

to any person or persons who shall procure the voluntary service of able or ordinary seamen or landmen fit for His Majesty's service, and shall convey them on board any of His Majesty's ships or vessels, or to any of His Majesty's sea officers employed in raising men, a reward of three guineas for every such able seaman, and two guineas for every such ordinary seaman, and one guinea for every such landman, together with an allowance at the rate of one penny per mile for each able seaman, ordinary seaman, and landman, for every mile such man may respectively travel to the nearest of His Majesty's ships of war, or nearest place of residence of any of His Majesty's sea officers employed in raising men, provided such man shall be found fit for His Majesty's service, and there shall not be reason to suppose he is an apprentice: And whereas it is expedient, that the said several bounties, rewards, and travelling allowance, should be continued to be paid for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the payment of the said bounties, rewards, and travelling allowance, be continued to the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, inclusive; and that the same be paid in the manner specified in His Majesty's several proclamations now in force for the encouragement of seamen and landmen to enter into His Majesty's Royal Navy, and for the discovering seamen who may conceal themselves, and for giving rewards for procuring the voluntary service of seamen and landmen; whereof all persons concerned are to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for giving effect to certain engagements of His Majesty with the Emperor of All the Rus-

sias and the King of Prussia, for furnishing a part of the pecuniary succours for assisting His Majesty's said Allies in supporting the expences of the war with France.

An Act to provide for the charge of the addition to the public funded debt of Great Britain, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

An Act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, and amend an Act for regulating the drawbacks and bounties on the exportation of sugar from Ireland.

An Act for fixing the commencement and termination of licences to be granted for the distillation of spirits from corn or grain in Scotland.

An Act to enable His Majesty to accept the services of a proportion of the militia of the City of London, out of the United Kingdom, for the vigorous prosecution of the war.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the fifty-first year of the Reign of His Majesty, intituled An Act to permit the interchange of the British and Irish militias respectively.

An Act for extending the provisions of an Act, passed in the forty-sixth year of His present Majesty, (for making better provision for soldiers,) to serjeants of the militia.

An Act to enable His Majesty to augment the sixtieth regiment to ten battalions, by admitting of foreigners.

An Act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the times limited for those purposes respectively, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, and to permit such persons in Great Britain, as have omitted to make oaths and affidavits of the execution of indentures of clerks to attornies and solicitors, to make and file the same, on or before the first day of May one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

An Act to explain an Act of the forty-fifth year of His present Majesty, for declaring what persons shall be disabled from sitting and voting in the House of Commons of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

An Act to stay, until the twentieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, proceedings in actions under an Act passed in the forty-third year of His Majesty to amend the laws relating to spiritual persons.

An Act to provide, that property vested in the Accountant-General of the High Court of Chancery, as such, shall upon his death, removal, or resignation, vest from time to time in those who shall succeed to the office.

An Act for the more easy recovery of debts in His Majesty colony of New South Wales.

An Act to continue and amend two Acts of the thirty-eighth and forty-third years of His present Majesty, for more effectually repairing that part of the roads from Manchester to Rochdale, Bury, and Radcliffe-Bridge, all in the County-Palatine of Lancaster, which is called the Manchester District; and for making and maintaining a new branch of road to communicate therewith.
