**A PROCLAMATION**

*For a General Thanksgiving.*

GEORGE, P. R.

**WE** do most devoutly and thankfully acknowledge the great goodness and mercy of Almighty God, who, in addition to the manifold and inestimable benefits which this Kingdom has received at His Hands, has continued to us His protection and assistance in the war in which, for the common safety of His Majesty's Dominions, and for disappointing the boundless ambition of France, We are now engaged, and has given to the arms of His Majesty, and to those of His Allies, a series of signal and glorious victories over the forces of the enemy; and, therefore, duly considering that such great and public blessings call for public and solemn acknowledgments, We have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His mercies, be observed throughout those parts of the United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Thursday the thirteenth day of January next; and for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to the occasion, to be used in all churches and chapels, and other places of public worship; and to take care for the timely dispersing of the same throughout their respective dioceses. And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Public Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all His Majesty's loving subjects, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and upon pain of suffering such punishment, as may be justly inflicted upon all such who shall contemn or neglect the same.

day of December, one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign.

*For a Public Thanksgiving.*

**WE** do most devoutly and thankfully acknowledge the great goodness and mercy of Almighty God, who, in addition to the manifold and inestimable benefits which this Kingdom has received at His Hands, has continued to us His protection and assistance in the war in which, for the common safety of His Majesty's Dominions, and for disappointing the boundless ambition of France, We are now engaged, and has given to the arms of His Majesty, and to those of His Allies, a series of signal and glorious victories over the forces of the enemy; and, therefore, duly considering that such great and public blessings call for public and solemn acknowledgments, We have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a Public Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His mercies, be observed throughout that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, on Thursday the thirteenth day of January next. And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Public Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all His Majesty's loving subjects in Scotland, on the said thirteenth day of January next, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His wrath and indignation; and upon pain of such punishment as may be justly inflicted, on all such as contemn or neglect the same. Our will and pleasure, is, there-

fore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in His Majesty's name and authority, make publication thereof, that none pretend ignorance: And Our will and pleasure is, that His Majesty's Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom we ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send copies thereof to the several parish churches within their bounds, that, upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits immediately after divine service.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the ancient relations of Peace and Amity between His Majesty and the United Provinces of the Netherlands, have been happily re-established; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared;

1<sup>stly</sup> That all hostilities against the United Provinces of the Netherlands, (save and except such ports or places as may be still in the possession, or under the controul of France) on the part of His Majesty shall immediately cease.

2<sup>dly</sup> That the blockade of all the ports and places of the said United Provinces, (save and except such ports and places as before excepted) and all other restrictions thereon imposed by any Order in Council relating thereto, shall forthwith cease and be discontinued.

3<sup>dly</sup> That all ships and vessels belonging to the said United Provinces (save and except vessels coming from, or proceeding to, any ports or places in the possession or under the controul of France) shall have free admission into His Majesty's ports, and be permitted to carry on any trade, now lawfully carried on in the ships of States in amity with His Majesty.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS it appears by the latest advices from the coast of the Adriatic, that the port of Trieste, and the other ports and places between Trieste and the southern extremity of Dalmatia, are, for the most part, no longer in the possession or under the controul of France: His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that the blockade of Trieste and the ports and places aforesaid inclusively (save and except such as are still occupied by the enemy), and all restrictions imposed thereon by any Order in Council relating thereto, shall forthwith cease and be discontinued.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor of the city of York, and the inhabitants of that city and its vicinity, impressed with devout gratitude to the Almighty for the signal successes with which he has vouchsafed to bless the arms of His Majesty and his Allies, in the present most eventful campaign, feel it our duty to approach your Royal Highness with our congratulations on the glorious prospects which have thus been opened of securing the permanent repose and happiness of Europe.

During the long and arduous contest in which we have been engaged, the firmness of the British character has maintained its proud ascendancy.

Even under the least auspicious circumstances, never despairing of the final result of the righteous cause in which we were embarked, we have disdained to bend before the Ruler of France, and to purchase a short respite from the evils of war by the sacrifice of national independence or national rights.

