Extract of a Letter from Captain Otway, of His Majesty's Ship Ajax, addressed to Admiral Lord Keith, and transmitted by his Lordship to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

Ajax, Scilly, N. 30 Leagues, March 17, 1814.

I HAVE the bonour to inform, your Lordship. that Lhave just captured, after a chace of five hours, L'Alcyon, a fast sailing French man of war brig, mounting sixteen twenty-four-pounders, with a complement of one hundred and twenty men, commanded by a Lieutenant de Vaisseau. She was well equipped for a four months cruize, and was only twenty-four hours from St. Maloes, when we brought her to.
