HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the restrictions heretofore imposed on the ports of Italy shall immediately cease, and be suspended, and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty's subjects to trade in the same manner as they had before traded in times of peace, between His Majesty's dominions, and the ports of Italy from which the British flag is not excluded:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following Addresses have been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Addresses His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

*Most Gracious Prince,*

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates and Common Council of the City of Glasgow, beg leave humbly to approach your Royal Highness, with joyful congratulations on the glorious result of that enlightened policy, and of those splendid achievements, which have led to the re-establishment of legitimate government, and restored the independence of the European nations.

While we review the occurrences of the late arduous wars in which His Majesty has been engaged, we feel, along with your Royal Highness and our fellow-subjects, a generous pride in reflecting, that throughout this eventful period, and amidst the wreck of antient institutions, the British people has been enabled, under Divine Providence, to afford succour to the oppressed; to oppose successfully tyrannical aggression; to stand forth on all occasions, even when alone and unassisted, the bulwark of the liberties of Europe; and, by exhibiting a noble example of steady perseverance, to contribute, in a pre-eminent degree, to keep alive the spirit of independence, and to rouse the Continental nations to those magnanimous efforts, which have at last accomplished their deliverance.

When the late tyrant of France perfidiously seized upon the territories of his unsuspecting Ally, the King of Spain, and forced the Sovereigns of Portugal to take refuge in their Trans-Atlantic dominions, that gallant army sailed from the British shores to their assistance, which, under the guid-

ance of the heroic Wellington, has, by a series of victories unparalleled for the display of military skill and valour, rescued from oppression the nations of the Peninsula, and driven the invaders from the banks of the Tagus to those of the Garonne.

When the great and good Alexander, indignant at the unprovoked invasion of his empire, resolved to sacrifice his ancient capital, rather than submit to a foreign yoke—when the Prussian people, exasperated by their own sufferings, and the degrading treatment of their beloved Monarch, rose in one mass, with a patriotic ardour, which could not be withstood—when the Austrian Emperor, preferring the general good to the aggrandisement of a branch of his own family, joined the cause of the independence of nations, your Royal Highness, with prompt decision and alacrity, united yourself by treaty with these august Sovereigns, and lent all that powerful aid, which the industry and commercial prosperity of your people enabled you to afford.

After the victory of Leipsic had sealed the independence of Germany, and the people of Holland had spontaneously returned under the mild rule of the illustrious House of Orange, your Royal Highness, although the only Sovereign who had any conquests to relinquish, with a moderation characteristic of true greatness, concurred with your Allies, in the offer of Peace, upon such terms as were consistent with the restoration of the balance of power, and the permanent security of Europe.

When the obstinacy of the tyrant rejected the proffered peace, and imposed on the allied armies the duty of persevering in their glorious career—when Paris, in the course of retributive justice, was destined, as well as Berlin, Vienna, and Moscow, to witness the presence of a triumphant foe, your magnanimous Allies, conquering for peace and freedom, not for subjugation, with a generosity unparalleled in ancient or in modern times, declared, that the capital of France should be spared the horrors of war, and that the French people were free.

And now that France, thus released from the thralldom of a foreign usurper, has with one voice recalled the august House of Bourbon to the throne of their ancestors, your Royal Highness must feel a peculiar pleasure in the reflection, that they return to the bosom of their country, from that secure asylum which our revered Sovereign and your Royal Highness, have kindly afforded them, amidst all the perils of the revolutionary storm.

While we thus rejoice in the liberation of the Continental nations, from the most oppressive tyranny that has existed in modern times; and while we dwell, with heartfelt satisfaction, on the happy effects of the wisdom, moderation, and vigour, by which the Councils of your Royal Highness have been so eminently distinguished, permit us also to congratulate your Royal Highness on the bright and auspicious prospect which now opens upon your people, after a struggle so nobly maintained, so gloriously terminated. And we humbly trust, that, under the protection of Almighty God, your Royal Highness, and your people, may now indulge in the anticipation of a happier era, and look forward, not only to the enjoyment for a long period, of domestic tranquillity and prosperity, and of amicable intercourse with foreign nations, but to the

establishment of the balance of power upon a secure and lasting basis, and to the more extensive diffusion among mankind of all those blessings, which result from mild and rational government.

And we most firmly rely that, under the future conduct of your Royal Highness's Government, the peace of Europe will be fixed upon so stable a basis, as not to be shaken for a very long course of years.

And our most sincere prayer is, that your Royal Highness, relieved from the anxieties attendant on war and revolutions, may enjoy all that tranquillity and happiness proceeding from such wise councils.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales,  
REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Merse and Tirrotdale, convened at Dunse this 26th day of April 1814, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of sincere and profound respect, and to offer our most hearty congratulations on the completely prosperous issue of the arduous and long protracted contest with the unprincipled usurper of the French Government; a contest which, from the magnitude of the events that have marked its progress, and the deep interest of its consequences to the nations of Europe, must unquestionably be considered as one of the most important which have ever occupied the page of history.

