NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Trustees for carrying into effect an Act of Parliament for rendering the navigation in the Frith and River of Clyde more safe and commodious, have erected a Light House on the Point of Toward, a low rocky situation near the entrance to Rothesay Bay, on the west side of the Frith; and give this public notice that the same will be lighted on the 1st of November next.

Its bearing, coming in Channel from the Cumray Light House, is by the compass N. N. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. distance  $9\frac{3}{4}$  miles; and, from the Clough Light House, W. S. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. distance  $6\frac{3}{4}$  miles.

To distinguish the Toward Light from the others in the Frith, it is constructed to revolve horizontally, presenting a bright and dim light, alternately, in every direction, except on the N. E. side, where so much of it is totally darkened as to prevent its being seen from the rocks called the Captains Bridges' off Inellan, and the Gantocks off Denoon; so that vessels navigating along the shore to the northward of this light, by being careful to keep it in sight, will avoid any risk from these rocks.—Glasgow, September 7, 1812.

Turnpike Roads in Devon and Cornwall, leading to Launceston.

NOTICE is hereby given, that in the next session of Parliament, application will be made to the Honourable the House of Commons, for a bill for repealing three several Acts passed in the thirty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the second, and in the twenty-first and forty-first years of His present Majesty, for repairing several roads leading to the borough of Launceston, in the county of Cornwall, and for more effectually repairing, widening, improving, and keeping in repair the several roads comprised in the said Acts; which said roads pass through the se-

veral parishes of St. Giles in the Heath, Lifton, Lewtrenchard, Stowford, Thrushelton, Werrington, and Maristowe, in the county of Devon; and Laneast, Saint Cleather, Southpetherwyn, Saint Mary Magdalen, Saint Stephens by Launceston, Saint Thomas, Lezant, Egloskerry, Treneglos, Trewnn, Lawhitton, and Boyton, in the county of Cornwall; in which said bill provision is intended to be proposed for increasing and altering the existing tolls, rates, or duties upon the said roads.—Dated this 1st day of September 1812.
