**T**HIS day the Right Honourable Hugh Elliot was, by command of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HEREAS by virtue of the powers vested in His Majesty by sundry Acts of Parliament, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 7th of this instant March, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to allow, and did thereby allow, for the space of six months, to commence from the 25th day of this instant March, the importation from any port or place whatsoever, into any port or place of Great Britain of certain articles of provision therein named, subject to the rules and regulations set forth in the said Order, without payment of any duty whatsoever, except in respect to the article of rice, which when imported should be subject to such duties as might by law be payable hereon; and whereas it is expedient that rice im-

ported in British ships or vessels, directly from any of the possessions of the East India Company, or from any British colony or plantation, should be exempted from the payment of the said duties, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, by virtue of the powers vested in His Majesty by sundry Acts of Parliament, set forth in the said Order in Council of the 7th of this instant March, is thereupon pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the space of six months from and after the 25th day of this instant March, the importation of rice from any of the possessions of the East India Company, or from any British colony or plantation, in British ships or vessels, without payment of any duty whatsoever; any thing contained in the Order in Council above-mentioned of the 7th day of this instant March, to the contrary notwithstanding. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. *Chetwind.*

**A**T the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 7th of March 1814,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HEREAS, by virtue of the powers vested in His Majesty, by sundry Acts of Parliament, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, by His Order in Council of the twentieth of February one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to allow, and did thereby allow, until the twenty-

fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, the importation into any port or place of Great Britain, of certain articles of provisions, in the manner and under the conditions therein mentioned; and whereas by an Act passed in the fifty-first year of His present Majesty, cap. 14, it is enacted, that an Act made in the thirty-ninth year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the exportation, and permit the importation of corn; and for allowing the importation of other articles of provision without payment of duty, to continue in force until six weeks after the commencement of the next session of Parliament," which was continued by an Act of the thirty-ninth and fortieth years of His present Majesty, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eleven, shall, from and after the said twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eleven, be, and the same is thereby further continued during the continuance of the war, and until six months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is thereupon pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for the space of six months, to commence from the twenty-fifth day of this instant March, the importation from any port or place whatsoever into any port or place of Great Britain, of any beans, called kidney or French beans, tares, lentiles, calavancies, and all other sorts of pulse; and also of bulls, cows, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, and swine; and of beef, pork, mutton, veal, and lamb (except salted beef and pork); and of bacon, hams, tongues, butter, cheese, potatoes, rice, sago, sago powder, tapioca, vermicelli, millet seed, poultry, fowls, eggs, game, and sour crout, in any British ship or vessel, or in any other ship or vessel belonging to persons of any kingdom or state in amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any manner whatever, without payment of any duty whatsoever, except in respect to the article of rice, which, when imported, shall be subject to such duties as may by law be payable thereon; provided that a due entry shall be made of all such articles as aforesaid that shall be imported; with the proper officers of the Customs at the port where the same shall be imported, under the penalties and forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act, passed in the thirty-ninth year of His present Majesty: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. *Chetwynd*

*A Return of the Casualties in the Passage of the Bar of Bayonne, on the 24th day of February 1814.*

His Majesty's Brig Martial—Captain Elliott, drowned; Surgeon (Mr. Norman), killed; four seamen, drowned.

His Majesty's Brig Lyra—Mr. Henry Bfoye, Master's Mate, leading the passage of the Bar, drowned; five seamen drowned.

His Majesty's Ship Porcupine—Two seamen drowned.

Three transport boats lost, number of men unknown.

Gun-Boat, No. 20.—One seaman and one artilleryman badly wounded.

One Spanish chasse marée, the whole of whose crew perished in an instant.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Otway, of His Majesty's Ship Ajax, addressed to Admiral Lord Keith, and transmitted by his Lordship to John Wilson Croker, Esq.]*

*Ajax, Scilly, N. 30 Leagues, March 17, 1814.*

I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship, that I have just captured, after a chase of five hours, L'Alcyon, a fast sailing French man of war brig, mounting sixteen twenty-four-pounders, with a complement of one hundred and twenty men, commanded by a Lieutenant de Vaisseau. She was well equipped for a four months cruize, and was only twenty-four hours from St. Maloes, when we brought her to.

I BEG to inform your Lordship, that the Andromache has just captured, La Comete, ketch privateer, of fourteen six-pounders (pierced for eighteen) and sixty-five men.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto the Honourable Sir Charles William Stewart, Knight of the most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Prussia, Lieutenant General in the Army, and Knight Commander of the Royal Portuguse Military Order of the Tower and Sword; His Majesty's Royal License and Permission, that he may accept and wear the insignia of the Imperial Russian Military Order of St. George of the fourth class, and also the insignia of a Knight Commander and Grand Cross of the Royal Swedish Military Order of the Sword, and the decorations of the Grand Prussian Orders of the Black and Red Eagle, which their Majesties the Emperor of Russia, the King of Sweden, and the King of Prussia, have been respectively pleased to confer upon the said Sir Charles William Stewart, in testimony of the high sense those Sovereigns entertain of his signal services in the cause of Europe, and of his distinguished gallantry and conduct in the battle of Culm, on the 30th day of August last (wherein he was wounded), and in the battles fought before Leipsig on the 18th and the 19th days of October last.

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command that the said Royal concessions and decorations, together with the relative documents, be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