At present we have to exult in the widely altered scene which the freedom of other nations, achieved not solely by their own exertions, but aided by the liberal hand of Great Britain, and supported by the

consummate skill of her military leaders, and the irresistible valour of her troops, presents to our contemplation: Whilst France, which had meditated the violation of our shores with a numerous and powerful host, is herself now suffering, on her own frontier, from a British army, the very invasion with which she had menaced us.

It is, under Providence, to the enlightened policy of this country, and to the principles from which that policy has flowed, that we mainly attribute these distinguished results.

If, whilst other nations have crouched beneath the yoke of despotism, England alone has sustained the cause of freedom, it is because our Constitution has taught us to sacrifice existence itself rather than compromise our liberty.

If, whilst France aimed at aggrandisement by oppression, England identified her interests with the emancipation of other States, it was because experience had taught her, that an equal balance of power is essential to the welfare of nations.

In conclusion; we beseech your Royal Highness to accept the humble assurances of our unalterable duty and attachment to the Crown and Government of these realms, of our affection for your Royal Highness's person, and of our hearty concurrence in such measures for the further prosecution of the war, as may be most conducive to the attainment of a safe and honourable peace.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with our warm congratulations on the glorious and welcome intelligence of the re-establishment of the independence of Holland, after the miseries, the calamities, and unmerited oppressions with which it has been so long afflicted by the insatiable enemy of Europe.

We also view with peculiar interest the restoration of His Majesty's Electoral dominions, and the splendid and brilliant victories obtained by His Majesty and his illustrious Allies over the French armies:—Victories which have proved the impotence of tyranny, when encountered by the united efforts of men fighting for national independence, and forced to have recourse to arms.

And the faithful citizens of Dublin cannot but remember with the warmest admiration, that in the general convulsion of Europe, the British empire stood proudly pre-eminent, undaunted, and unsubdued; and with spirit and firmness that ensures her immortal glory, became the champion of the injured and oppressed, and successfully combatted with

her invincible armies the most tremendous despotism that ever disgraced the page of history.

And allow us here to add, that in those tempestuous times the loyal citizens of Dublin, animated with the same spirit, were determined with fidelity to share in all the vicissitudes of Britain's fate, and to stand or to gloriously fall in the generous cause.

We most earnestly hope that the God of Battles, who continues to extend his divine favour to His Majesty's arms, may enable him and his illustrious Allies to compel their enemies to sue for such a peace as will be consistent with the honour, the security, and the permanent tranquillity of all the belligerent powers.

Although removed by our situation from the probability of partaking very materially or immediately in the commercial advantages likely to result from them, yet we assure your Royal Highness that we yield to none of His Majesty's subjects in the feelings of exultation which they are naturally calculated to excite.

Gallant, and much injured nations, emancipating themselves from a galling slavery by deeds of heroic valour, an ancient Ally, by whose side we have so often fought the battles of civil and religious liberty, restored to us, the pride and power of an ambitious and implacable enemy, humbled and broken, are circumstances which cannot fail to afford a heartfelt gratification to every friend to humanity, and every lover of his country. As Englishmen, we feel this gratification more strongly, from the reflection that the spirit which has produced these glorious results has emanated from the example which this country has exhibited to an admiring world, of patience, resolution, self-devotion, and magnanimity in the arduous struggle in which it has been so long engaged with the great enemy of the happiness of the civilized world.

But glorious and gratifying as these events are in themselves, and in their immediate consequences, the ulterior, and as we trust not distant, effect which we anticipate from them, adds much to their value in our estimation. The satisfaction we derive from them is materially increased by the hope that in consequence of them, to the other glories of your Royal Highness's administration will be added the crown and consummation of them all, an honourable and durable peace. Extract of a Dispatch from Sir Charles Stuart, K. B. to Viscount Castlereagh, dated Lisbon, December 11, 1813.

**T**HE General Order, of which I enclose a copy, was addressed to the Portuguese army by Marshal Beresford shortly after the assault of the French works on the 11th of November.

