Majesty's Privy Council, to order and declare, and
it is hereby ordered and declared;

1st. That all hostilities against the United Pro-
vinces of the Netherlands, (save and except such
ports or places as may be still in the possession, or
under the controul of France) on the part of His
Majesty shall immediately cease.

2dly. That the blockade of all the ports and
places of the said United Provinces, (save and ex-
cept such ports and places as before excepted) and
all other restrictions thereon imposed by any Order
in Council relating thereto, shall forthwith cease
and be discontinued.

3dly. That all ships and vessels belonging to the
said United Provinces (save and except vessels
coming from, or proceeding to, any ports or places
in the possession or under the controul of France)
shall have free admission into His Majesty's ports,
and be permitted to carry on any trade, now lawfully
carried on in the ships of States in amity with His
Majesty.

Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commis-
sioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the
High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the

hereby appointing and commanding that a General
Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His
mercies, be observed throughout those parts of the
United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on
Thursday the thirteenth day of January next; and for
the better and more orderly solemnizing the same,
We have given directions to the Most Reverend the
Archbishops, and Right Reverend the Bishops of
England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to
the occasion, to be used in all churches and chapels,
and other places of public worship; and to take
care for the timely dispersing of the same through-
out their respective dioceses. And We do strictly
charge and command, that the said Public Day of
Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all His
Majesty's loving subjects, as they tender the favour
of Almighty God, and upon pain of suffering such
punishment as may be justly inflicted upon all such
who shall contempt or neglect the same.

pointing and commanding, that a Public Thanks-
giving to Almighty God, for these His mercies, be

dom called Scotland, on Thursday the thirteenth
day of January next. And We do strictly charge
and command, that the said Public Thanksgiving be
reverently and decently observed by all His Majesty's
loving subjects in Scotland, on the said thirteenth
day of January next, as they tender the favour of
Almighty God, and would avoid His wrath and in-
dignation; and upon pain of such punishment as
may be justly inflicted, on all such as contempt or
neglect the same. Our will and pleasure, is, there-
fore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation
seen, yet forthwith pass to the Market-Cross of
Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there,
in His Majesty's name and authority, make publi-
cation thereof, that none pretend ignorance. And
Our will and pleasure is, that His Majesty's Soli-
citor do cause printed copies hereof, to be sent to
the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewards of Stew-
arties, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks,
whom we ordain to see the same published: And
We appoint them to send copies thereof to the
several parish churches within their bounds, that,
upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the day
above-mentioned, the same may be published and
read from the pulpits immediately after divine
services.

vester, Esq. the Recorder:

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales,
REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great
Britain and Ireland.

The humble, dutiful and loyal Address, of the
Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of
the City of London, in Common-Council
assembled:

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal
subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Com-

mons, of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled, approach your Royal Highness with renewed assurances of unalterable affection and regard, and with the warmest congratulations upon the increased prospect which recent events have afforded, of the complete deliverance of Europe, from a yoke most disgraceful, galling and oppressive.

When we recall to our remembrance, the intimate commercial intercourse, which has for upwards of two centuries existed, between this country and the United States of Holland, the similarity of religious opinions, and the near identity of political interests which heretofore, on most occasions, had united both nations, in endeavouring to maintain the liberties and independence of Europe; we cannot but view with the highest admiration and sympathy, the spontaneous efforts which that gallant people have evinced; to shake off the chains of the Ruler of France, and to recur to the Government of their free Constitution, under the guidance of a Prince of the House of Orange and Nassau, by the assistance of whose illustrious ancestors, their original establishment as a nation was achieved: these efforts have been timely aided by your Royal Highness, and we indulge the most sanguine hope, that a renewal of the former alliance and connexion between both countries, will be the happy result of this great and signal revolution.

It is with the highest satisfaction, we also have witnessed the deliverance of the ancient inheritance of your Royal Highness's august family, from the dominion of the enemy; and we should be wanting in proper feelings of gratitude, for the innumerable blessings we have enjoyed by the protection of our civil and religious liberties; under the reigns of the Princes of the House of Brunswick; were we insensible to the gratification which must arise to your Royal Highness, from the return of the allegiance of Hanover to our beloved Sovereign; but as Britons we must also contemplate this event with the greatest exultation.

