GIOR vittentligt, at jeg i Overoenstemmelse med den mig forlænte magt og i medhold af forordningen af den 23de Maj og plakaten af 12te Augustii 1800, efter derom gjort ansøgning, haver bevilget og tilladt at d'Her. James Sargenton, Benjamin Lindo, Jean Combes og Victor Farrouilk, som Exekutorer efter afgl. Abraham Gomez vaes Cadett maae ved sub pœna præclusi & perpetui silentii indkalde alle bekiendte og ubekiendte Kreditorer efter afgl. Abraham Gomez vaes Cadet som opholde sig i Europæiske eller Amerikanske Lænde, at fremkomme med deres Fordringer og anmeldte og berisliggiøre deres havende Kræv personligen, eller ved Fuldmægtige, for bemeldte Exekutorer inden den tidi udløb, som herefter fastsættes, det er at sige, Et aar og sex uger fra den tid, da dette proclama skal have været læst i Overretten for Eilandene St. Croix, St. Thomas, og St. Jan, og bekiendtgjort tre gange efter hinanden i Londons Gazette, og alle saadanne bekiendte eller ubekiendte Kreditorer, som opholde sig paa nogen af de Vest Indiske Eilande eller Kolonier skal fremkomme med deres Fordringer personligen, eller ved deres Fuldmægtige, for bemeldte Exekutorer inden 3 maaneder fra den dag da dette proclama er læst i Over og underretterne paa Oerne St. Croix, St. Thomas, og St. Jan, og efterretning derom bekiendtgjort i St. Croix Gazette tre ganger efter hinanden. Og skal formeldte Exekutorer fremdeles være pligtig til at lade denne bevilling forevise, i de Kongelige og Laanekommissionerens bogholder kontoirer paa bemeldte Eilande, og derom, forskaffe attest, da i manglende fald, proclama ei skal gielde mod de kongelige eller Laanekommissionerens Fordringer og Rettig heder Hertil have alle Vedkommende at lægge mærke, og sig derefter at rette.

BY virtue of the authority in me vested, and in conformity with an ordinance of the 23d May, and an edict of the 12th August 1800, I do hereby make known, that, in compliance with a petition delivered in, I have permitted and granted, that Messrs. James Sargenton, Benjamin Lindo, Jean Combes, and Victor Farrouilk, as Executors to the last will of Abraham Gomez vaes Cadet, deceased, may summon by proclama sub pœna præclusi et perpetui silentii, all the known or unknown Creditors of Abraham Gomez vaes Cadet, deceased, residing in European or American territories, to come forward with their demands, and enter and prove their claims in person, or by their attornies, before the said Executors, previous to the expiration of the period herein-after limited, that is to say, within one year and six weeks from the period when this proclama shall have been recorded in the Upper Courts of the islands of St. Croix, St. Thomas, and St. John, and published three times consecutively in the London Gazette; and all such known or unknown Creditors, as reside in any of the West India islands or colonies, shall come forward with their claims in person, or by their attornies, before the said Executors, within three months from the date of this proclama being recorded in the Superior and Inferior Courts of the islands of St. Croix, St. Thomas, and St. John, and notice thereof being published in the St. Croix Gazette three times consecutively; and the aforesaid Executors, shall further be bound to cause this grant to be produced in the Royal and the Equ Commissions Book-Keepers Offices to the said islands,

and procure a certificate of this being complied with; in failure of which, this proclama shall not be valid against any claims or prerogatives of His Majesty; and all persons concerned are to take notice thereof, and to conduct themselves accordingly.