Head-Quarters, Ustaritz,  
November 28, 1813.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

**MARSHAL** Beresford, Marquess of Campo Maior, never fails to feel satisfaction, when any opportunity presents itself of noticing the good conduct of the army of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the face of the enemy. His Excellency congratulates the Portuguese nation on the increase of glory acquired by their fellow-countrymen in arms in the battle of the 10th instant, when the allied army, under the most illustrious and excellent Marshal General Duke of Vittoria, expelled the enemy from the position and entrenchments which they had occupied upon their own frontier, the brave soldiers of His Royal Highness sharing with those of His Britannic Majesty (between whom there is, and has ever been, such strict and perfect harmony, as well in marching united against the enemy, as in mutual admiration and exchange of friendly offices in all circumstances) the honour and glory acquired by the Anglo-Portuguese in this exploit. The enemy was driven from positions, impregnable against the attacks of any other army; but the impulse with which the Allies carried them was irresistible. His Excellency will have great pleasure in acquainting His Royal Highness with the merits of his army upon this occasion.

The Marshal, besides having already forwarded to His Royal Highness the names of the Officers and inferior Officers who have been particularly recommended by their respective Commanders, in preferring them to His Royal Highness's notice, cannot refrain from evincing his pleasure at the good conduct of the division under the command of Lieutenant-General John Hamilton; and he begs to assure Brigadier-Generals A. Campbell and John Buchan, of the 4th and 2d brigades, and the Officers, inferior Officers, and soldiers of the division, of his entire satisfaction. Lieutenant-Colonel A. Tulloch merits the approbation of His Excellency, for the great service rendered by the artillery under his command, in which is comprehended the brigade of nine-pounders, commanded by First Lieutenant Joze Joaquim Barreiros, of the regiment of artillery No. 4.

Major-General Manly Power and the 8th brigade will accept the testimony of His Excellency, in having evinced their accustomed good conduct; as also the Colonel Joze de Vasconcellos, and the 9th brigade under his orders, and he pays a high compliment to these two brigades, in assuring them that they have kept pace with their former reputation.

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Major-General Manly Power notices particularly Lieutenant-Colonel Dürzbach on this and many other occasions. Colonel Joze de Vasconcellos also particularly mentions Major John Scott Little.

His Excellency observed the firmness, regularity, and excellent discipline of the 6th Brigade, which being posted in reserve, had no opportunity of fighting; but its conduct is worthy of his Excellency's approbation, and of which he begs Colonel John Doyle will assure the officers, inferior officers and soldiers.

Nor can the Marshal quit expressing his approbation of Major-General Charles Frederic Lecor, who commanded on that day the 7th Division of the Allied Army, acting under the immediate eye of his Excellency, and who himself bears witness to the talents, and zeal he displayed in this command. The Marshal has great pleasure in manifesting his satisfaction at the conduct of Colonel John Douglas, the Regiment of infantry No. 17, and the Battalion of Caçadores No. 9, who commanded that part of the 7th Brigade which was engaged in the contest; and he owes, as a duty to his brigade, his complete approval, thus publicly stating, of their behaviour in two former actions fought by them in front of Ordaz, with a valour worthy the Portuguese nation. The Battalion of Caçadores No. 9, knows how to acquire the esteem of its Generals.

His Excellency acknowledges his obligations to the regiment of infantry No. 17, and the battalions of Caçadores Nos. 1 and 3, forming part of the light division, for its good conduct in the battle.

The Marshal praises the activity and good dispositions of Dr. M'Lagum, Surgeon-Major of the 9th Brigade, manifested in the promptitude and zeal displayed in his care of all the wounded, in having them accommodated, attended to, and their cases treated on the spot.

Under existing circumstances, the Marshal cannot conclude without thanking the Portuguese army, not only for their conduct in the battle, but also for having done away the necessity of his exhortations, in even deserving his particular approbation for their regular deportment in quarters, and towards the inhabitants. The Portuguese soldiers have no less shewn to the French army their inferiority in the field and in military qualifications, than evinced to the French nation how much they excel their troops in point of morals, humanity, and good behaviour. By these means as well as by their discipline and valour, have the Portuguese forces so greatly augmented their country's honour, and established their claim to the particular thanks of their august Sovereign, who is at once the example and the rewarder of all virtues.

Europe will perceive and honour the virtues of the Portuguese nation, as set forth by their army.
