His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

IT is ordered, by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Monday the twenty-third of this instant August, be further prorogued to Monday the first day of November next.

MEMORANDUM.—In the notice in the Gazette of Tuesday last, Friday the 4th of October was inserted by mistake.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 14th of August 1813,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the thirty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act for allowing, for a limited time, the importation of goods from India and China, and other parts within the limits of the exclusive trade of the East India Company, in ships not of British-built, nor registered as such; and for the exportation of goods from Great Britain by the same ships, under certain restrictions," it was enacted, that if, during the continuance of the then present war, and for eighteen months after the conclusion thereof, any ship freighted by the said United Company, with the approbation of the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India, with home investment of goods from India or China, or other ports within the limits of the said Company's trade,

should arrive in the ports of Great Britain, it should and might be lawful, upon representation made, by or on behalf of the said Company, to His Majesty in Council, for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to authorise the importation and entry of such goods, subject to the like duties, and no other, as if they were imported in British-built ships, though such goods should be brought in ships which might not be British-built, nor have been registered as British-built ships, nor navigated as required by the laws then in force; provided the said ships should have been built within the territories belonging to the said United Company, or in the ports under the immediate protection of the British flag in the East Indies; and also to permit such ships to export from Great Britain, to the British settlements in the East Indies, or to any of the places within the limits before mentioned, with the licence and consent of the said Company, any goods, wares or merchandize whatsoever, ordnance and military stores excepted; and it was thereby further enacted, that such ships should not be liable to forfeiture, nor should any persons whatever be liable to any penalty or forfeiture, on account of any importation of goods, wares, or merchandize, in pursuance of the said Act, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council, which might be issued in virtue thereof; and whereas by an Act passed in the forty-second year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act for making perpetual so much of an Act made in the nineteenth year of the reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the allowing a drawback of the duties on rum shipped as stores, to be consumed on board merchant ships on their voyages; and to continue several laws relating to the permitting the exportation of tobacco pipe-

“ clay, from Great Britain to the British sugar colonies, in the West Indies, until the twenty-fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eight; to the giving further encouragement to the importation of naval stores from the British colonies in America, until the twenty-ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and twelve; to the regulating the payment of the duties on cinnamon, cloves, nutmegs, and mace; to the allowing the importation of certain fish from Newfoundland, and the coast of Labrador, until the twenty-fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eight; and to the allowing the importation and exportation of goods from and to India and China, in ships not of British-built, during the continuance of the exclusive trade to and from the East Indies, granted to the East India Company, by an Act of the thirty-third year of His present Majesty's reign,” the said Act of the thirty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign was further continued, during the term granted to the said United Company, by the said Act of Parliament of Great Britain, of the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign; and whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, “ An Act for continuing in the East India Company for a further term, the possession of the British territories in India, together with certain exclusive privileges; for establishing further regulations for the government of the said territories, and the better administration of justice within the same, and for regulating the trade to and from the places within the limits of the said Company's charter;” it is enacted, that the said two first mentioned Acts, passed in the thirty-fifth and forty-second years of His Majesty's reign, shall continue and be in force, until the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, unless any provision shall be made respecting the same in the next Session of Parliament; and that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, during such times, by any Order or Orders in Council to be made for that purpose, to authorize any of His Majesty's subjects, to import into the said United Kingdom, from the East Indies, and other places within the limits of the said Company's charter, save and except the dominions of the Emperor of China; paying the like duties only as if such importation were made in British-ships; and to export from the said United Kingdom to the East Indies and places aforesaid, save and except as

aforesaid, goods, wares, and merchandise, except tea, in all such ships as above mentioned, subject to such regulations and conditions as His Majesty shall think fit; any Act, matter or thing to the contrary notwithstanding; provided always, that all ships which may have commenced their voyage from India, at any time before the expiration of one year from the passing of the said last mentioned Act, shall be deemed and taken to be equally entitled to the benefit of the provisions therein before contained, as if such ships had arrived in any port of the United Kingdom during the said twelve months:—His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in virtue of the powers vested in His Majesty, by the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, is thereupon pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that any of His Majesty's subjects be, and they are hereby permitted and allowed to import into the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, from the East Indies, and other places within the limits of the East India Company's charter, save and except the dominions of the Emperor of China; paying the like duties only as if such importation were made in British ships; and to export from the said United Kingdom to the East Indies, and places aforesaid, save and except as aforesaid, goods, wares and merchandise, except tea, in all such ships as above mentioned; any Act, matter or thing to the contrary notwithstanding; provided always, that all ships which may have commenced their voyage from India, at any time before the expiration of one year from the passing of the above-mentioned Act of the last Session of Parliament, shall be deemed and taken to be equally entitled to the benefit of the provisions therein before contained, as if such ships had arrived in any port of the United Kingdom during the said twelve months.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the Management of the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following Address has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George PRINCE REGENT.

The Humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of Greenock.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Magistrates, and Town Council of Greenock, in Common Council assembled, beg to offer ourselves, with all possible respect, to your Royal Highness's consideration.

Yet, in presuming to do so, we humbly conceive we shall best denote that regard, which we entertain for your Royal Highness, as well as discharge our own duty, by expressing our deep concern at the continued indisposition of our excellent Sovereign.

None of His Majesty's faithful subjects can more ardently wish His Majesty's recovery than we do,

and our fervent prayers ascend to the Almighty, that his Grace may bestow every alleviation to suffering which excites such genuine regret.

Since we last had an opportunity of addressing your Royal Highness, events of the most acknowledged importance to the welfare of our country, and the glory of its character, have, under the Divine favour, followed in close succession.

We had scarcely contemplated the trophies which were won in conjunction with our Allies in Portugal and Spain, when we beheld the providential and memorable discomfiture of our bitterest enemy on the plains of Russia; displaying to the world the successful energy of a brave and spirited people, against the aggression of a powerful invader.

Amidst circumstances so greatly entitled to cherish the happiness, and to call for the gratitude and applause of the nation, we must hasten to present to your Royal Highness, our warmest congratulations on the splendid achievement of the battle of Vittoria—not more remarkable for the signal defeat of the French, than the valour of His Majesty's arms, and the consummate ability of his illustrious commander, the Field-Marshal the Marquess of Wellington.

The result presages an issue of the most beneficial effects to the British empire.

So much good your Royal Highness's mind can well and justly appreciate; and we trust the period is not remote, when, after a contest of unexampled bearings, this country shall safely enjoy the solid blessings of peace and repose.

We cannot be insensible to the wisdom of Parliament, so conspicuous in the recent session, in having adopted a system of finance which, while it is formed to meet the greatest exigencies, judiciously and considerably lightens the pressure of present taxation.

The enlightened arrangements so rationally brought forward, and independently supported by His Majesty's Ministers, for the future management of the affairs of India, which have happily received the sanction of the Legislature, are alike calculated to improve the moral, political, and commercial state of that immense portion of the British empire, and to promote our home interests and resources.

They eminently mark, in our apprehension, the sound policy, and superior discernment of the age in which we live.

We rejoice at every occasion which permits us to testify our unceasing veneration for our Constitution, our strongest attachment to our Government, and our sincere loyalty to the Royal Family.
