AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 21st of January 1814,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the fifteenth day of July last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the eighth day of February next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months, to commence from the said eighth day of February next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by

an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition:" But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall prevent the exportation of any of the articles, specified in the Order in Council of the 20th May last to the coast of Africa, under the conditions contained in the said Order. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the fifteenth day of July last, prohibiting, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, the transporting into any parts out of this

kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, or other naval stores, will expire upon the eighth day of February next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whosoever do, at any time for the space of six months from the said eighth day of February next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores, or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and

settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz: bar iron, white and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, far-paulins for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter, to any of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord

High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the High Sheriff, Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, Yeomanry, and Freeholders of the County of Devon, approach your Royal Highness with our heartfelt congratulations on the prosperous events which are yet flowing in a course to effect the deliverance of Europe from the alarm which has overspread it for the last twenty years.

In contemplating with admiration the victorious progress of the allied armies in Germany, and the consequent extinction of the Rhenish Confederacy, by which that empire was held in a state of delusive bondage, we see, with most sincere satisfaction, His Majesty's Hanoverian subjects released from the misery and degradation of foreign despotism, and restored to their liberties and proper allegiance.

In the first dayspring of political regeneration, we have hailed with the highest exultation the successful effort of the people of Holland, in shaking off the chains by which they had been bound to the dominion of France, as an integral province of that assumed empire, and calling forth, with one voice, the energies of their former Government, under the protection of that illustrious family, by whose valour their freedom was first asserted, and by whose patriotism it has been so long and so gloriously maintained.

We have seen with additional satisfaction, the immediate support afforded by your Royal Highness's Government to this glorious exertion; from whence we derive the happy presage of its cementing still more strongly that union of interests which has heretofore contributed, not less to the prosperity of both countries, than to the tranquility of Europe.

Our commercial interests have not been more deeply concerned, even in this great event, than in the total abolition of that continental system, which by kindling this last war, has in its consequences brought on all those defeats and disgraces on its author, who vainly presumed, without ships, colonies, or commerce, to disappoint, by the iron hand of force, the industry of those nations who are, under Providence, possessed of these advantages.

In the bright horizon which now surrounds us, our national feelings have been principally excited by the transactions in the Peninsula, where our own armies, under their renowned Commander, after having expelled the invader from Portugal and Spain, have been the first to set their feet on French ground.

We feel great pleasure in ascribing the events which are now passing, in a great degree, to the influence of this country, by its steady and invariable perseverance in maintaining the cause of national independence and civil liberty, against the lawless claims of tyranny, violence, and usurpation.

Admiralty-Office, January 29, 1814.

ADmiral Sir John Warren, has transmitted to John Wilson Croker, Esq. a letter from Captain Brown, of His Majesty's ship *Lotre*, giving an account of his having on the 10th of December captured the *Rolla*, American privateer, of five guns and eighty men, out the night before from Newport.

And also the following letters, forwarded to the Admiral by Captain Barrie, of the *Dragon*, senior officer in the Chesapeake, viz.

A letter from Captain Cator, of His Majesty's sloop *Actæon*, dated 22d September, reporting his having landed with a party of marines in Lynhaven Bay, and destroyed a barrack of the enemy, with all the military stores, after a short action with a body of American dragoons and infantry stationed there, in which nine of the enemy were taken, and several killed or wounded, with the loss of only one marine, badly wounded.

A letter from Captain Jackson, of His Majesty's ship *Lacedæmonian*, dated 23d September, stating the destruction of several American vessels, by the boats of the above ship, and *Mohawk* schooner, in Chertown and King's Creeks. The enemy assembled in numbers on the shore, but were scattered by the fire from the boats, with the loss of from twenty to thirty killed and wounded; one man in the boats was killed, and two wounded.

A letter from Lieutenant Pedlar, of the *Dragon*, dated the 5th November, giving an account of his having, with the boats of that ship and *Sophie* sloop, brought out, without loss, three American vessels from a creek in the River Potowmack.

*His Majesty's Sloop Pelican, Plymouth,
January 20, 1814.*

I BEG to acquaint you, that, on the 13th instant, I captured, after a chase of twelve hours, the American schooner *Siro*, letter of marque, of two hundred and twenty-five tons burthen, mounting twelve nine-pounders, with forty-nine men,

and a cargo of cotton, from South Carolina, bound to Bourdeaux; is a remarkably fast-sailing vessel, quite new, pierced for sixteen guns, coppered, and copper-fastened, had been chased by several of our cruisers, but escaped by her superior sailing, and was intended to cruize for the annoyance of our trade.

And His Royal Highness has been further pleased to command, that His Majesty's said concession and especial mark of His Royal Honour, together with the relative documents, be registered in His College of Arms.