We cannot quit the presence of your Royal Highness, without offering our humble tribute of admiration, to the recent additional proofs of skill and valour, displayed by the allied armies; under Field-Marshal the Marquess of Wellington, within the boundaries of ancient France. It would be but faint commendation of the reiterated glorious exploits of that great commander and his gallant forces, were we on this occasion to express our feelings in the usual language of panegyric;—his and their deeds will be perpetuated, in a manner infinitely more durable than we can hope to record them; they will exist in the page of history until the latest period of time.

We have only father to renew our assurances to your Royal Highness of our zealous and cordial support in the great cause in which we are engaged. Our fervent prayers shall continue to be offered up, that the wonderful events which have taken place, under the short but most brilliant administration of your Royal Highness, in the name of our revered Sovereign, may lead to a safe, honourable, and permanent peace.

"I return you my warmest thanks for this loyal and affectionate Address.

"The determination manifested through the United Provinces of the Netherlands to shake off the yoke of France, and to re-establish in their Government that illustrious family to whom they originally owed their liberties, was well calculated to call forth amongst all classes of His Majesty's subjects, that sympathy and exultation in which you so largely participate, and which strongly evinces the characteristic generosity of a free people.

"I look forward with the utmost satisfaction and confidence, to the renewal of the same friendly intercourse and connexion between that country and Great Britain, which experience has proved to be equally important to the true interests of both, and to the independence and security of Europe.

WE, His Majesty's loyal and affectionate subjects, the Master, warden, Wardens, and Assistants of the Corporation of the Town and Parish of Sheffield, humbly present your Royal Highness our most dutiful and cordial congratulations on the recent triumphs of His Majesty's arms in Spain and even within the territory of France, and on the victories obtained over the common enemy, and in many, by His Majesty's Allies, on the emancipation of Holland by the people themselves, and on the prospect of the early and entire deliverance of Europe.

It is peculiarly grateful to us that the opportunity we have had of thus addressing your Royal Highness on the present situation of our Country and the Continent, is the most glorious opportunity we ever enjoyed of addressing our Sovereign or his representative, on public affairs, since the war began. The last time we approached the throne on such an occasion, we congratulated your Royal Father, our most gracious Sovereign (whose continuing indisposition we sincerely deplore), on the laurels won by our brave countrymen, under Sir Arthur Wellesley, at the battles of Roca and Vitoria. Since then, we have marked with increasing admiration the progress of that great Commander, in the long, laborious, and complicated struggle, which he has maintained against us, and whose most experienced generals were in vain renewed as he defeated them, and whose most experienced generals were in vain superseded by others as he disgraced them. With equal satisfaction we have observed, that the honours of his Sovereign have been worthily accumulated upon him, as he added to the honours of his country, in every stage of his unparalleled career, from the lines of Torres Vedras whence he looked forward through the fields of battle which he meditated to traverse, to the heights of the Pyrenees, whence he looked back on the fields of glory which he had won.

But he fought not the battles of Spain and Por-

tugal alone, in the Peninsula; the fate of Europe changed with the unexpected resistance to French usurpation there, it hung in suspense while the conflict remained doubtful, and it has been decided in the same hour that the champion of Britain completely delivered the country of our ally. Animated, by the example of a war in which it was manifest that the armies of France, so universally dreaded, were not invincible, when opposed by men born free like Britons, or men fighting to become free like Spaniards; the Sovereigns of the Continent awoke to the knowledge of their true interests, and to the discovery of their true strength; they made one cause with their people, and with each other, and that cause has prevailed. Thus has the spoiler of nations been baffled in the South, and in the North, and in the heart of Europe. In Spain, by British valour and Spanish constancy, he has been expelled from a Kingdom which he had seized by perfidious policy. In Russia, by the self-sacrificing patriotism of the people, he lost an empire which he imagined he had conquered, and lost it in the moment when his victory seemed complete, by the near possession of its ancient capital; the flames of Moscow at once enlightened and warmed the North of Europe, and in Germany, when the fugitive returned to renew the strife for continental ascendancy, he was driven from Dresden to the Rhine, from disaster to disaster, till he had lost in a few days the labours of as many past years, and the hopes of all his future life.

The next victory, on which we congratulate your Royal Highness, is a bloodless one: Holland became free, as the natural consequence of the exhaustion which her oppressor had suffered in Russia and Germany, and by the instantaneous revival of a spirit of liberty, which, for a time had been overwhelmed, but could never be quenched.

