The humble and joynt Adresse of your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, the Grand Jurors of Your Majesties County of Montgomery, and of the severall Burroughs Inquest for the said County at the Great Sessions, and general Goal-deliverer, held at the Burrough of Llanellyn within the said County, the 29th day of August, Anno Dom. 1681.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE do in all Humility crave leave to Present to your Majesty our hearty Thanks for your Gracious Promises in your Declaration; wherein You have assured us by Your Royal Word, that it is your Resolution to defend the Protestant Religion, as now by Law established in the Church of England; that you will make the known Laws of your Kingdom the rule of Your Government; and that as you will not use any Arbitrary Power your self, so you will not suffer it in others. We do farther with all Gratitude acknowledge your Princely Favour, extended particularly to this County, in passing an Act, Prohibiting the Importation of Irish Carile. We are very sensible of the Blessings we have enjoyed since Your Majesties happy Restauration, and peaceable Reign over us, and are all amazed that the wicked Practices of the Papists and Fanatics should now make it necessary for us to express, that we are highly sensible of Your good Government; And we humbly beseech your Majesty to believe, that our Zeal for Your Majesties Service, is as cordial and affectionate as any of our fellow-Subjects, though we have forborn thus publicly to Declare our Affections for Your Majesties Service, till we were legally qualified so to do (though we have been most scandalously misrepresented as Papists and Popishly affected, Whereas the Papists in our County are very inconsiderable in their number, and most despicable in their Strength.) And therefore we do make an humble tender to Your Majesty of our Lives and Fortunes, in defence of Your most Sacred Person and Government, Your Heirs and lawful Successors against all Your Enemies, who shall endeavour to subvert Your Government, or the Religion of the Church of England, as now by Law established, the best of Governments, the best of Churches. That Your Life and Reign may be long and prosperous, and that on Your Head, and Your Royal Line, the Crown may for ever flourish, are the Prayers of,

We Your Majesties Deputy-Lieutenants and Justices of Peace for the said County, present at the said Great Sessions, do heartily joyn with the Gentlemen of the Grand Jury in this their Humble Address, and Acknowledgment to Your most Sacred Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Justices, Burgesses, and Assistants of Your Majesties Burrough of Tyverton in Your County of Devon, Unanimously agreed to at a Meeting in the Guild-Hall of Tyverton aforesaid, on the 8th day of August, in the three and thirtieth year of Your Majesties Reign.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful, Loyal, and Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Justices, Burgesses, and Assistants of your Majesties Burrough of Tyverton, in your County of Devon, do with the deepest sence of Joy and Thankfulness, acknowledge and congratulate God Almightyes wonderful Providence in Your Majesties most happy Restauration; and we cannot sufficiently admire the wise Conduct of Your Majesties most Gracious and Excellent Government ever since: under which, both the Kingdom and the Church of England have so long enjoyed, and do to this day enjoy the blessed fruits of Peace and Liberty, Property and Prosperity.
