WHEREAS the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, dated the first day of October one thousand eight hundred and eleven, for regulating the trade to and from the Cape of Good Hope, has ceased and determined, the Act under the authority of which the said Order was issued having expired: And whereas by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, an Act for regulating the trade to the Isle of Malta; and to revive and continue, for the same period, several Acts relating to the trade to the Cape of Good Hope; and to the bringing and landing certain prize goods in Great Britain," His Majesty is authorised, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from time to time, to give such directions, and make such regulations, touching the trade and commerce to and from the said settlement, and the territories and dependencies thereof, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any thing contained in an Act, passed in the twelfth year of the reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Act for encouraging and increasing of shipping and navigation;" or in an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled

"An Act for preventing frauds, and regulating abuses in the plantation trade;" or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force relating to His Majesty's colonies and plantations, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament, law, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall and may be lawful, until further order, for all ships and vessels belonging to the subjects of any Country or State in amity with His Majesty, to enter into the ports of the said settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the territories and dependencies thereof, for the purpose of repairs and refreshment only, in which case, a part of the cargoes of such ships and vessels may be permitted to be disposed of for the purpose of defraying the expences of such repairs or refreshment; and that it shall also be lawful for any vessels belonging to the subjects of any Country or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into the ports of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the territories and dependencies thereof, any articles of provisions, with the permission of the Governor of the Cape of Good Hope first had and obtained, by licence in writing under his signature, which licence he is hereby empowered to grant: and His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that goods, wares, or merchandise, the growth, produce, or manufacture of the countries to the eastward of the Cape of Good

Hope, legally imported into the said settlement, or into the territories or dependencies thereof, may be exported from the said settlement, or the territories or dependencies thereof, to the ports of the United Kingdom, subject to the rules and regulations contained in an Act, passed in the fifty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for continuing in the East India Company, for a further term, the possession of the British territories in India, together with certain exclusive privileges; for establishing further regulations for the government of the said territories, and the better administration of justice within the same; and for regulating the trade to and from the places within the limits of the said Company's charter," or to any ports or places to which a trade in such articles is permitted to be carried on from the said settlement, or the territories or dependencies thereof, under the provisions of an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for the further regulation of the trade to and from the places within the limits of the charter of the East India Company," and subject to the rules and regulations in the said Act contained, in British ships or vessels, or in such ships or vessels that shall have been built within the territories belonging to the East India Company, or in the ports under the immediate protection of the British flag in the East Indies; and that it shall in like manner be lawful to export from the said settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, or its territories or dependencies, in British ships or vessels, or in such ships or vessels that shall have been built within the territories belonging to the East India Company, or in the ports under the immediate protection of the British flag in the East Indies, to any ports or places to which trade may be lawfully carried on from the said settlement or its territories or dependencies, any articles of British or of European produce or manufacture, which shall have been legally imported into the said settlement, or the territories or dependencies thereof; provided, however, that nothing in this Order contained, shall extend, or be construed to extend, to permit a trade in tea between the Cape of Good Hope, or its territories or dependencies, and the countries to the eastward thereof, or from the said settlement, and its territories or dependencies, to the ports of the United Kingdom, nor to permit any vessel under the burthen of three hundred and fifty tons, to export from the said settlement, or the territories or de-

pendencies thereof, to the ports of the United Kingdom, any articles the growth, produce, or manufacture of any countries situated within the limits of the East India Company's charter: and it is His Royal Highness's further pleasure, that the trade and commerce to and from the said settlement, and the territories and dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the laws of trade and navigation, and the rules and regulations thereof, as would have affected the same, if this Order had not been made, except so far as such laws are contrary to this present Order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS divers soldiers, now serving in His Majesty's army, under the provisions of the Mutiny Act, passed in the forty-sixth year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 66, schedule A. did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited periods therein respectively expressed, provided His Majesty should so long require the same, and for such further term, not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty, provided always that in case of such direction, the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any Definitive Treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods as aforesaid; and whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirty-first day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to direct that all soldiers then serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who had been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, should continue to serve therein, for the space of three years after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, provided always that the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any Definitive Treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods respectively; and whereas the war between His Majesty and the United States of America, unhappily continues to exist, soldiers enlisting as aforesaid, cannot claim the benefit of this provision, notwithstanding a Definitive Treaty of Peace, between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty was signed at Paris on the thir-

tieth of May last, and the ratifications thereof duly exchanged on the seventeenth of June following; We, taking the same into Our most gracious consideration, have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to publish this Proclamation; and We do hereby direct, that all soldiers now serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who have been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, and whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the thirty-first of July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for the further term of three years, after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, the original period of whose services is not yet expired, shall be entitled to their respective discharges from the expiration of the several periods for which they were originally enlisted; and that all soldiers now serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who have been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, and the periods of whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, and whose original periods of service for which they were enlisted are expired, shall be forthwith entitled to their respective discharges from and immediately after this Our Proclamation, notwithstanding the provisions of His Majesty's Proclamation of thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the first day of November next, We, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said first day of November to Tuesday the eighth day of said month; and We have given order to the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do further hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall, on the eighth day of November next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And

the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said eighth day of November next.

THE following Addresses have been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE the Provost, Magistrates, Town Council, and Burgesses of the Royal Burgh of Wick, in Common Council assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, with the renewed assurances of our duty; and to unite with the whole empire in humble congratulations on a succession of glorious events, which have restored peace and liberty to the civilized world. We have viewed with admiration, the heroic exertions of His Majesty's arms and those of his Allies, by which not only the glory of the victors has been established, but the happiness of the vanquished has been

secured. The moderation of the Allies has been as unparalleled as their success; by their unanimity and disinterestedness, as well as by their valour and perseverance, they have achieved greater triumphs, and conferred more lasting benefits on mankind, than the wisest could have foreseen or the most sanguine have expected. Through them, under Providence, the sceptre of the usurper has been broken; through them, France has been restored to the paternal sway of her legitimate Sovereign, who has acquired from the experience of the past, such lessons as adversity best can teach, and has learnt during his residence in this country, the value of that inestimable blessing, a free Constitution, which Britain enjoys in greater perfection than any other nation at any other period.

