Leith Rode, June 22.

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Ere are artived in this Road five more Prizes, all of them great Ships, laden with Mats and Deals. Newcastle, June 25. On Sunday night last arrived here two great Flyboats, considerable prizes, Isden with Deales and Timber.

Plymouth, June 25. By a Letter from Dartmouth we are informed of the arrival there of a Veffel from Breft, which offures us , that the Fleet of French men of War and Firethips that were Cruifing in the Channel, were commanded home, as were 20 Sail more that were fent toward: Portugal; which, when returned, will make up a Fleet of about 80 Sail, with Fire-fhips and others: The French intend to fend out fix Men of War from Breft to Cruife about the Channel.

Pover, June 26. The laft night was fent into harbour a great Flyboat of 300 Tuns, laden with Hempe, Corne, and other commodities, being a Hollander ourwards bound.

Hamburgh. June 15. Letters from Berlin tell us of the death of the Electres of randenburgh, and that the Blector is feing up a new University upon the Elbe Aream, for which he ordered his Declaration to be publiffed in Latine, containing the privileges and endowments he intended to grant to it.

Count Coningfmark formerly Ambaffsdor in France, having an inclination, and accordingly obtained leave of the Fieldhere Wrangel to fpend this fummer in the French army, and having with a great expense fitted himself for the Cam-pagnr, was on the sudden countermanded by the Fieldhere, and fent post for Stockholm, from whence he is to return in

Hamburgh, June 22. There is yet no appearance of the Sweder intention to change their quarters, but a fric Embargo is pur upon all Veffels upon the Swedifb Coafts in the East Sea, for the Transportation of several thousands of Foot and horie to Pomerania

VVar am, June 17. Several Courriers have been letely difpatched hither with the unwelcome news, that many thoulands of the Tartars and Coffacks have made a lecond irruption upon the Frontiers, having tailen particularly upon VVifzowicz and VViffognodka, where they continued three dayes wasting and destroying the C untry, and had carried away with them, besides much plunder, about 4000 Captives: that feveral Companies of our beft Souldiers were comman . ed to purfue them, who returned with some few prisoners only, who tell us, that their intentions were to continue their Incurfions, till they can draw together an Army frong enough to engage the whole force of Poland : whereup mour Forces are again drawing towards the Frontiers, to fortifie the Paffes, and to fecure our own Garrifons: In the mean while the Turtarian Ambaffador in this Court difewnes their Actings, as being done with at the Chae his mitters order, calling them Rebels, and advifing the Poles to a fevenge.

The French Minister labours by his moneys and all other arts imaginable, togain upon the Gra dees of this Kingdom, to accept of the affiftance of his Mafter, who is willing to emplay 15 no men for the fecurity of the Kingdom, and that upon his own expence: The finall Dets (which are customirrily held after the diffilution of the greater) are highly incented that the defign for a French Successor to the Crown is ftill profecued, norwithkending the Act paffed in the laft Geners! Affembly to the contrary, and are entred to a formal Confederation, obliging themselves under an Oath to oppose it : and in cale his Af jefty fhall refign his Crown tomaintain the freedom of their Election: And having been informed that the Prince of Condé intended to be present at the Solem nization of the Queens Funeralls, they have defired his Majesty to acquaint him of the inconveniences of proceeding further in that refolution , leaft he meet with oppoli-

Vienna, June 19. The consultation for the relief of the Netherlands Rill continues , but as yet they are not come to any resolution. The Commissary General, Baron Van Hoenfild bath given into the Countei of War his lift of all the Forces which was taken upon the review of them at their Rendezvous, which amounts to 24000 Men complete. Yesterday mustered the new Regiment intended for the Prince de Gonzague, of which four Companies are to quarter in this City, for the reinforcement of the Garrison, three other Companies are ordered to pass the River, and to march for Raab; and the three remaining companies to be disbanded. Tis ftill discoursed that the Spanish Ambassador intends to give out Commiffions for four Regiments of Horfe, and as many of Foot, but the Levies are as yet but little advanced. The Turkish Envoy lately took his leave, with the usurl Cere-monles, and went out of Town, but beforethe had gone three Leagues upon the River , he made a ftop, pretending he had received new orders to return again to the Court.

