AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 9th of December 1812,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent doubts respecting the continuance and effect of the Order in Council of the nineteenth of August one thousand eight hundred and seven, respecting vessels under the flag of Mecklenburg, Oldenburg, Papenburg, and Kniphausen, and the Order in Council of the twenty-fifth November one thousand eight hundred and seven, respecting the ships and goods belonging to Prussia and Lubeck; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that the said two Orders in Council, bearing date respectively the nineteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seven, and the twenty-fifth of November one thousand eight hundred and seven, shall be considered as null and of no effect; provided nevertheless, that nothing in this Order contained, shall be construed to affect any question depending in judgment, respecting either of the said Orders, on any capture made prior to the date of this Order: but such questions shall be decided in the same manner as if this Order and Declaration had not been issued.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the

Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following Address has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent: which Address His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George, PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Petition of the Protestant Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Wicklow.

Sheweth,

THAT your Petitioners have for some years past observed the frequent endeavours made by their Roman Catholic fellow-subjects; to obtain a repeal of those laws, by which persons of that religious persuasion, are at present excluded from seats in the Legislative Assemblies of these kingdoms, and from several offices of high trust and political power in the State.

That it is the sincere wish and desire of Petitioners to live on terms of the strictest amity and friendship with their Roman Catholic brethren, that they feel towards them no spirit of bigotry, no sentiment of intolerance, but that they are bound by interest as well as inclination to consider them as brethren of the same community, and are willing to concede to them every privilege consistent with the security of their ancient establishments and the permanence of their invaluable Constitution.

That the repeal of those laws by which their Roman Catholic fellow-subjects were impeded in the acquisition of wealth and property, or in the free exercise of their religion, has met with the hearty concurrence of your Petitioners, and that they have observed with satisfaction their consequent advancement in wealth and prosperity; But that Petitioners cannot look forward without solicitude and alarm, to the total and unlimited abrogation of those statutes by which persons professing the faith of the Church of Rome, have been

for such a series of years, excluded from political influence in this Protestant State.

That Petitioners, firmly confiding in the united wisdom of Parliament, and the long experienced attachment to the principles of the Constitution in His Majesty's illustrious House, would have considered it unnecessary to make any public declaration of their sentiments, had it not been called forth by the unfounded assertion, that the entire and unqualified concession of the claims of the Roman Catholics of Ireland, had received the sanction of the great majority of their Protestant fellow-subjects.

That Petitioners are further induced to prefer this their Petition, in consequence of the tone and resolutions lately adopted by their Roman Catholic fellow-subjects in the prosecution of their claims; a conduct which Petitioners deeply regret as being highly calculated to promote disunion and discontent in their country, and to excite just apprehension and alarm in the Protestant mind.

That Petitioners do most humbly beg leave to offer to your Royal Highness, their strongest and most dutiful assurances of loyalty and attachment, and their firm confidence that they will continue to find in your Royal Highness the faithful guardian of that glorious Constitution, which the people of these lands inherit from the wisdom of their ancestors, confirmed by the accession of your illustrious House to the throne of these kingdoms.

That your Petitioners do therefore most humbly hope and solicit, that if upon mature deliberation, it shall appear expedient to your Royal Highness, on behalf of His Majesty, in conjunction with the other branches of the Legislature, to accede to the Petitions now preferred by the Roman Catholics of Ireland; it will please your Royal Highness to ratify the concession, only under such restrictions and limitations, as may afford ample and lasting security to the Protestant establishments of these realms, both in Church and State, and finally ensure to posterity the permanence of that ancient and excellent political Constitution, to which, under the blessing of Divine Providence, is to be ascribed the prosperity of these lands, and integrity of His Majesty's empire amidst the ruin of surrounding nations.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, by warrant under His Majesty's royal signet, and the sign manual of His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, bearing date the 3d day of November last, hath been pleased to give and grant unto Timothy Fysh Foord, of the Wold Cottage, in the East Riding of the County of York,

Clerk, one of the Chaplains in Ordinary to His Royal Highness, His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue, when they shall be in possession of certain estates devised to him under the last will and testament of his brother, Lieutenant-General Barnard Foord Bowes, late of Beverley, in the County of York, deceased, may take and use the surname of Bowes, in addition to and immediately after his present surname of Foord; and that he and they may bear the arms of Bowes, quarterly, in the first quarter, with those of Foord; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to order, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Downie, of His Majesty's sloop the Royalist, addressed to Vice-Admiral Foley, and transmitted by the latter to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

His Majesty's Sloop Royalist, in the Downs, Dec. 30, 1813.

SIR,

I BEG leave to state to you that His Majesty's sloop Royalist, under my command, captured, at eleven o'clock last night, off Hythe, the French lugger privateer *Le Rusé*, of sixteen guns and sixty-five men. She is a very fine and entirely new vessel, on her first cruise, and had not made any capture.

The enemy had one man killed, one wounded, and the main-mast shot away before he struck.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that, on Wednesday evening the 25th of November last, as Mr. Edward Wiggin, late of Eardington, near Bridgenorth, in the county of Salop, miller, was returning home from Wolverhampton market, he was shot and wilfully murdered, near the turnpike-gate on the road leading from Bridgenorth to Eardington, by some person or persons unknown;

His Royal Highness, acting in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the said murder, is hereby pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of the offenders (except the person who actually committed the said murder) who shall discover his or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of TWO HUNDRED GUINEAS is hereby offered to any person making such discovery as aforesaid (except as before excepted), to be paid on conviction of one or more of the offenders, by the Bailiffs of Bridgenorth.

War-Office, January 2, 1813.

To Widows of Officers of the Land and Marine Forces.

HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, having been graciously pleased to abolish the former practice of transferring the payment of the pensions of the widows of officers of the land forces, from

Great Britain to Ireland, and vice versa, upon the removal of regiments from one establishment to the other; and to direct, that in future every widow shall, from the 25th day of December last, inclusive, receive payment of her pension in the country in which she resides; the following rules are to be observed in this respect, videlicet:

Every widow, whether on the British or Irish establishment, should immediately notify her place of residence, and the name of her agent, to the War-Office of that country in which she at present receives her pension.

Any widow residing in Great Britain, whose pension is now issued in Ireland, should also notify her place of residence to the War-Office in Dublin, in order that official directions may be given for the payment of her pension in Great Britain from the date abovementioned.

In like manner, any widow residing in Ireland, whose pension is now issued in Great Britain, should make a similar report to the War-Office in London, when instructions will be given for the payment of her pension in Ireland from the date abovementioned.

If a widow should afterwards be desirous of changing her place of residence, she is to give two months previous notice of her intended removal, to the War-Office of the country in which she is then resident.
