Muskow, Novemb. 8. Ince the conclusion of the Peace between our Czar and the Grand Signiof, very little has passed here, worth acquainting you with: we are expecting the Ratifications of the laid Peace, the Czar having lent an Amballador to Constantinople to carry his, and to exchange them with those of the Port. Some have indeed raised a report, that the Grand Signior makes difficulty to confirm the faid Peace, looking upon feveral Articles of it to be too advantagious to the Molcovites; and that our Ambassador is dead in his journey, but there seems not to be any grond for either. The Commissioners appoint ed by the Kirg of Sweden and the Czar, for the adjusting the differences concerning the Limits, have had several Meetings in a small place on the frontiers, but with the same success that their former Conferences on this subject have had, both Parties continuing obstinate in their Pretensions, and appearing resolved not in the least to yield to the other. The Czar, we are told, intends to go and visit his Frontiers towards Sweden and Poland.

Dantzick, Decemb. 17. The Letters from Poland give us an account, that the King was refelved to call another Dyet in February or March, which it is hoped will-have a better conclusion, than that which was held in the beginning of this year; That the Peace between the Turks and the Moscovites was not yet ratified; and that the Poles were well pleased to see the Ratifications thus delayed; and endeavoured what they could to make a new breach between the Turks and the Moscovites.

Copenbagen, Jan. 6. The Fortifications of the Cafile of Cronenburg having received very great prejudice, by the viclent florms we have had of late in these parts, the King went thither three or four days fince to take an Account thereof, and to give Orders for the repairing the damages they had fultained. The last week arrived an Express from Paris, with Letters for the French Ambassador here, who fince, has had several Conferences with Count Alefelt, Great Chancellor of this Kingdom. It is faid, that the faid Ambassador endeavours to diffwade our King from entring into the cague of Guaranty, lately concluded between the Capwn of Sweden and the States-General of the United Provinces. We are told that our King intends to goin the Spring for Norway, and that fix men of War are ordered to be fitted out for that purpose. From Stockholme they write, that the King of Sweden was so well recovered, that he would in a very short tim: be able to go abroad.

Turin, Dec. 17. A Company having been established here, for the managing a Trade with Portugal, and Moneys for that purpose advanced by several par-

ticular persons, and Orders given for the buying of Ships in Holland: It has after all, been found to be a design that is not like to turn to any account; and therefore the persons that the most zealously promoted it, do now give it over, and the Moneys advanced are to be returned to the Owners thereof. There have been at this Court three Princes of Neuburg; and this Morning they are gone for Milan, and from thence will go and vist other parts of Italy. On Monday last arrived here the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo from Spain; he is going to Milan to take possession of the Command of General of the Horse in that Dutchy, which the King of Spain has lately conferred upon him. The French intend to add several new Fortifications to Cazal; the Governor Monsieur Catenat has been very ill.

Vienna, Jan. 3. The Emperor, we are told, is sending several persons to Germany, to press the Circles to furnish forthwith their respective Quota's to the Army of the Empire, that so it may be brought on for, to act this next Summer, as the Affairs of the Empire shall require. There are fresh Letters from Hungary, but they give not any account of the meeting of the Emperors Commissioners with the Deputies of Count Teckeley, and the other Heads of the Rebels. It's probable our next Letters will, and that they will tell us what we may expect from it. The Journey of Count Caprara, whom the Emperor had appointed to go his Ambassador to the Grand Signiar, is flopt for the present, upon some Advices received from Constantinople; what they are we cannot yet learn; but in the general it is faid, that this Court is well affored of the Refolutions of the Port to continue the Peace between the two Empires. We are fill expecting the Duke of Lorrain, upon whose arrival a great Council of War will be held, and several important Resolutionstaken with refation to the Affairs of Germany, which seem at prefent to be the great subject of the Consultations

Berlin, Jan. 14. Monsieur Rabenac, Envoye from France, is often with our Elector's Ministers, and omits nothing that may promote the Interests of his Master, and keep his Electoral Highnes from entring into the League of Guaranty, which is proposed for the maintaining the peace of Germany; but we do not find his endeavours have any great succes; his Electoral Highness seeming resolved not to depart from the Interests of the Empire. And in these his Resolutions it's not doubted, he will be consirmed by the Duke of Hanouer, who as we have already told you, is expected here very suddainly, and who we are informed, comes as well to make his Electoral Highness a wist, as to confer with him concerning the present state of Assairs, and to concert with him the Measures, which shall appear necessary

netellary to the title for the defence and fecurity of the Empire in general, and their own Territories and Dominions in particular. We cannot yet learn the huliness the Sicur Foulkes, his Electoral Highnesses Secretary, was lately tent to Copenhagen upon, but every body concludes it to be of moment.

Hamburg, Fan. 13. The Duke of Hanouer, if the Reports that are abroad be true, has concluded a Defensive Allyance with ite El for of Suxuny; and will endeavour to engage the Elector of Brandenburg, to whom he is going to make a Visit, to become a Party in it. In the mean thing the Elector of Saxony, the Duke of Zell, and the Duke of Hanouer are making Levics in their respective Territories, intending to have each of them a good Army on foot. The Langrave of Heffe Caffel likewise raises Men, resolving, as is faid, to have a Body of fix thousand Men in his Pay; and other Princes of Germary are also making preparations, so that we doubt not but my alhors time to see the Empire in a very good pessure of Desence. The first Instant arrived here the Duke of Wolfemburtell, he is about buying a Houle here, which lately belonged to the Sicur Garmer, and cost in Building 15000. Yesserday the Merchants Adventurers reliding here, made a most Noble Entertainment for Bevil Skeiten, Eig. His Majesties Envoye Extraordinary to the Lukes of Lunenburg, and the Hans Towns.

Hague, Fan. 20. The 17th Instant arrived here the Secretary of our Ambassador in France, with Letters from his Excellency to the States; upon, which, the Deputies for Foreigh Affairs prefently mer, and in the Evening were to wait upon his Highness the Prince of Orange, to acquaint him with what they had done. From Amsterdam they write, that they had Letters from Argiers, which gave an account, that those Corsairs had taken and brought to Argiers 27 or 28 French Ships and Barques, and in them near one thouland Seamen and Pallengers. which they had made Slaves. The late violent Storms have done much harme in the Texel, though we have not yet the particulars. From Berin our Letters tell us, that they were making great preparations there to receive the Duke and Ducheis of Hanouer; and that the, El Ctor of Brandenburg was in very good Health, being for the present quite rid of the Gout. Our less Letters from Bruffels are of the 15th Inflant, and bring us not any thing of moment.
