BY virtue of the authority in me vested, and in conformity with an ordinance of the 23d May, and an edict of the 12th August 1800, I do hereby make known, that in compliance with a petition delivered in, I have permitted and granted, that Messrs. Thomas Smith and Wm. H. Krause, as Trustees in the trustee-dealing of J. H. Barnes, may summon by proclama, sub pœna præclusi et perpetui silentii, all the known or unknown Creditors of the said trustee-dealing of J. H.
