Here are arrived Deputies from the Chapter of Liege, who eume to reprefent to his Electoral Highmes, the proceedings of the French in the Country of Liege.

Hamburg, fan. 13. The Duke of Hanouer is going to make the Elector of Brandenbarg a Vifit ; and the general $\mathrm{o}_{1}$ mion is, when together, will take the Relolutions neceffary for the maintaining the peace of the Empire, From Saxony they write, that the Court is full of ld experienced Officers; that the Elector is going to provide Magazines in fome of the mof convenient l'aces within his Territories; and that hos Electoral Highaefs will in a fhort time have a very good Army on foot.

Brufels, fan. 13. The Prince of $p_{\text {arma, }}$ of whofe return hither we told you in our laft. has fetled Affairs in Flaxders to his great-fatisfdetion; the States having conferted to the Subfidies he demanded for the payment of the Troops in that Province, © $\mathcal{E}_{*}$ From Liege they write, that now they begin to defpair of accommodating Matbers with their Elector ; That the Chapter of Liege had rent Deputies to Cologne, to reprefent to his Electoral Highnels, the fad condition the Countrey is reduced to by the proceedings of the French, and to pray b/m to fend fome fit perlon to Paris, to lay their Complaints before the King. In the Province of Limburg, the people are in great fear of the French, and therefore remove their beft Goods to Aix la Cbapelle, and to Maeftricht.

Hague, Fan. 16. The States of Holland have refolved to raife the Moneys demanded by the Council of State, for the maintainance of the Forces this prefent year ; upon which the Officers have received Orders to b gin their Recruits, which will in all amount to betwe $n$ io and 11000 Men. We have an account from Paris, that the Heer Van Starenberg, our Ambaffudor, was arrived there. We are informed, that overtures have been made for the exchanging the Marquifate of Bergen-op-zoom, with fuch Lands as belong to the Prince of Orange in Burgundy, but that the French King has not approved of them.

Paris, fan. 14. Ry the way of Venice we have Advice, That the Peace which the Sieur du Quefne had made with the Tripolins had been confirmed at Conflantinople; we know not the Conditions, becaufe the Bark that was charged with the sieur du Quefne's Letters, has been taken by the Algerines. It is added that the Sieur $d u$ Quefne having finifhed this Affair with the Tripolins, is to go for Conftantinople to fcteh away our Ambaffador, if the Grand Vizier continues to deny him the Sofa. They of Thnis have demanded the liberty of the Moors, belonging to that City, that are Slaves in the French Gallies, and feem to have a mind to make this a pretence to break withus. It is faid that the King is going to eftablifh a Bank here ${ }_{k}$ as is now at Fenice and Loor. On Friday lalt the Commiffioners appointed by the King to examine the Propofitions of the Deputies of the Clergy concerning the Regality, met at St. Germains, occafioned, as is thought, by the arrival of a Courier from Rome, which we are told, brought among other things an account, that
the Pope contit ued very firm in that Matter. According to the lall account we had from Luxemburg, our Troops continued very clofely to block up that Place, fome of them beiug' polled within Canenfhot. It is daid, thar the King Declared on Monday latt to the Archbilhop of Paris, That he did approve the Propofitions of the Clergy in the matter of the Regality; and told him, that the faid Deputies of the Clergy would do well in the next place, to confider how the faid Propofitions may be beft put in execution.

Swanzey, fan. s. We have had very bad weather, in whicha Ship of Brifol, called the Viltory, of 400 Tuns, was calt away near the Holmes, moft of the Seamen being Saved, but the Paffengers Drowned.

Whitehal, $\ddagger$ an. ru. This day tl e Ambaffador from the King of Fez and Morocco had his publick Audience of their Majeflies: He was brought from his Houle in the Strand, by the Right Honourable the Earl of Ranelagh, one of the Gentlemen of his Majefties Bedichamber, and Sir Cbarles Cotterel, Malter of the Ceremonies, in His Majefties Coach, followed with a great many other Coaches with fix Horfis apiece, to whitebal, in the ufual manner, and was conducted through His Majefties FootGuards to the Council-Chamber, andafter a fhort fay there to the Banquering-Houfe, where he was received at the Door by the Right Honourable the Earl of Arlington, Lord Chamberlain of His Majeflies Houlhold, and led up to their Majefties, who were Scated under the State, attended by a very great number of the Nobilicy and Gentry, and by His Majefties Band of Gentlemen-Penfioners, and Yeomen of the Guard. The Ambalfador having made a chort Speech, prefented to His Majefty a Letter from the King his Mafter, which His Majefty delivered to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Fenkins, who received it upon his Knee: After which, His Majefty was pleafed to ask the Ambaffador of the Health of the King of Fez ; and the Ambaffador having Anfwered thercunto, and finilhed what elfe he had to fay, was reconducted in the fame manner he came, to his Houfe.
