dated the 30th ult. and 1st and 4th instant; the two former giving an account of an attack made upon the town of Santander and the Castle of Ano, at the mouth of its harbour, by a detachment of the Royal Marines, embarked on board the squadron under the orders of Sir Home, in conjunction with the Spanish Guerrillas under General Porlier. The castle was taken possession of by the Marines, but the garrison of Santander having received reinforcements, which made it much stronger than had been expected, General Porlier was unable to advance upon the place, and the Marines, which had pushed on to co-operate in the attack, were obliged to fall back upon the castle, with some loss. Captains Lake, of the *Magnificent*, and Sir George Collier, of the *Surveillante*, who commanded the detachment, were wounded, as also Captain Noble, of the *Marines*, who was taken prisoner.

The last letter from Sir Home Popham states, that on the 3d instant the French evacuated the town of Santander; of which a detachment of Marines from the frigates lying in the harbour immediately took possession. Twenty guns, of different sizes, were found in it, with a quantity of ammunition.

Stamp Office, London, 15th August, 1812.

Notice is hereby given, that an Act was passed in the last Session of Parliament, to amend the Act of the forty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign, for granting Stamp-duties in Great Britain, so far as regards the duties on Medicines, and on Licences for vending the same; and that the duties granted by the Act of the 44th Geo. 3. cap. 98, are, from the 1st of September next, to attach upon the several medicines and medicinal preparations and compositions, set forth or described in the schedule annexed to the new Act, which includes Soda-Water, and all powders and compositions for making it, as well as many articles not specially named in the former Act.

A penalty of 10l. will be incurred by every person who shall sell, or expose to sale, or offer, or keep ready for sale, or buy, or receive, or keep for the purpose of selling by retail, on his own account, or on account of any other person, any packet, box, bottle, pot, phial, or other inclosure, containing any of the articles liable to duty, without paper labels, duly stamped, being sufficiently fastened or affixed thereto, as the law requires.

And a penalty of 20l. will be incurred by every person who shall sell, or expose to sale, or keep ready for sale, any of the said articles liable to duty, without taking out a Licence from the Commissioners of Stamps, for that purpose, annually, within one month after the 1st of September, on which day all licences previously granted will expire; except, victuallers and others, who shall only sell Soda-Water, or other artificial water, to be drank in their houses or shops; and which shall actually be drank therein, provided the same be sold in bottles, with labels duly stamped properly affixed thereto, as the law requires.

Information having been received, that many Druggists and others keep ready for sale, and sell, several sorts of Lozenges and other articles, liable to the Medicine Duty, without stamped labels thereon, this notice is given, that all persons concerned may conform to the provisions of the new Act and of the former Acts therein referred to, and avoid the penalties, for which they will otherwise be prosecuted.