The Prince de Saxe Lawenburg has been some daies here Incognito: 'tis believed in Order to the marriage intended by him, in which he has great probability of success.

A Letter from her Mijefty the Queen of Spain gives some hopes to this Curt, that the differences between Spain and France, may be compoled by a reference, and that the King of France may be induced to make choice of some Indifferent Arbitrators, which may hear and determine of that grand affair ; though at Bruffels they feem to be of another ju igement; a Gendeman arriving there is Post from that place, telling us, that the French proceed vigoroufly in the reduction of their Towns, and are confident that the Princes of the Emplre will not permit any forces to be fent through their Countries, to the affiftance of the Spiniards : and that a Million and an half was returned by Antwerp, to the Marquis de Caffel Rodrigo, to be employed in the rayling of forces, and the defence of their Countries.

Venice, June 24. On Wednelday in the Evening strived here from Rome two Cutriers, with the certain news of the Elaction of a new Pope, and that on Sunday night laft, after severall warm Disputes, the majority of Votes determined them, by conterring the Pontifical Dignity upon Cardinal Julio Rospigliosi of Pistoya, subj & to the Great Duke of Florence, being reputed a perfon of great Abilities, Integrity and Moderation, with which he discharged the Office of Secretary of State to the late deceased Pope : The Spanish Faction having prevailed in this Election, to which he has been thought to be most inclinable. He enters upon the Chair in the 71 year of his Age, called by the name of Ciement the Ninth. Cardinal Ottoboni le made Datario: Cardinal Azolino Secretary of State; Monfegnor Altleri his Maggior Domo, or Steward of his Houle; and Antaldi his High Chamber lain.

Yekerday the Senare chofe 4. Ambaffadors Extraordinary, ho are to be fent to Rome to congratulate the Election.

We have by the laft Pott from Rome received Lette s from our Fleet, by the way of Orranto, which cell us, That feverall Turkish Saicks, taking their way by the Southfea, were arrived at Gira Petra, where they put on shoare 5000 Janifaries, with which addition the Vifier has fo much encouraged his Army, that he is refolved to go vigo oully on with the fiege of Candia; to which purpole he has already difploying the Soldiers in his Army, and the Slaves as Pioneers to work in the Trenches; That they have already begun to raife three Batteries against the three principal Bulwa ks of the City, which are defended with Infinite courage by the Christians, who are very confident they shall at last force them to leave the fiege with as little fuccels as formerly. The Plague rages violently in Mores, from whence it has been brought into Canes, and into their Army, the Mortality being great amongst them, and their want of Victuals not yet fapply'd.

In the mean time cut Squadrons are continually plying sbout tho'e less, and frequently intercept their Veffels that

ettempt to put in provifions into Canea.

A grest parce of the Turks korle being lately got together In Albania, with an intention to have mace an Incurhon into our Territories, were by a timely intelligence prevented in their Defign, by the carefulness and vigilance of Colonell Possidaria, who drew all the Neighborhood into Arms, and waited the arrival of the Tarks in the narrow paffages, by which they had intended to have paffed; but the Enemy having notice of their posture by a spy sent out by them, immediately settred ; whereupon the Christians being unwilling to return without forne Action, marched into their Countrey as farr as Licca, from whence they returned with a great Booty of cattel and many flives.

