At the General Session of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden for the City of London, at the Guildhall, within the said City, on Monday the 30th day of November, in the Fifty-third Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, before George Scholey, Esq. Mayor of the City of London, Sir John Eamer, Knight, Sir Charles Flower, Baronet, Aldermen of the said City, John Silvester, Esq. Recorder of the said City, William Donville, Esq. John Atkins, Esq. William Heygate, Esq. other of the Aldermen of the said City, and others their Fellows, Justices of our said Lord the King, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lord the King within the said City, and also to hear and determine divers Felonies, Trespasses, and other Misdeeds committed within the said City;
