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Brussels, Octob. 31.

**T**hough our fears of the French are not so great as they were, yet we cannot wholly free our selves of them: The Term they set our Governor, the Prince of Parma, for the giving an Equivalent in, with relation to their pretensions on the Country of Alost, expires on Monday next, and then we shall see what they will do. It is said that the French expect the Crown of Spain should offer the City of Luxemburg as an Equivalent, which they only want, to be Masters of that whole Province.

Hague, Nov. 4. There has been a report, That the Count of Trekefemburg had sold his pretensions upon the County of Lingen, which belongs to the Prince of Orange, and which his Highness is now in Possession of. But this King; and upon enquiry it appears to be a mistake. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland meet to-morrow: In the meantime the Forreign Ministers here have frequent meetings.

Paris, Octob. 31. Since the account we gave you in our last, of the King's arrival at Straabourg, we have not any Letters from Alsace: we believe our next will tell us of the Courts departure from thence on its return hither. The Deputies of the Clergy have had several meetings, and it's said that some very important points will be brought before them; but hitherto they have been wholly employed in adjusting the preliminary matters.

The Humble Address of Your Majesties most Dutiful, and Loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant, Deputy Lieutenants Officers and Souldiers of the Militia and Trained Bands within your Town and County of Newcastle upon Tyne

May it please Your Sacred Majesty

**T**he pious and unalterable resolution which Your Majesty hath made, and so amply Expressed, in Your late Gracious Declaration, to maintain our most excellent Religion, that of the Church of England, and the natural and tender Care You have always manifested of Your Peoples Rights and Liberties, do proclaim You to the whole World to be a Prince as Good as You are Great, And that it is Impossible for You to be otherwise then what You are, the best of Kings: We Your Majesties truly Loyal and Obedient Subjects do humbly beseech Your MA-

jesty to accept of the Tribute of our Loyal gratitude, for the Gracious Assurances, and Indeeding promises You have made to all Your good Subjects of Governing according to the known Laws of Your Kingdom, and maintaining the Protestant Religion: And we do faithfully and Sincerely assure Your Majesty, That we will Endeavour to make all Dutiful Returns of Obedience and Loyalty to Your Majesty for these Your just and princely Resolutions. And that for the preservation of Your Majesties Sacred Person, Your Heirs and Lawful Successors, The Government as now Establisht both in Church and State, our Lives, and all that is dear to us, shall always attend as a ready Sacrifice: being very zealous to approve Our Selves Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects.

The humble Address of the Grand Jury of the County of Radnor; at the Grand Sessions held at Bresteign, the 19th. day of September 1681.

Great and Dread Sir,

**A**fter so many eminent Acts of Providence manifested for your preservation from the horrid and devilish Plots of Rome, and the sly perfidious attempt of the Factious, and Seditious at Home, if we should not in some measure endeavour to express our sense of the Blessings we enjoy under your happy Government, and make some offers of Thanks to Heaven, and Gratitude to You, we might deservedly be branded as the worst of Man kind, and in some sort be said to have fallen below the good Inclinations of Beasts. If to be Govern'd by known Laws, to have Liberty and Property safe; to be secure from Tyranny, and Arbitrary Power in the Prince, and the more fatal exercise of it in our fellow Subjects; if to have the best Protestant Religion own'd and asserted by the best Protestants Monarch; if to be free from the Spanish Inquisition, and the Geneva rigid severity; if to have Justice so impartially administered, that the honest live happily, and the Guilty fall easily, be not just Causes to raise us to the highest degree of Devotion to our God, and Gratitude to our good King, nothing under Heaven can make us sensible; and we may justly expect to be next awakend by Judgments, who by our ingratitude have forfeited such Mercies; To Heaven therefore first as due we make our devout returns, and next our just acknowledgments, to Your Majesty, for those many Signal Blessings we share among us, to the Envy of all the rest of Man-kind round about us. God on prosperously under the Guardian-Ship of Heaven, to extirpate Popery, and to break the power of Fanaticisme and Faction, and thus once more truly deserve the name of Defender of the Faith. We for our selves, as by our Allegiance bound, promise and Vow with our Lives and Fortunes to stand by Your Sacred Majesty, Your Heirs, and Lawful Successors, in the preservation of Your Person, and the Government in Church and State as now by Law

jection to, and defence of the best of Kings we will live,  
and in the bojome of the true Protestant Church will we  
die.*

**W**HE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects,  
Bargeses of the Burrough of *Barwick* upon *Trede*,  
Incorporated and made one Body Politick, in Law enfran-  
chised by the favour of your most Royal Predecessors, and  
endowed by their Royal Bounty with many and large Privi-  
ledges and Immunities, to the great advantage of us Your Ma-  
jesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects: The due Reflection  
and Consideration of wh'ch, and of Your most Excellent Ma-  
jesties Bounty in continuing them to us, exacts and commands  
our most humble Acknowledgments and unfeigned Thanks to  
the Royal Bounty of Your most Excellent Majesty and Royal  
Predecessors.

