

foever brags the *Turks* have hitherto made. He is now removed to *New Candia*, having commanded all the slaves out of the Gallies, whom he employes as Pioneers to work in the Trenches.

To morrow Signior *Labia* is to embarque with the Convoy, that is going hence for the *Armata*, with a plentiful supply of Money, Men and Ammunition.

From *Dalmatia* we are told, that the *Turks* still continue to draw their forces together in *Albania*, which Allarmes all our neer Garrisons, but the General *Cornaro* with the Marquis *Degl' Oddi* have taken such effectual care for the strengthening and reinforcing all the Garrisons that seem to be threatened by them, as we hope may prevent their designs, the Gally which came from *Cattaro*, is some daies since sent back to them, with a great sum of moneys to supply their wants and put them into a posture of defence, several Barques being daily dispatcht into those parts, with Soldiers Provisions, Ammunition, and all things that are thought necessary for their supply.

A Squadron of the *Turkish Corsayes*, have been lately plying about *Messina*, where they have taken five prizes; viz. three French ships, one *Genouese*, and one *Venetian*, all of them going for the *Levant*.

Paris, July 2. S. N. The Marquis *de Crequy* is now about *Moulmedy* with an Army of about 6000 men, having (as 'tis said) made his Incurfions to the Gates of the City of *Luyembourg*, from whence he has twice driven away their Cattel; having also appeared and summoned *Greuen Mache*, and thrown several Granades into the Town, which was notwithstanding resolv'd to stand upon its defence, and that he has some design to go and block up *Echternach*.

Don Francisco Ferriera Rebellos, is upon his return with 500000 liores, being the moiety of the sum which is to be advanced to the *Portugals* for the entertainment of the French Forces in their Service.

Courtrick is formally besieged, but is so well defended, that 'tis believ'd it may hold out yet this month: we are also told that a Party of 600 Horse, have seized 30 Boats laden with Corn coming out from *Bouchein*, and intended for *Volencienn*, but the Corn is sent for *Kuescury*.

Whitehall, June 25. Whereas it is generally reported, that many Seamen and Souldiers, who have served His Majesty at Sea, are frequently constrained to give Money, or lose some part of their Wages to recover the rest; which Reports being of great prejudice to His Majesties Service, and the Treasurer of His Majesties Navy having used all possible means to discover and prevent all such abuses, (as appeared by several publick Advertisements by him affixed at *Westminster-Hall Gate*, and other publick places.) His Majesty shereupon, out of His tender care of those His Subjects, who have so faithfully served him; and for the more effectual redress of any abuses; which are, or have been committed in exacting upon the said Seamen and Souldiers, hath by an Order of the Board appointed

to sit in the Councel Chamber as a Committee to receive and hear all such complaints as any Seaman or Soldier employed at Sea can make of any Exaction practis'd upon them by any of the Officers, Sub-Officers or Clerks in the Office of the Principal Officers of his Majesties Navy, or of the Treasurer of the Navy; Whereof all persons concerned are to take notice, and they that have just reason to Complain of any such ill usage, may from time to time repair to the Councel Chamber at *White-hall*, and there put into the hands of the Clerk of the Councell, attending their Complaint in Writing, with a Note upon the same where the party complaining inhabits or may be found, to the end that if the same do appear to be true, due satisfaction may be given, and justice done upon those who have injured them.

Whitehall, June 26. Whereas the Parliament now inhabing stands prorogued till the 10. day of *October* next; His Majesty having had reason to believe at the time of the said Prorogation, that his affairs might have permitted the attendance of the Members of both Houses on His Majesties service; and their own occasions in their respective Countries until that time, His Majesty now finding this His Kingdom invaded during a Treaty of Peace, and esteeming himself ever most safe in the advice and affection of His people in Parliament, hath therefore, and for divers urgent causes moving Him thereunto, this day thought fit and resolved by and with the consent of His Majesties Privy Council, to issue out his Proclamation for the calling together both His Houses of Parliament: thereby straightly charging and commanding all and every the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and all Knights of Shires, Citizens of Cities, Burgettes of Burroughs, and Barons of the Cinque Ports, of this present Parliament; that they, and every of them do personally appear, re-assemble themselves, and give their attendance at *Westminster*, on the twenty fifth day of *July* next; then and there to Treat of the VVeighy Affaires of His Majesties Kingdom. And all Assistants of His Majesties House of Peers, and Officers and Ministers of either House of Parliament, are thereby required and enjoyned to give their Attendance accordingly, as by the Proclamation it self will fully appear.