We have dwelt long on these events, but it is because their number, as well as their magnitude, forbid compression. We have dwelt long on them, but your Royal Highness will not think that we have dwelt too long on subjects which will furnish lessons to the statesman, examples to the warrior, and themes to the poet and historian, so long as human genius can adorn, or human records perpetuate them; subjects, which, in the present generation, ought never to be out of the eye or the mind of Princes and their people, since on the profitable use of the experience which these have supplied, depend the immediate safety and the lasting independence of the States of Europe. To the profitable use of this experience, according to the magnanimous declaration of your Royal Highness, at the late opening of Parliament, and the temperate, yet noble and public spirited sentiments expressed by your Ministers on the same occasion, we, with the rest of His Majesty's loving subjects, look for the attainment, in due season, of our dearest hope, an honourable, secure, and permanent peace. Meanwhile, may your Royal Highness be guided in your Counsels, and blest in your Person, by that Divine Providence, which has preserved to such venerable old age, the life of your Royal Father, for whom, and for your Royal Highness, as the Ruler over a free, a faithful, and a happy people, we will ever pray.

At the time we deeply deplore the cause which places your Royal Highness in that exalted station, we rejoice in the wisdom with which its arduous duties are performed. Nor do we less applaud the filial piety which has induced your Royal Highness to continue in their respective offices, the faithful Ministers of our beloved and venerable Monarch, than we admire the discreet and successful measures which have been adopted to maintain the dignity of the Sovereign; to promote the welfare of the subject; and (if that indeed were possible) to raise the British name still higher than at any former period, in the estimation of surrounding nations.

Warring, with Heaven on our side, in the cause of justice and charity against tyranny and oppression, a series of victories have attended the British arms, which history will enrol on her brightest page, at the same time she attributes them, under the auspices of Heaven, to the "wise and understanding" Government preserved by your Royal Highness, which knew how so well to appreciate valour, as to select Commanders who have nobly triumphed over the most celebrated Generals of the enemy; an enemy whose uniform aim has been to reduce every civilized country to that state of abject slavery and misery, into which, by his inordinate ambition, he has plunged the devoted people, over whom he still exercises his merciless power. For that misery we cannot but feel, while we contrast it with our own happiness; and trust the times are fast approaching, in the dispensations of a gracious Providence, when the remaining fetters of despotism will be broken; when, imitating the pleasing, the patriotic unanimity which now distinguishes the British Senate and the British People, the Gallic Nation will be at peace with itself, and all the world.

Yet, ardently as we pray for that primary blessing, we deprecate the semblance without the reality; we desire no peace that shall not be sanctioned by honour, and likely to endure the test of time.

This dutiful and loyal address, voted unanimous-

ly, we humbly request your Royal Highness will condescend to receive, signed in our name and in our behalf, by a Peer, who cordially participates in these sentiments, and by the Magistrates who are present at the meeting. *Dudley and Ward.*

To His Royal Highness George-Augustus Frederick Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the inhabitants of Birmingham, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, with assurances of our firm and zealous attachment to your Person and Government, and to express our sympathy with the sorrow of your Royal Highness for His Majesty's continued indisposition. We entreat your Royal Highness to accept our heartfelt congratulations on the great and splendid events which have recently taken place upon the Continent; events which excite a sanguine expectation, that the wisdom and magnanimity, so conspicuously manifested in your councils at home, supported by the enlightened and persevering co-operation of His Majesty's allies abroad, will, through the Divine Blessing, be made conducive to a permanent deliverance from that odious tyranny, which has so long been exercised over the liberties, the commerce, and the industry of nations.

We feel, with the highest gratification, that it is to the generous and unwearied efforts of our own country, in upholding the sacred principle of national independence, so repeatedly and so atrociously violated; and particularly to the successful valour of the allied armies of the Peninsula, led on with such consummate ability by that illustrious commander, Field-Marshal the Marquess of Wellington, as well as to the inordinate ambition and frantic projects of an infatuated enemy, that we have to ascribe the rise of that patriotic ardour and enthusiasm in the confederated powers, which have produced so important a change in the political state of Europe.

Looking, however, beyond the splendour of achievements (which are not accomplished without a lamentable sacrifice of human happiness) to their great object, the substantial blessings of peace; we have received, with admiration and delight, the noble declaration which your Royal Highness, in the hour of victory has made in your gracious speech from the Throne, that "No disposition to require from France sacrifices of any description inconsistent with her honour or just pretensions as a nation, will ever be on the part of your Royal Highness, or on that of His Majesty's allies, an obstacle to peace."