And although Your Majesties Grace and Royal Favour be-  
flowed upon some ill Men, have produced contrary effects to  
their Duty, sarning and hardning their hearts and minds, even  
to the renting of the Peace of your Government, by running  
into Faction, Schisme, and Rebellion; We Your Majesties  
most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects (truly conforming to Your  
happy Government in Church and State) having had the  
great experience of Your Majesties most incomparable Pru-  
dence, Justice, and Moderation, by which we have enjoyed our  
Religion in the Purity of its Doctrine and Discipline, our Laws  
inviolated, to the Peace and satisfaction of all Your Majesties  
good and Loyal Subjects, do with all sense of Your Royal  
Care of, and Bounty to us, prostrate our selves at Your Royal  
feet, begging Your Majesties most Gracious acceptance of our  
most due and humble acknowledgments of your Prudence  
and Royal Conduct through the whole Series of your Govern-  
ment; and giving Your Majesty our humblest and most hearty  
Thanks for your Royal Condescension by your late Declara-  
tion read in our Churches, which hath abundantly satisfied  
us and all your Loyal Subjects of your great Wisdom in your  
Proceedings of the last Parliament; and in renewing to us your  
Royal assurance of persevering in the constant Care of us, our  
Religion and Liberties, and of making the established Laws  
of the Kingdom the Rule of your Government.

And, may it please Your most Sacred Majesty, we your  
most Dutiful and most Loyal Subjects, particularly obliged,  
do not from the Loyal Example of others only approach your  
Majesty with this our acknowledgment of your great Wis-  
dom and Conduct, but from the dutiful sense we have of your  
constant Care and Resolutions towards us. And though we  
are the least in number we had not been the last in our ac-  
knowledgment, but that every Authority derived from your  
Gracious Majesty shall ever receive its proper Obedience and  
Duty from us. It is hence our Address and Duty is so late;  
for whilst that with assiduous Importunity we endeavoured  
to come to your Great Presence orderly, with our whole  
Body and Magistracy, time elapsing, we could no longer for-  
bear our part in the chorus of Loyalty, but to evidence to  
your Majesty that there is a Church as well as Kirke in  
*Barwick.*

From Your Majesties Princely assurance, we account our  
selves the happiest people in the World, and do resolve for  
our selves, as we are in duty bound, to Sacrifice our Lives  
and Fortunes in defence of Your Majesties Royal Person,  
Government, and Successors in the due and natural descent  
according to Law, in opposition to all who shall by any means  
endeavour to invade the Rights of the Crown and Succession,  
or subvert the Constitution of our Church, as now by Law  
Established; declaring our open detestation and abhorrence  
of the Practice and Principles of our late Plotters, Conspi-  
rators, and Malignours of Your Royal Person, Government,  
and Ministers, resolving to acquiesce and submit, with all con-  
fidence and confidence becoming good and faithful Subjects; to

the Conduct of Your Government, and to pray that your  
Life may be long and happy, and that Your Majesty may  
Reign with that perfect and absolute Dominion in the hearts  
of all your Subjects, that You do in ours, and that your En-  
emies may be athamed and Confounded.

*Plimouth, Oct. 25.* Part of the *Sseights* Fleet is  
come in here from the *Downs*, and the rest is hour-  
ly expected.

*Deale, Oct. 26.* This morning His Majesties Ships  
the *Reserve*, and the *Mary-rose*, sailed out of the  
*Downs* with six Turkish Ships and about 20 Merchant  
Ships more under their Convoy.

*London, Octob. 29.* This Day, according to the  
Annual Custom, Sir *John Moore* Kt. Lord Mayor  
Elect, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the  
Aldermen, and Sheriffs of this City, attended by  
the Masters, Wardens, and Liveries of the several  
Companies in their respective Barges, went to *West-  
minster*; and having been Sworn before the Barons  
of the Exchequer, returned again by Water, and  
passed from the Place where they Landed, to *the  
Guildhal*, with the usual Solemnity. Their Majesties,  
who had been pleased to accept of the humble In-  
vitation that had been made Them, to Honour the  
City with Their Presence, came about Noon, at-  
tended with a great many of the Nobility, and other  
Persons of Quality, into the City; and having seen  
the Show, (for which purpose a Place was prepared  
for Them in a Balcony in *Cheapside*) went to the  
*Guildhal*, where They Dined: Their Majesties were  
extremely satisfied with their Entertainment, which  
was very Noble and Magnificent, and in the Evening  
returned to *Whitehal*, as They came, amidst the re-  
peated Acclamations of the People, who strove to  
express the Joy and Satisfaction which Their Maje-  
sties Presence gave them.

**W**HEREAS John Nevison, convicted at York  
Assizes in the year 1676 for Robbery and
