Plymouth, June 21.

ERerday were brought in hither two French fhips prizes, one of 30 Tuns laden with Wine and Vinegar, the other of 200 Tuns, with Salt and who credibly inform us, that the French Fleet have left the Coafts, and are returned

A imall Privateer of eight Gune, Captain Sadlington Commander, hath taken an Amfterdam Veffel of 14 guns, with a Commission, but laden with Corne, and being the 17 infant riding close under the French thoare, faw the French Fleet of 24 Sail Standing loto Breft, which ( as he was informed) were but thin manned, and very indiffe-rently Victualled. We are also told of another Prize Jaden with the Norway trade, that has been taken and earried

Harwich, June 24. Yefterday Bir Joseph Fordan with the Little Lenex, a small Galliot Hoy of this place, and two fmall Firefhips, went out to take a view of the Enemies Fiset, a part whereof confifting of 10 or 12 great thips, and as many imail Veffels, among ft which number was De Ruyter himself, and three other Flag fhips lay about four Leagues of from this Town : Sir Je. with his little Veffels came up as well at the Wind would permit, within much less then Cannon shot of the Admiral, to so near a diffance, that they could tell his Guns, though the weather was then hazy, which the Enemy perceiving, with incredible hafte flipped Anchor, and let fall their falls, and made away with much confusion and disorder, leaving behind them only one Vice Admiral at Anchor very much to the Windward of us: One little Fregat with a long beats from their Admiral ship, that had both of them the Wind of us, were afterwards sent out, which our men endeavored to have drilled to a convenient diftance from their Fleet, but after two or three Tacks and feveral fhots passed at a diftance, they made away and returned m their Fleet.

Geneva, Jane 1. We are here expecting with some im-patiency the Duke of Savoys answer, to the Letters sent him from the Evangelical Gantons. The Savoyards fill threaten us with hofility; and have drawn together the Pea-fasts, and furnished them with Atmes and Ammunition, weyning them up to War. We are also affured that they have fent fome Troops of horfe, and Companies of Foot to Thenen, Evian end other Towns in the Dutchy of Chablais, and are providing themselves with boats, but with what particular intentions we know not.

The Count St. Maurice, the Savoye Ambaffador in France is returning in Post, having presented the Daulphin with a Drum richly covered with precious stones.

The Abbot of Wadeville, the King of Spains Commiffary General in the Franche Country, strived lately at Berne, and from thence went for Zurich, intending to pais by Lucerne to Vifit all the Cantons, and afterwards to be prefent at the General conference at Baden, preffing hard for thei continuation

of their Alliance with Spain.
Vienna, June 12. The Emperor has chought it necessary to Inform the Princes his Neighbors of his intentions upon the face sudden Invasion of the Spanish Metherlands by the French, and is resolved for this purpose to dispatch the Count Radolph de Sinsgendorf to the Marquis de Baden , and is to pals from thence to the Dake of Wartenberg, and afterands to the Princes Electors upon the Khine, and fo to the Duke of Membourg, and Bifhop of Munfter, and in his resurn to the Dukes of Brunfwich and Lunesburg, to confer with them about that great affair, to prevent the Inconveniences which thereupon may befal the Empire, and to perswade them to fend affiftance to the Invaded Provinces, and to fuffer his forces to march through their Countries as they shall have occasion. A Courrier is likewife fent to the Refidents in the Courts of their Highnesses the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburgh, and another to the Refilentat Hamburgh, Monfieur Lusque 3 and from thence to Steck-holme, to the Sieur Bafferode, with order that he endeavor to diffwade the Swedes from following or clofing with the Interests of France, The Spanish leavies advance much upon the late returns of money from Spain for that purpose. The Emperor being resolved to add to them ten Regiments, and upon their Mutter to give order for new leavier.

From Conftantinople we are zdviled that a great fine is laid upon the French Merchants upon a discovery made, that they have for a long time defrauded the Emperor of his Tolls and Impolitions.