But whilst we acknowledge with due gratitude and admiration, the heroic exertions of the Allied Sovereigns, the patriotism and unanimity of their subjects, the consummate skill of their Generals, and the unconquered valour of their troops, it ought never to be forgotten, that to British heroism and to British perseverance, the chief merit of those successes may most justly be ascribed. The services of the illustrious Wellington can scarcely be done justice to, and cannot be exaggerated; and those who were best entitled to be his rivals, have been the first to acknowledge his superiority. The British nation at large has submitted, not only without a murmur but with alacrity, to the severest burthens and privations, because they consider no sacrifice as painful which the public interest requires.

We should, indeed, be ungrateful if in expressing our thanks to the benefactors of Europe, we neglected to pay a due tribute to the firmness and energy which your Royal Highness and your advisers have evinced, during the most trying and most awful crisis. If you had not been sanguine when others despaired; if you had not administered to the wants of our Allies when others affirmed that our resources were exhausted; if you had not relied upon the exertions of those powers whom others considered as ruined and subdued; if you had been intimidated by the previous successes of the usurper, whom others represented as the idol both of fortune and of his subjects,—the contest must have ceased ere the objects were attained, and the fetters of Europe might still have been unbroken.

That your Royal Highness may long live to enjoy those blessings which you have, under Providence, so mainly contributed to secure, is the sincere wish, in which we humbly unite with all your grateful and loyal subjects.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,
WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal sub-

jects, the Freeholders, Landholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Caithness, assembled at our Head Court, beg leave to offer to your Royal Highness our humble congratulations on the recent glorious events which have diffused so much joy throughout this empire, and throughout the world. The objects for which the contest was undertaken, have all been finally attained. The glory of our country has been elevated to a pitch which cannot be exceeded; and the nations of Europe, which have been rescued from the yoke of their oppressor, ascribe to Great Britain the chief merit of their deliverance. From our example they learnt to meet adversity with fortitude, and success with moderation; aware that no peace could be lasting, which was not founded on the sure basis of mutual advantage, they have granted to France as much as she could reasonably hope for, and more than she was entitled to expect. Having, even in the moment of triumph, when revenge and retribution were in their power, insisted upon no stipulations which were either illiberal or unjust, they have acquired as much honour by forbearance as by victory, and merited the eternal gratitude both of the Sovereign whom they restored, and of the nation whom they forgave.

The usurper, who was no less an object of hatred and of dread to his subjects than to his enemies, has been driven from his ill-gotten pre-eminence, and the legitimate Monarch of France has been recalled by the voice of his people to the throne of his ancestors. We trust that the nation will have learnt from experience, that revolutionary remedies only aggravate the evils they are intended to remove; and that the Sovereign, on his part, will never forget, that he will best secure the permanence of his government, by promoting the interests, and by maintaining the rights of his people, which, when properly understood both by him and by them, are inseparably connected with his own.

Whilst we pay a due tribute of gratitude and admiration to the firmness and magnanimity of our Allies, we feel an honest pride and satisfaction in reflecting, that they have themselves unanimously acknowledged how much they are indebted both to our exertions and to our example, and feel the full force of obligations, which none but great minds would so willingly admit. Their Generals, whose renown and achievements have been most conspicuous, are too just to deny, and too generous to envy, the transcendent merits of our illustrious Wellington, and are as anxious as ourselves to pay homage to his consummate skill in planning, his coolness in executing, and his modesty in allowing to his companions in arms, the merit of those successes which are chiefly owing to himself. The British nation is looked up to by others as the model of that manly submission to necessary privations, and that patience under difficulties, to which the successful result of the contest may, in a great degree, be ascribed. The energy and liberality of the British Cabinet confirmed the resolution of the wavering and enabled the well-disposed to act with promptitude and effect. We are no less grateful to your Royal Highness and to your advisers, for having persevered in the contest, until the usurper was overthrown, than for the

peace, which you have happily concluded with the legitimate Sovereign of France. We thank you for having turned a deaf ear, to the counsels and prophecies of those who despaired. We now expect, with confidence, during an era of peace and tranquillity, the adoption of such plans of retrenchment as circumstances may render practicable and expedient; and we trust that your Royal Highness will long continue, through the blessing of providence, to reign over the hearts of your subjects, whose happiness and best interests you have so essentially promoted.

Each district will be put up at the sum above set opposite thereto; which, if there be no bidding, will be gradually abated down to a certain point, or till a bidding shall be made. The highest bidder will be declared the farmer, and will be required to

pay down immediately, in Bank notes, one eighth part of the annual rent as a deposit; but if no sufficient bidding shall be made for any district, it will be withdrawn.

The farmer of each district will be required to give bond, with three or more sureties, in the penalty of half the annual rent, for securing the payment of the rent and the performance of his contract.

And it is intended, that the districts shall not be put up in the order above stated, but in any other which the Commissioners of Stamps may think fit, and which will not be declared before the time of letting.

All persons intending to bid for any of the said duties, are to deliver in their proposals, addressed to the Commissioners at the Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, at least three days previous to the said 23d day of November next, signed with their names, stating the places of their abode, and specifying the district or districts for which they intend to bid, otherwise their proposals cannot be proceeded upon.

And no persons licensed to let horses for the purpose of travelling post, nor any one for their use, can be admitted to contract for any of the said duties.