We beg to assure your Royal Highness, that we are prepared to endure every privation that may be necessary to repel any unjust demands on the part of the common enemy, whilst we feel cheered and animated by the hope, which we now confidently indulge, that the miseries inflicted upon Europe, by the insatiable ambition of the Ruler of France, will be soon succeeded by an honourable and lasting peace.

We rejoice that the dignified and patriotic sentiments of your Royal Highness have received the unanimous concurrence of both Houses of Parliament. We earnestly pray that your great and

humane designs may be fully and speedily accomplished; and that your Royal Highness may long be spared to preserve our constitutional privileges; to protect our national rights and honour; and to assist in promoting the tranquillity and happiness of the world.

Contemplating with peculiar delight, a series of successes already productive of the most glorious and beneficial results, we join with one heart and voice, in the universal shout of national exultation at the liberation of the United States of Holland, from the tyranny and oppression under which these provinces have so long groaned; and in the representation to His Majesty's Electoral Dominions of its former mild and benignant Government.

Never, indeed, was there such a combination of great and memorable events, happening within so short a period, to call for public rejoicing. The prospect now opening to our view, as full of delight: All the nations are roused, great and glorious have been their efforts, and we earnestly and confidently hope, that by their firm, united, and unremitting perseverance, the freedom and independence of the Continent will be regained; that the attending consequences, attendant on war, will shortly have an end, and be succeeded by the return of a permanent and honourable peace.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

May it please your Royal Highness,

IT has been the frequent duty, during the last twenty years, of those who represent for the time the ancient Metropolis of Scotland, to approach the Throne with an humble and loyal expression of their sentiments, upon the state of public affairs. This duty they repeatedly discharged, while Britain stood unaided and alone in a conflict, during which her foe proclaimed his hope of terminating her very existence as an independent nation; and when, by the blessing of Divine Providence, the battle was transferred from our gates, we hastened to express our sentiments of that generous line of policy, which held out the strong arm of

succour to those nations, who first sought refuge from tyranny and oppression in manly and patriotic resistance. During each awful vicissitude of an uncertain, unequal, and most perilous struggle, we have deemed it our duty to express our devotion to the principles upon which it was conducted, and our submission to our portion of the sacrifices which its extent and continuance necessarily imposed.

It is with far other thoughts, and far happier prospects, that we now again lay our duty at the feet of your Royal Highness; with feelings which can be likened to none but those of the survivors of the primeval world, when, looking forth from the vessel in which they had been miraculously preserved, they perceived that God had closed in his mercy the fountains of the deep which he had opened in his wrath; that the wind had passed over the waters and assuaged their force; while the re-appearance of ancient and well-known mountains and land-marks, hidden so long under the billows of the inundation, warranted a just and pious confidence, that the hour of its fury had passed away. With the same humble, yet cheerful and well-grounded confidence, we now look abroad on the state of regeneration before us, behold the revival of free nations, and the Oand of the armed oppressor had subjected to his tyrannical rule, and hear from the voice of liberty millions of acclamations (so long suppressed) which were in former days the watchwords of loyalty and national independence. Such are the prospects which a few months have opened upon a war, sacred and honourable, because waged by the Allied Monarchs, from no selfish motives nor ambitious views, but for the avowed, noble, and generous purposes of relieving the oppressed, vindicating the injured, and controlling by their united concentrated force the gigantic power under whose wild, fast, and unbounded projects of ambition, such sets of human blood have been spilt, such a mass of human misery has been created. It is a cause which Heaven has blessed not only with the most glorious success in the field of battle; but with consequences that never before attended even victory itself. Amid the crowd of events, each affording high and separate subject for future hope and instant rejoicing, we cannot but distinguish the restoration of the hereditary provinces of our beloved Monarch to their rightful Lord, and the regeneration of Holland, so long the faithful ally of Great Britain. When we remember that from Hanover proceeded the line of Brunswick, and that Holland once restored to us the Heir of the British Monarchy, and, at a period of like importance, sent forth in our behalf the Vindicator of British liberties, we cannot suppress our earnest and exulting congratulation. Let Europe mark the falsehood of that charge, which accuses Britain of a desire to convert her naval superiority, into the means of exercising tyranny upon the commercial rights of other nations; since, at no moment has the voice of the British nation uttered more genuine sounds of joy, than to hail the revival of a State, which alone, at any period of our history, could be considered as rivalling her in commercial wealth or maritime power.