The Turks begin to draw their Forces together about Memhausel and other places, but with what defign is not yet discovered, but the Frontiers are by it put upon their Guarde.

Cologne, June 15. The Council of Spain hath ordered that no French shall be suffered to continue in any City of the Franche Country, under the Spanife )urifdiction, which they have already begun to put in execution, the people there much fearing a surprize ; apprehending that some design is framing against them ; and so much the rather, because the Governor of Dole has lately kept more then usual guards about that City, which he intends to continue till he fhall receive farther Order from the King of France his Mafter, having feveral times fecured the Spaniards there, without giving them any reasons of his procedure against them. The Abbot of Wadeville is negotiating the affairs of that Country with the Gantous, to found their intentions, as to their alliance with Spain. They have also fent an Express to the Imperial Court, to prefs for the Succors expected thence, which their Deputy at Ratisbonne would feen to affire them of ; and that the whole Empire is inclined to give affiftance to the Spanish Nesherlands.

From Lorrain we are affured, that the Duke of Lorrain having secured the greatest part of the Treasure in Stratf-bourg, had sent a Courrier to Monsieur de Lyonne, desiring him to employ his Interest with the King of France, that the Lorrain forces might again teturn to his fervice, which he had not raifed without necessity, for the guard and defence of his Dutchy : but that he had no other return made him from the King, but that he would keep the Forces in his fervices

and was as able to pay them as the King of Spain.

The Forces of the Princes of Luxenbourg and Brunfwick, are fit for fervice, comfitting of 1 2000 men, and lie ready to defend those Countries against any invasion. The Bishop of Mussier is raysing forces, which he pretends shall be employed only for the defence of his own Country, but the Moneys which are returned to him upon the French account by the Merchants of Amflerdam, periwade to the contrary.

Venice, June 17. Our laft letters by the way of Otranto, from our Armata, bearing date the 17 paff, advile us that stSquadron of our Fleet, discovering feven of the Turks Gallies making for Canea gave Chace to them; and had great hopes of reaching them, but that the wind faddenly chopping about, favored heir defign fo well, that they got fale into Canea, but being not laden with Provisions, but only Men and Ammunition, this additional number will only encrease their wants, all forts of Victuals being very fcarce amongs. To morrow Signior Labia is to embarque with the Convoy, that is going hence for the Armata, with a plentiful fep-

ply of Money, Men and Ammunition.

From Dalmatia we are told, that the Turks fill continue to draw their forces together in Albania, which Allarmes all our peer Garrifons, but the Ceneral Cornaro with the Marquis Degt' Oddi have taken fuch effictuall care for the frengthning and reinforcing all the Garrifons that feem to be threatned by them, as we hope may prevent their defignes, the Gally which came from Cattaro, is fome daies fince fent back to them, with a great fum of moneys to supply their wants and put them into a posture of defence, savera: Basques being daily dispatcht into those parts, with Soldiers Provifions, Ammunicion, and all things that are thought necessary for their Supply.

A Squadron of the Turkifb Corfayres, have been lately plying sbont Meffins, where they have taken five pizes, viz. the ee French thips, one Genoue fe, and one Venetian,

wil of them going for the Levant.

Paris, July 2. S.N. The Marquis de Crequy is now about Moulmedy with an Army of about 6000 men, having (as 'eis fale) made his Incurfions to the Gates of the City of Luyembourgh, from whence he has twice driven away their Cartel ; having also spreared and summoned Greuen Machere, and thrown feveral Granades into the Town, which was notwithstanding resolved to stand upon its defence, and that be has some design to go and block up Echternach.

Den Francisco Ferriera Rebellos, is upon his return with 500000 li: ures, being the moiety of the fum which is to be advanced to the Portugals for the entertainment of the

French Forces in their Service.

Courtrick is formally befreged, but is fo well defended, that 'tis beleived it may hold out yet this month: we are also told that a Party of 600 Horfe, have feifed 30 Boats laden with Core coming out from Bouchein , and intended for Volencienne, but the Corn is fent for Knefucry.
