And that for the prese dation of Your Majesties Sacred Person, Your Heirs and Lawful-Successors, The Government as now Established both in Church and State, our Lives, and all that is dear to us, shall always attend as a ready Sacrisice; being very zeasous to approve Our Selves Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient' Subjects.

We for our selves, as by our Allegiance bound, promise and Now with our Lives and Fortunes to frand by Your Sacred Majelly, Your Heirs, and Lawful Successons, in the preservation of Your Person, and the Government in Church and State as now if Law

And, may it please Your most Sacred Majesty, we your most Dutiful and most Loyal Subjects, particularly obliged, do not from the Loyal Example of others only appoach your Majesty with this our acknowledgment of your great Wisson and Conduct, but from the du i ul sense we have of your conflant Care and Refolutions towards us. And though we are the least in number we had not been the last in our acknowledgment, but that every Authority derived from your Gracious Majetty shall ever receive its proper Obedience and Thuty from us. It is hence our Address and Duty is so late; for whileft that with allidoons Importunity we endeavoured to come to your Great Prefence orderly, with our whole Body and Magiltracy, time elapling, we could no longer for-bear our part in the Cherus of Loyalty, but to evidence to your Majeky that there is a Church as well as Kirke in Barwick

From Your Mejesties Princely assurance, we account our stress the happiest people in the World, and do resolve for our selves, as we are in duty bound, to Sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes in defence of Your Majesties Royal Person, Government, and Successors in the due and natural descent excording to Law, in opposition to all who shall by any means exclesives to invade the Rights of the Crown and Succession, or subvert the Constitution of our Church, as now by Law Established; declaring our open detestation and abhorrence of the Practice and Principles of our late Plotters, Conspirators, and Malignours of Yuar Royal Person, Government, and Ministers, resolving to acquiete and submit, with all contemposite considerate becoming good and fairthful subjects, to

the Conduct of Your Government, and to pray that your Life may be long and happy, and that Your Majefly may Reign with that perfect and absolute Dominion in the hearts of all your Subjects, that You do in ours, and that your Enemies may be alhamed and Confounded.
