THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod. acquainting them, that The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal. Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honour able House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given tò 30.00
