A T the Court at Carlton-House, the 14th of January 1814,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

THEREAS, in consequence of the successes which have attended His Majesty's arms, divers ports and places in France have been, and may be, placed in the military occupation, or under the protection, of His Majesty; and it is expedient that the same be open to the trade of all Nations, not being at war with His Majesty or any of the Allied Powers; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that all such ports and places as aforesaid, after the same shall have been declared by the Commander of His Majesty's forces in those parts to be so far under the protection of His Majesty, as that British subjects may safely trade thereat, shall be forthwith released from the restrictions of blockade heretofore imposed thereon as parts of France; and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty's subjects, and other persons as aforesaid, to trade thereat, subject to such regulations as shall be imposed thereon by His Majesty, or by the Commander of His Majesty's forces in those

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.
