CHe Duke of Mantoua is come to pass the Cainaval in this City, but his Highnels, fince his arrival, has been very much inditpoled, though 'tis hoped without any danger. From Conflantinople we have an account by Letters, of no very freih date, that the Grand Vizier flrugled with many Enemies, and fome very confiderable ones, who laboured his ruine, and made use of all the opportunities they could lay hold of to create in the Grand Signior an ill opinion of his Administration of Affairs; and that while the Grand Vizier was employed in feuring himfelf at home against these his Adversaries, there was no likelybood of his entring into any Forreign Wars; that this was one, if not the main reafon of his concluding a Peace with the Moscovites, upon Terms lo advantageous to them, and of his expecting with fo much carnefinefs, the arrival of the Molcovite Amballador, who is to exchange the Ratifications of the faid Peace.

Berlin, Fan. 13. Yesterday arrived here the Sieur Liliencroon, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark to the Emperor, in his way to Vienna, and having made his Compliment to his Electoral Highnels, he parted from hence this Afternoon, to continue his Journey. From Warfam they write, that the King of Poland had offered his Mediation for the compoling Matters between the Emperor and the Hungarians that are in Arms, which it was hoped would very much contribute to a speedy accommodation. The Letter add, that there was not at prefent fo good a correspondence between the King of *Poland* and the French Court, as there had been, the King of *Poland* b ing much difgulied at fome things. The Duke and Durchels of *Hanouer* are expected here the next week, but the Date of Zell, it's faid, will not be of the Journey. We are told that there is arrived at the Court of the Duke of Zell an Envoye from the Duke of Modena, to demand the Princels of Zell in Marriage for

Cologne, Fan. 16. The Prince Etneft of Heffe has been here feveral days, and is Lodged in the Houle of the Bilhop of Strasburg; and in a day or two will part again for Rbinfeldt, the place of his Relidence. From Francfort they write, that Duke Fohn Adolph, Unkle to the prefent King of smeden, was gone for Meiz, to Demand of the So-

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vereign Chamber eftablished there, the Investure of the Lukedom of Deux Ponis, in which it's thought he will hardly fucceed, feeing the French King has already given that Dutchy to the Prince of Birkenfeldt, and that the laid Prince has done Homage to the King for it; That on the 8th Inflant all the Deputies of the Princes of the Empire, now at Francfort, had a Meeting at the Houle of the Count of Rojenberg, the first of the Emperors Ambailadors; and that it was expected the Refolutions that had been taken there, would be known in few days. The Commissioners of our Elector, and those of the Duke of Juliers, are now met to adjust the differences between those Princes, concerni g their Limits.

Hague, Jan. 20. The Scoretary of the Heer Van Starenberg, Amballador from this State in France, who arrived here fome days fince, as we are informed, brought an Account, That the French Kirg had re-fuled to receive the Memorial, which the faid Ambaffador had Orders to Prefent joyntly with the English Minister at that Court, concerning the pre-sent state of Affairs; his most Christian Majesty fay-ing, He would not allow of a Confederacy within bu and Kingdom: upon which we are told, the Status have fent new Infructions to their Amballa dor.

Hague, Jan. 10. We have an account from France that the Spanish Ambasfador, having presented a Memorial to that King, concerning the Bloquade of Luxemburg, had received an Anlwer to it, which was, That bis most Christian Majesty would remove bis Troops from before Luxemburg, so foon as the King of Spain shall bave given bim stufation in his presen-fions upon the Countrey of Alost, and other places in Flanders; as likewise for the killing of the French Soldiers by a party of the Garrison of Luxemburg, in a place under the subjection of Frances and the Mur-

ther of the Fishermen of Andayc. Paris, Jan. 21. The Deputies of the Clergy having after scoreral Meetings, and mature Deli-berations in the matter of the Regality, resolved humbly to propose to the King, That for the future no Ecclessifical Person may enjoy a Deanary, Prebend, or other Dignity or Benefice, to which be longs any Spiritual Function, unless he has attained the Age, the Degrees, and oth r Capaci-ties preferib d by the Canons and Ordonances; That thole, on whom his Majelly shall in right of his Regativy, confer any Benefices, that have Ecclesiafical Jutifalction, shall Prefent themselves, the Sees being vacant, to the Vicars-General, to have their approbation and Canonical Miffion, before they exercise their Functions; Provided, that
