THE following Address has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness **GEORGE PRINCE of WALES**, Regent of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Synod of Ireland, distinguished by the name of Seceders, beg leave to assure your Royal Highness; that, in common with all other His Majesty's loving subjects, we sincerely lament the continued sufferings of our venerable Sovereign, and that afflicting malady that has deprived this realm of the exercise of those princely virtues that have maintained, during his long reign, the honour of the British throne, and the rights and liberties of all his subjects; at the same time your Royal Highness will permit us most faithfully to declare, that our attachment to His Majesty's person, family, and government, and to the happy constitution under which we live, continues unabated.

We deplore the necessity of the war in which the nation is involved; but we do not cease to thank the Almighty for the honourable successes granted to His Majesty's forces by sea and land, and the hope which they afford, that the contest will issue in the honour of the British throne, and the peace and security of His Majesty's dominions.

We shall only further add, that the principles which have continued the regal functions in the person of your Royal Highness, the dignified wisdom and the paternal regard to the civil and religious privileges of His Majesty's people, discernible in your Royal Highness's councils, commend to our warmest affections every branch of His Majesty's illustrious house, and induce us to pray that the House of Brunswick may never want one to sit upon the throne of the United Kingdom.