Seignior Labia with his Couvoy lyes ready to fet fayl, ex-

pecting only a fair wind; the great ship, called the Mara-botto, 'tis believed, will be ready to say! with them. Liste, July 2. The 30th, past, a confiderable parc of the French Army merched towards this place, and divided them-Town, which they found in a fit posture to receive them 3 the Works being every where to well manned, that they had little encouragement tomake en Affault; which invited our Man to make a Sally, in which they killed above fifty French upon the place, and returned with inconderable los : In the mean time the Cannon from the Walls were frequently discharge? but by rea'on of their diftance, doing but little execution ; we thought fit to make our neerer approaches to them, by planting our Guns upon our new Fortifications, from whence they had their eff. es upon them. doing confiderable execution ; and amongst others took off the foulder of their Commander the Marquis de la Fueilade, a person of great reputation in the French Army, who in few houres died of his would, and was that night carried off, and buried in the next The refittance they found here obliged them to draw off, but not without leaving some marks behind them of their revenge, having that night fired one part of our Suburbs, and destroyed about fourty Mills, and some Country houses near the Town. This day we have had another Aliarum, which in a quar er of an houres time dt:w ail our Men to the Wo.ks, expecting the approach of the Enemy; but it now appears that the French have no farther defign at present upon this place, we having received certain intelligence, that yefterday the King of France, with a great part of his Cavalry invested Dougy, and this day the rest of his Horse with the Infantry is paffing by to befiege it , which (though a place confiderably ftrong and well fortified) is not at prefent proporticnably manned, and therefore we much fear it cannot make

fuch refistance as might be otherwise expected.

Hague, July 6. The States are continually dispatching Hague, July 6. The States are continually dispatching away provisions and necessaries for their Fleet, and as earnest to defend themselves by land; they much fear the intention of the Swedes, though they lie ftill as formerly in Stifft Bremen: The Bishop of Munfter is faid to have received a considerable fum of Moneys from the French, and intends to raile and misintain 8000 Men, pretending them only for the defence of his own C untry. The Militia advances here, and feveral Companies are erdered to march towards Over-Ifel, and Eaft-Friefland, to be ready to defend those parts in cafe of any fulden attempt ; especially fince the Swedes have publickly faid, that if they receive not speedy far isfaction from the

States, they are refolved to attacque them by land.

From Amfterdam they confirm to us, the newes of the il fuccefs of our Convoyes, which has fallen heavy upon many confiderable Merchania in this City, to the breaking of feveral of them , but order is now taken to fecure our Convoyes for the future, and a Squadron fent to ply upon the Northern Coasts for that purpole. The Convoy from Denmark of sbout 70 Merchants, with the two French and leven Danifo men of War, is arrived at the Wiy.

Yesterday we had news that ten more of our ships, richly La len fr m the Northern parts, were chaled by a fquadron of the English, and that 8. of them were taken ; the other two

faving themselves about the Vieter.

Yekerday the Count de Hornes went hence for the Fleet, carrying with him 1 500 men, to be put aboard their men of War, which are to be divided into 3. Squadrons, to cruile upon the coasts of England.

Whitehall, Tune 30. The 27. inftant the Dutch Fleethaving drawn off their Squadron from the Bay before Alberough stood with the Tyde from the Buoy of the Nore, into the Thames mouth, being shout 4 3 fayl great and fmall, but made no attempt more confiderable, then the fending fome few men affore on the Marsh overagainft the Hope, to fteal fheep, who adventured not upon any houses. About 7. in the Evening they fayled downwards, at which time one of their Flag-ships ran on ground upon Blyth-fands; where the was forced to continue till the next morning flood, with 14 more of the Fleet that lay by her for her Defence; in which time they were confirained to Unrigg her, and to take down her Topmaft: About 3. in the morning the got off with fome damage, and with the 14. that were her Guard, fell down to the rest of their Fleet to the Buey of the Nore. The 28 instant, about 5 in the afternoon, their Fleet, which then confifted of 44 (syl) and about 25 Hoyes and small Vessels, came to an Anchor about the lower end of Quinborough; but about 7. they weighed, and went down below the Buoy in the Nore, where they continued that night, and have not fince appeared in the River. The 29. about 8,or 9 of their grealer fhips were feen cruifing cff Harwich, about the Sledway and Gunfleet; and about 12 at Noon fome others began to appear aponthe Maes. 18 of their men of War, with 2 Fireships, and 2 Galliot Hoyes, were 3, or 4days fince met fayling to the Northwards, giving cut, they it tended to feek out Sir Jeremy Smith: Since which van Ghent went cut with 22 fayl more, fleering N.N. Weft, and sis faid upen ile fame Defign.

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
