AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 30th of November 1813,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent having received information, that the Province of East Friezland, the State of Kniphausen, the Dutchy of Oldenburgh, and the Dutchy of Bremen, are no longer under the dominion of France, is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the blockade of that part of the coast of Germany, comprehended within the above description, (which was instituted by virtue of His Majesty's Orders in Council, of the 26th of April 1809, and of the 17th of May 1809, or of any other Orders in Council, Instruction, or Notification,) shall be discontinued, with the exception of such ports as may still be occupied by the troops of the enemy.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for continuing to His Majesty certain duties on malt, sugar, tobacco, and snuff, in Great Britain, and on pensions, offices, and personal estates, in England, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

An Act for raising the sum of twenty-two millions by way of annuities.

An Act to continue, until six weeks after the commencement of the next session of Parliament, an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to continue and amend an Act of the present session, to prevent the issuing and circulating of pieces of gold and silver, or other metal, usually called tokens, except such as are issued by the Banks of England and Ireland.