Let us conclude our hurried and joyful expressions, of the most dutiful and sincere sympathy in these memorable events, with acknowledging the

debt which we owe to the wisdom and steadiness which have guided, in circumstances of incalculable difficulty, the Councils of your Royal Highness, and our beloved Monarch; to their firmness and decision, we owe, under God, the fortunate consummation which seems now to be full in our view. It was on the shores of Portugal, and the fields of Spain, that the bright example was first shown of honourable and successful resistance to the armies of France; and justly may we sympathise in the splendid military successes of those great Continental powers, who have added such a train of continued victories, to these glorious precedents.

That it may please God to bless your Royal Highness in your Person and Government, with the continuance of his safeguard and protection, and finally to establish the cause of social order, by a just, equal, and lasting peace, is the sincere hope and prayer of your Royal Highness's most dutiful subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, in Council assembled.

WAR DEPARTMENT.

Downing-Street, December 14, 1813.

A LETTER, of which the following is an extract, has this day been received by Earl Bathurst, from Major-General Taylor, dated the Hague, December 11, 1813.

IT is with the greatest satisfaction that I have the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that the Allies are in possession of the two important fortresses of Breda and Williamstadt, which have been abandoned by the enemy.

From a person who has seen General Benckendorff this morning, I understand that upon the approach of three hundred Cossacks, who had spread the report that they were the advanced guard of ten thousand Russians, the garrison of Breda, consisting of eighteen hundred men, had marched out, but the Cossacks having penetrated into the town before the evacuation was completed, six hundred of the garrison had fallen into their hands.

General Benckendorff proposed going to Breda himself to-morrow, and will probably carry with him a great proportion of the remainder of his corps. I have not learnt in what direction the garrison retired.

The evacuation of Williamstadt took place last night, in consequence of orders brought by a French General, who had arrived from Antwerp. The garrison, whose numbers are variously stated at from nine hundred to one thousand six hundred, retired in the direction of Bergen-op-Zoom. They left in the place one hundred thousand pounds of powder, one hundred and fifty-two guns mounted and on serviceable carriages, but spiked, and the supply of provisions were small. They had taken measures to destroy the flotilla, but had imperfectly executed the intention; and it was hoped that the corvette, besides other vessels, might be saved. They carried away with them four field-pieces, and are said to have withdrawn the Irish battalion, as soon as they learnt that British troops had landed in Holland.

WAR DEPARTMENT.

Downing-Street, December 14, 1813.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are extracts, have been this day received at Earl Bathurst's office from the Marquess of Wellington, dated St. Jean de Luz, the 22d and 28th of November.

22d November 1813.

THE rain which commenced on the 11th inst. continued, almost without interruption, till the 19th at night, and has left the roads and country in such a state, as to be at this moment impracticable for any general movement of the army.

Lieutenant-General Sir Rowland Hill reconnoitred the enemy's posts at the tête-de-pont at Cambo, on the 12th, and again on the 16th; the enemy withdrew from it on the latter day, having blown up the bridge.

Nothing of importance has occurred since, excepting, that on the 18th instant, the enemy reconnoitred Lieutenant-General Sir John Hope's advanced posts, on which occasion Brigadier-General Wilson was unfortunately wounded.

Marshal Sir William Beresford, on the same day, drove the enemy's posts across the bridge of Urdains, and established his there. On the following morning, before day-light, the enemy made an attempt to drive them in and destroy the bridge; they failed in both attempts, and the Marshal praises the conduct of the 9th Portuguese regiment, under Colonel Sutton, in the first operation, and that of the 11th Caçadores, under Colonel Duersback, in both.

My last reports from Catalonia are dated the 3d of November, and nothing of importance had occurred.

28th November 1813.

NOTHING of importance has occurred since I addressed your Lordship on the 22d instant.

The situation of our line required that the advanced posts of the light division should be pushed more forward than they were, which was effected on the 23d; but the troops having gone rather more forward than was intended, and having got under the fire of the intrenched camp near Bayonne, it was necessary to withdraw them, in doing which some loss, of which I enclose a return, was incurred, and Captain Hobkirk, of the 43d, was made prisoner.

My last reports from Catalonia are of the 18th, at which period no change had taken place.