The present happy state of public affairs is in a peculiar manner gratifying to us, and to all His Majesty's loyal subjects, when we reflect that, by the blessing of Heaven on the wisdom of your Royal Highness's counsels, and on the skill of your Commanders and valour of your soldiers and sailors, this country, to the immortal honour of the British name, has been enabled all along to stand foremost, and at one period single-handed, in resisting the unjust aggressions of the enemy, and vindicating the cause of the oppressed nations; and has contributed largely to the restoration of liberty, independence, and safety to those states and kingdoms, which, for a time, were the unhappy victims of the most licentious outrage, and rapine, and cruelty.

Whilst we admire the cordial unanimity, and the unabated zeal and activity, with which the illus-

trious Allies of your Royal Highness have persevered in prosecuting the great object of the war, we at the same time observe with still higher satisfaction, their unexampled moderation in the hour of victory. When conquerors generously employ their power for the benefit of the vanquished, they deserve and they will obtain the gratitude of their contemporaries, and of all succeeding generations.

In the present laudable exertions of your Royal Highness and of the Allied Sovereigns, to heal the wounds of the bleeding nations, to adjust and reconcile the interests of different states, and to establish the tranquillity of Europe, on a fair and equitable foundation, which alone, under Providence, can ensure the extension and continuance of the blessings of peace; in these auspicious labours we hail the approach of a new and happy æra, when the noise of tumult, commotion and war, shall no longer be heard, when the claims of humanity shall be respected, and when the just rights of individuals and of nations, shall be recognized and maintained.

While we deeply lament the continued indisposition of our gracious and much revered Monarch, we devoutly pray, that the Almighty may speedily enable him to participate in the general joy arising from the successful perseverance of your Royal Highness in the vigorous measures formerly adopted by His Majesty; that the Almighty would greatly bless your Royal Highness in your person, in your government, and in all your concerns; and that he would render, by his grace, the people under your dominion as remarkable for the virtues of peace in future, as they have been for those of war in the years that are past.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to enable the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to issue Exchequer Bills on the credit of such aids or supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament for the service of Great Britain, for the year one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

An Act to revive and continue, during the continuance of any Act imposing any restriction on the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, with respect to payments in cash, an Act of the fifty-second year of His present Majesty, for making more effectual provision for preventing the current gold coin of the realm from being paid or accepted for a greater value than the current value of such coin; and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to amend so much of an Act of His present Majesty, for repealing the several duties of Customs and granting other duties in lieu thereof, as relates to the duties payable on salt exported.

An Act to revive and further continue, until nine months after the conclusion of the present war, an Act of the seventh year of King George the Second, for the free importation of cochineal and indigo.

An Act for watching, lighting, and cleansing the town of Gosport, in the county of Southampton, and for amending and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the third year of His present Majesty, for better paving the streets and preventing nuisances and annoyances in the said town.

An Act for lighting, watching, and regulating the police within the borough of Macclesfield, in the county of Chester.

An Act for rebuilding the chapel of Newton, in the parish of Manchester, and county palatine of Lancaster.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of two Acts passed in the twelfth and thirty-third years of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from the parish of Cardington to the Great Northern Road, near Tensford-Bridge, in the county of Bedford, and for making and maintaining a road branching out of the same at Roxton-Hill to the south end of the turnpike road leading from Bedford to Kimbolton, in the county of Huntingdon.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of several Acts of His late and present Majesty, for repairing certain roads leading from Southmolton, in the county of Devon.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the roads from Lyne-Bridge through Longtown to the Scotch-Dyke, and from Longtown to the bridge over the River Sark, in the county of Cumberland, and for repairing certain other roads to communicate therewith.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Cockerton-Bridge to Staindrop, in the county of Durham.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the roads from Darlington to West Auckland, and several other roads therein mentioned, in the county of Durham.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of two Acts of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Burton, through Knockin, to Llanyrnnech, in the county of Salop, and other places therein mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from the north end of Marsh-Lane, in Ashford, in

the county of Kent, to the end of the parish of Orlestone, near Stockbridge, in Romney-Marsh, in the said county.

An Act for repairing the road from Barrow-Hill, in Ashford, to a place called New England, in the parish of Hollingborne, and for making a new road thence to East-Lane, in the town of Maidstone, all in the county of Kent.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the roads from West Harptry to the Bath and Wells turnpike roads, and other roads therein mentioned, in the county of Somerset; and for repairing certain other roads to communicate therewith.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from the turnpike road between North Shields and Newcastle-upon-Tyne to Morpeth Castle, and for making and maintaining three several branches of road to communicate therewith, all lying in the counties of Northumberland and Durham.

An Act for continuing the term and enlarging the powers of an Act of the thirty-third year of the reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the road from Selby-Ferry, in the parish of Hemingbrough, to the town of Market Weighton, in the East Riding of the county of York.

An Act for continuing and amending three Acts, one of His late Majesty and two of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Middleton Tyas-Lane-End to Bowes, in the North Riding of the county of York.

An Act for amending and widening the road commencing at or near the side gate on the Hinckley and Lutterworth turnpike road, in the parish of Burbage, in the county of Leicester, to the Leicester turnpike road, in or near to the village of Narborough, in the said county.
